

TWO SCHOOL RECORDS BROKEN.

Woodruff took a magnificent lead at the pistol shot with Phelan and Sheldon close after him. After the first 100 yards had been run Sayre began to creep up and soon left Sheldon behind him, and finally succeeded in passing Phelan and took 2d place. Woodruff's time was 24 2-5 sec. breaking our record. Points, Andover, 23, Exeter 22.
