#### Yale's New Gymnasium.

The new Yale gymnasium which was completed last month is considered to be the finest in the United States if not in the world. The constructing and planning have been in the hands of such competent men that now there could be no improvement.

Its use will be unique for an American gymnasium, since it will include not only the "exercise department," which takes up the greater portion of the average gymnasium in this country, but also tanks for the university crews, a cage for the base-ball nine and fencing and boxing departments. In addition to this, Dr. Anderson, the gymnasium director, has removed his normal school of physical culture to New Haven, and has devoted a part of the building for conducting his classes which include over forty women and about a dozen men.

Dr. J. W. Leaven, who has held the position of gymnasium instructor for the last fifteen years, will be retained as medical adviser for the students, and W. E. Dole, who had charge of Yale's last year's track athletic team, will teach boxing.

#### Dartmouth Athletics.

The athletic interests of Dartmouth have taken on a new life. One of the foremost means for arousing this new interest was the winning of the baseball championship this last spring. The college forces in connection with the alumni athletic committee have laid elaborate plans for a new campus to cover ten acres entirely enclosed by a high fence. Within this enclosure it is proposed to have two foot-ball fields, two base-ball diamonds, a twolap cinder track and many tennis courts. A large grand stand will also be erected which will contain dressing rooms and baths for visiting teams. About \$15,000 will be expended on the campus after which the attention of the committee will be turned toward the renovation of the gymnasium. The prospects in foot-ball are very bright." Capt. Allen. a former Exeter halfback, feels quite confident of many strong supporters among the new men.

Altogether, Dartmouth is to be congratulated on what seems to be a new era in her athletics.

#### The Banjo and Glee Clubs.
