Andover Second Eleven 16; Haverhill A. A. 0.

The game on Saturday with the Haverhill Athletic Association proved a great surprise. While Andover was confident of victory, it was scarcely to be hoped that our opponents would be retired without scoring. Our team lost the ball several times through bad fumbling and misunderstanding of the signals, but at critical moments it played a sharp, quick game and showed its superiority clearly. The backs followed their interference very well, and the team showed more spirit than at any previous time this season. Hines, Swift, Bement, and Burgess played well for Andover, while Ramsom, Harris, and Russ carried off the honors for Haverhill. McLauchlan handled his men well and showed good judgment in running his backs. The cheering was fair at first, but toward the last fell off greatly. One of the umpire's decisions against us was manifestly wrong, and probably caused the loss of a touchdown, but, as a whole, his rulings were as fair for one side as for the other.

The game was called at 3.50, Andover having the ball. McLauchlan starts in the V and makes five yards. We soon lose it on four downs, but regain it almost immediately on a fumble. After bad fumbling by both sides, Andover gets five yards for off-side play. Haverhill gets the ball on four downs, but soon fumbles, and McLauchlan getting it runs twenty yards before he is stopped. Swift takes the ball fifteen yards farther, but loses it by a decision of the umpire. Russ kicks and Andover gets the ball for off-side play. Martin "bucks" the centre for three yards. Hine carries the ball over the line for a touchdown but does not kick the goal. Score 4-0. Shortly after this time for the first half is called.

Haverhill starts the second half with a wedge. She gains five yards, but soon loses the ball on downs. Hines bucks the centre for ten yards, and then Swift makes a touchdown from the middle of the field through the centre. Hine kicks the goal. Score, 10-0.

Very soon after play begins again Burgess gets the ball on a fumble, and running nearly the whole length of the field makes the third and last touchdown. Goal. Score, 16-0.

Haverhill starts with the V and

makes five yards. Good rushes by Russ and Harris carry the ball to Andover's 25-yard line. Here Noyes is hurt and Lester, P.S. '94, takes his place. Burgess stops and Perry is substituted for him. Haverhill gets the ball on Andover's 20-yard line, but is compelled to kick. Soon afterward time is called.

Cane Rush.

After the usual amount of secret planning and false alarms '96 at length appeared, Monday noon, on the campus, and began in a very hasty manner to inform the school at large and '96 in particular that they were very much alive and ready to defend their cane. A few cheers were enough to put every middler on his mettle. Runners were dispatched in all directions to collect '95's scattered forces, and in a few moments there were enough men to hurl back cheer after cheer in defiance of '96. The upper class men, too, judges of the contest as they were, could not help but show their partisanship by cheering for '96. When time was called '96 had so augmented her forces as to fully equal her opponents, and dividing into two parts they began the rush by attacking the little squad of men crowded around the cane, in front and rear.

Then for fifteen long minutes there was pushing and pulling, dragging and climbing, till '95 had forced fifteen hands upon the cane, and thirteen hands from '96 still bravely clung to the trust that had been committed to them at the beginning of the rush. When the result was made known the winning class formed in line, and with the cane at their head and a troupe of small boys at their heels marched around the town in celebration of their well-earned victory.

'96 has shown herself a plucky class and '95 has won the right to carry canes. All honor to the victors and the vanquished.

People's Course.

Mr. Lee Meriwether of St. Louis, Mo., delivered a lecture before the supporters of the People's Course last Monday evening. His subject was "Europe on fifty cents a day." He treated it more in the direction of his experience while thus travelling, saying little of the way in which he accomplished this feat. He has travelled Europe in two ways, as tourist, as tramp. He found the former the most comfortable but the latter let him into the hearts of the people, the common everyday people. As he slept under their roofs and ate at their tables, their condition was opened up to him as never before.

His meals at Florence were a fair sample of how he lived on an average. The fare consisted principally of figs, black bread, and macaroni and cost: breakfast, three cents, dinner, six, and supper, three cents again.

He discussed the condition of the Italian masses both in the city and the country, showed how the city workingman lived on from 12 to 15 cents a day and paid \$20 a year for his lodging, told how the shepherds of the Campania, only twenty miles from Imperial Rome, worked for seven cents a day, and related how notwithstanding this condition the government manages to obtain about 45 per cent of this wage in taxes. The condition of Germany's women was discussed, the imperial cathedrals, the rusty out-of-the-way towns. His entire bearing in the lecture was pleasing, entirely free from form or cant.

He ended with a declaration of American happiness and victory when these European countries were held up in terrible contrast.

We have noticed with surprise the disorder about the chapel door every morning after the close of the chapel exercises. Doubtless this arises from the fact that the Juniors are ignorant of the custom which gives precedence to the Seniors and Middlers in passing out of chapel to the rooms below. There is not clear space enough for all to pass out together, and when all attempt to do so an unpleasant jam is the result.

The order of departure which has

always been followed is Seniors, Middlers, Junior-Middlers, and Juniors. If this unwritten law were observed by all the fellows, it would greatly contribute to good order, and the fellows would in the end get out sooner and more comfortably than they do now.

The suggestion concerning the election of class day officers is a wise one, and as it is the custom the in colleges, it would be a good plan if '94 should hold her election in the fall term and thus establish a precedent here. In several cases in past years the commencement parts have shown lamentable lack of preparation. H. M. Love, P.A. '79, secretary of the Andover Alumni Association of New York, has changed his residence and place of business from New York City to Utica, N.Y.

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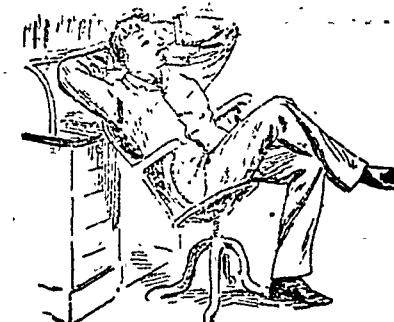
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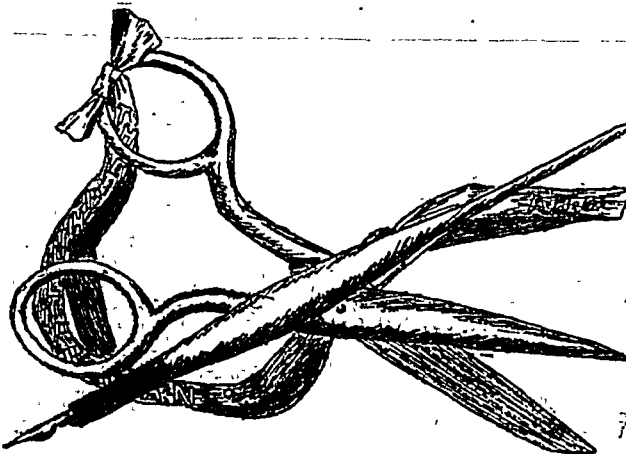
