Inquiry.

Sunday evening at the regular meeting of Inquiry a report of the Convention of the Student Volunteer Movement, held at Detroit, was given by Pettee and Bingham who represented the society at that meeting. Pettee reported upon the regular meetings of the Convention, and Bingham upon the substance of the speeches.

There were fifteen hundred representatives in all, from the schools and colleges of the United States and Canada. There were one hundred and forty-four representatives from the colleges, thirty-four from preparatory schools, and the rest were mostly from Theological Seminaries. The Convention was opened on Wednesday evening, Feb. 28, by Rev. Robert E. Speer, P. A. '86. Regular meetings were held twice a day, and besides these many impromptu meetings.

The closing exercises were held on Sunday, March 4, the Rev. R. E. Speer giving the closing address.

Philo and Forum.

The joint committee appointed by Forum and Philo to make arrangements for an interscholastic debate has at last obtained some result. The first school approached was the Boston Latin School, but it was unable to accept as it has no regular debating society. An invitation was sent to Worcester Academy, which has been accepted, and it only remains to arrange the details for the debate. The date has not been definitely fixed, but owing to Worcester's vacation coming so late it will, in all probability, be put off till next term at least.

The committee think that this debate will prove very pleasant for the

two schools, as we have never met the Worcester Academy in any contest. A very earnest invitation for our debaters to be the guests of Worcester has been received, but it is hoped to make arrangements for having the debate held in Andover.

Proposed Eligibility Rules.

In response to a call of the PHILLIPIAN in regard to a definition of an amateur athlete, the athletic committee of the school have met and submit the following rules to be acted upon by the school at a later date.

The following rules shall apply to all public athletic contests in which Phillips Academy is represented as one of the competitors, either by individuals or by members of a team:

I. No student shall be allowed to represent Phillips Academy in any such public athletic contest unless he is regularly enrolled as a member on the books of the school and is pursuing studies requiring at least twelve hours class-room or laboratory work a week.

II. No student shall be allowed to represent Phillips Academy in any such public contest, who either before or since entering the school shall have engaged in any athletic competition for money, whether for a stake or a money prize, or a share of the entrance fees or admission money, or who shall have taught or engaged in any athletic exercise or sport as a means of livelihood; or who shall have received for his participation in any athletic sport or contest any pecuniary gain or reward whatever, direct or indirect, provided, however, that he may have received from the school organization or from any permanent amateur association of which he was at that time a member, the amount by which the expenses necessarily incurred by him in representing this organization in athletic contests exceeded his ordinary expenses.

III. It shall be the duty of the Advisory Committee to see that these rules are enforced. Doubtful cases may be referred by them to a committee, consisting of the manager and captain of the athletic department directly concerned, a member of the Faculty, and a graduate of the school, whose decision shall be final.

School Meeting.

At a meeting of the school held yesterday morning G. C. Greenway '95 was elected to represent the school at the banquet of the Andover and Exeter Clubs at Yale, to be held next Monday evening.

Now that the winter-tournament is at hand we want the fellows to refrain from doing what has always before been one of its draw-backs, that is showing partiality to any one of the contestants. It prevents the time-keeper and referee from being heard, and would probably make an inexperienced man lose his head, and perhaps the contest. But more than this; it necessarily causes hard feeling. This applies especially to the boxing and wrestling events.

We hope everyone will remember this to-day and not get excited and cheer whenever his favorite scores a good point. Applause properly comes at the beginning and end of the events, and not during the contest.

The editorial in the last *Mirror* called our attention again to a fact which we have long deplored,—the lack of local news in the paper; but it is only with the greatest difficulty than any local matter can be procured, especially in the winter term. And it is with the hope of improving this department of the paper that we have started the column of "School Organizations." We will endeavor in future to have as much of this sort of matter as possible, and we beg for the co-operation of the secretaries of the various societies, classes and associations,

for if the meetings of these are written up by the secretaries themselves and deposited in the PHILLIPIAN box it will greatly assist the editors and ensure fuller and more accurate accounts.

The rules concerning the eligibility of candidates for the various athletic teams of the school have been drawn up with great thought and care and are put before the school in this issue. In a short time a school meeting will be called to consider them, and in view of this we would urge every man in school to read them attentively and be prepared to vote intelligently upon them.

The first rule defines a bona fide student. The second is much the same in substance as those of Yale and Harvard in regard to professionals and allows no one who has received pecuniary aid, "direct or indirect," to play on any team. This rule needs a careful reading, for it is by far the most important of the three. The third and last arranges for a judicial committee who shall decide in doubtful cases.

These rules will not cause any apparent difference in our athletics, but they will make the school feel perfectly certain that when they are complied with, its athletics are pure and this feeling of assurance will tend to strengthen us.

The next and sixth Harvard-Yale debate will be held probably the last week in April. Harvard has the choice of sides.

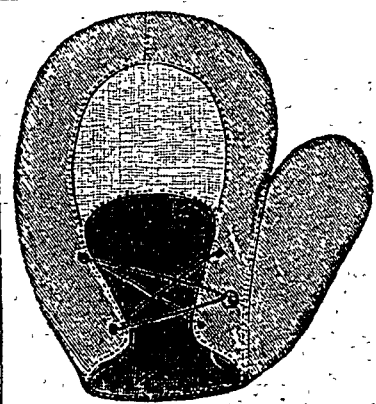
President Eliot, together with ten other prominent educators, has in preparation an exhaustive work on the relation between colleges and preparatory schools.
