Sedgwick's pitching seemed at times careless for frequently when he settled down to business the Lowell batters struck out with the bases well filled.

At the bat Elliott and Drew were the only ones who did themselves credit. The Lowell team was a set of thorough ball players though a little rusty. The batting of Glines, Flanagan and McGuane, the pitching of McCarthy and the fielding of McGuane were its special features of their side. The majority of the candidates have decided to forego their vacation and remain here for practice. The schedule of the games thus far arranged will probably be made known this week.

The Gun Team has been chosen and a challenge has been sent to the Princeton Freshman Gun Club. There are now some twenty candidates trying for the Track Team, but very little can be said yet about their work.

A school meeting was called on Thursday to make up the balance of the amount needed to purchase the foot-ball souvenirs. It was quickly raised by a generous response from the school.

We have received again an unsigned communication, one which broaches a matter of importance to our tennis interests. It is our wish to print the article in the next issue, but we must first have the name of the writer.

We publish to-day the first of a series of bi-weekly letters which will contain accurate and readable news from the Lawrenceville School and Worcester Academy. The editors have accomplished what they have long desired through the courteous cooperation of the journals in the two schools with which Andover has of late had so much to do.

We have entered upon a term in which we will find more difficulty than in either of the preceding ones, in holding ourselves down to the prescribed work of the school. As outside attractions increase, the temptation to relax one's efforts in scholarly pursuits is great. The object of our attendance here is felt more keenly than is generally admitted. The school year drawing to its close should be taken seriously, as an opportunity to put to use the power acquired in the preceding months.

Since the damp weather of spring has begun we have heard complaints about the board walk which extends across the campus from Latin Com-

mons to the athletic store. There are several places which need repairing, and a great deal of inconvenience could be done away with by extending the walk at both ends over the large muddy places which now have to be walked through by the large number who use the thoroughfare several times each day. We believe this matter is worthy the attention of the Trustees.

We wish to emphasize the remarks made in chapel last Saturday morning, exhorting the school to enthusiastic cheering. If every man realized the amount of encouragement there is for a team in a hearty cheer, exhortations of this sort would be unnecessary. We have not the spirit of the Chinese who turn their backs upon defeated representatives. The games upon the campus are school affairs and every man in the Academy should take this to heart,—that he as well as the members of the nine must bear defeat if it come, and that he as a Phillips man is responsible for the school spirit which, more than anything else, makes victory possible.

Spring Foot-Ball Practice at Lawrenceville.

Columbia has refused to meet Pennsylvania in track sports.

At Iowa College the department of students is considered in making up their grade.

Mr. Joseph Jefferson has accepted an invitation from the Harvard Union to address the Harvard students.

Six of the seven members of the first Yale crew reached the age of seventy years or more.

At a mass meeting of Brown students, \$700 was contributed for athletics.

The report of the Princeton-foot-ball management shows a deficit of \$2,152.09 for the season of 1894.

Brown University is attempting to raise \$72,000 for a building for the use of the Women's College of the University.

Plans are being made at Harvard for the establishment of an infirmary. It has been suggested that the infirmary be run on a co-operative plan.

The Vassar sophomores have just given their annual "Trig" play in celebration of the completion of prescribed mathematics.

The Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association has decided to send a team to Canada this coming summer, to compete with the large colleges and athletic clubs.

The students at Williams will soon

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present a petition to the Faculty and trustees asking that attendance at chapel be made optional.

Princeton and Yale have both refused to arrange base-ball games with Penn. The principle reason given by Princeton was that the games with Penn. occasioned too much bitterness of feeling.

At a recent meeting of the Lawrenceville School it was voted that the wearing of class numerals should be limited to those men who played on their class teams or who have won points for their class in track athletics.

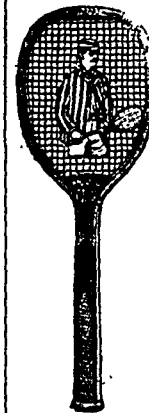
Prof. D. Y. Comstock, for nineteen years professor of Latin at Andover on the John C. Phillips foundation, now assistant master of the Hotchkiss School, Lakeville, Conn., has resigned, the resignation to take effect at the close of the present school year.

The Faculty of the University of Chicago have declared that any student to whose work is attached a condition shall be prohibited from taking part in any university entertainment, athletic or otherwise. The rule is directed especially against the Glee and Mandolin Clubs.

The students of Yale University conduct a very successful "Boys' Club" of 305 members. The average nightly attendance has been about 60. Classes in gymnastics, drawing and military drill are to be formed. From three to five members of the Sophomore Class have been at hand each evening to assist in the work.
