Boston Latin School 6; Andover 0.

The game last Saturday turned out to be a very un auspicious opening of our foot-ball season. To be defeated by a team which heretofore has been the easiest kind of a victim for Andover was certainly humiliating. The only explanation for our defeat is that we were clearly outplayed. Our line had no terrors for the Boston men and they went through it at will. With well directed mass plays on tackle and guard they made steady and sure gains. It would seem as though the line would have to be materially strengthened before the Harvard game if we are to make any kind of a showing. The men seemed to lack life and snap and while it may seem unjust to thus criticise the team in their first game it must be remembered that it was also the first game played by our opponents. There was also a noticeable lack of cheering to spur on the men to greater effort.

Two new men bore the brunt of the game and did exceedingly well. Goodwin and Quimby. The former's fast running and sure tackling stamps him as a valuable acquisition to the team. Quimby also did some good tackling and passed well at quarter. Chadwell proved to be in his old time form, getting some pretty tackles. Allen did the best work of the centre men.

Time was called at 3.40, Boston having the kick-off, Goodwin caught the ball neatly and made a good run of twenty yards, to which he added five more on the next down. Holman followed with ten more and it looked as though we were to have an easy victory, but Boston got the ball on a fumble at the 50 yard line and commenced carrying it down the field by short, quick rushes. Twice Quimby spoiled a long run by hard and low tackling. Boston continued its centre plays and finally succeeded in planting the ball between the posts. A goal was kicked. Score 6-0.

Andover kicked off and the Boston half back was well tackled by Mull. Boston was forced to kick on the third down. Mull got the ball but was downed in his tracks. Goodwin advanced the ball 6 yards by two plunges into the centre. Here Andover was forced to kick. The kick was badly aimed and struck the line but Quimby secured it. Goodwin was sent round the end for 10 yards and Holman through the centre for fifteen.

Andover was unable to make any further gain and Boston was given the ball. She fared no better and was forced to kick. Goodwin caught the ball and was off like a flash running 20 yards before he was downed. After a few short rushes time was called on Boston's 25 yard line.

When Andover came on the field for the second half several changes were noticed. Capt. Young took his position at the right end, Newcombe gave way to Schrieber on the other end, Chadwell taking Holman's place and Manning, Quimby's at quarter. Andover kicked off and the Boston man was downed in his tracks. Boston was forced to kick on three downs but regained the ball on a fumble and began forcing the ball down the field. Mull was hurt in a scrimmage and his place was taken by Phillips. Boston kept up her short dives through the centre gaining at every play and time was called with the ball on Andover's 25 yard line. Captain Tyler is to return to school next week when it is probable the managers of the Track Association will be appointed and more definite arrangements for a fall meeting completed.

There are at present nine of last year's track team in school, Tyler, (Capt.), H. Gaskill, Richardson, Duntton, Senn, Forsaith, Palmer, A. W. Manning, and Williams. With this material, and with the co-operation of the new men, it is hoped a good team may be developed in the spring. The fall tournament is held chiefly for the purpose of developing new material, and it is essential that all who have any ability on the track and the athletic field, unite in the interests of a successful meeting.

It gives us great pleasure to print in this issue a letter from the Lawrenceville School. The success with which the experiment of exchanging these bi-weekly letters has met, has, in our opinion, been assured, and we do not hesitate to place before the school tidings of interest from Andover's athletic rival of recent years.

It was encouraging to see so many new men present at the meetings which have been held for candidates for the PHILLIPIAN Board. We trust that no one is under the impression that absence from these previous meetings prevents his entering the competition for places on the Board of Editors. If the intention is certified to the Managing Editor, instructions may be gained from him by those who are desirous of beginning work.

It is essential to the management of a successful school newspaper that it receive abundant literary support from the school it represents. For this reason we hope that the competition for the PHILLIPIAN this year will be marked, both for literary merit and for a spirit of energy and earnestness on the part of competitors. It is probable that two or three men will be elected to the Board toward the end of the term, if sufficient ability is shown by the candidates. The customary rules observed in composition work will be adhered to. Work may be dropped in the box in the lower hall of the Academy building and should be handed in at least three times a week, if a man's name is to come up for election.

The school literary monthly, the *Mirror*, has organized for the year and begun active work. The magazine has held a deservedly prominent place in the Academy as expressive of the student literary life. An outgrowth of the old *Philo Mirror*, a magazine which combined the functions of the present monthly and the school annual, the *Mirror* has behind it a record in which a preparatory school may

well feel pride. The editors have at heart the ultimate success of the *Mirror* and with just reason look to the school at large for the best expression of its literary talents and inclinations within the covers of their magazine.

The scope of the *Mirror's* work may be best explained within the limits of story writing, poems, essays, and book reviews. It has been considered advisable to institute a prize competition during the present term for the purpose of creating a further interest in literary work on the part of contributors. So commendable a move calls for a hearty response from those who have literary inclinations. The spirit of true literary effort written on the pages of a literary magazine has an immeasurable influence for culture and refinement, and to cultivate this spirit in its essence, earnest, consecrated efforts on the part of the many are due the *Mirror*.

The disgrace of Saturday's defeat must be apparent to every man in school. Such a defeat has marred Andover's record for the first time in her football history, and may well cause feelings of dismay. But it is not our purpose to criticize or condemn unduly. If we can arouse out of apparent lethargy and disorganization a spirit for harder and more sacrificing efforts, we shall deem our task well done. From this day on to the close of the season, every man in school must nerve himself to the task. The eleven has started out under the direction of a most efficient coach, and we believe, has the right spirit behind it. It remains for the men on the campus to *play* as never before, and for those on the bleachers to *cheer* as never before. The school must from this time forth unite in the spirit of school patriotism, for the support of its team, financial and otherwise. The eleven is capable of great improvement as team work advances, but only the heartiest co-operation and the hardest, most persistent efforts will make up for the lack of weight and the inexperience which characterizes this year's team.

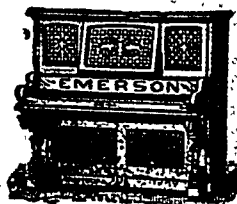
