M. I. T. 14; Andover 0.

In the midst of a drizzling rain which made it uncomfortable for players and spectators alike, we were defeated by M. I. T. on Saturday. Our men were evidently not good wet weather players, while the rain did not seem to bother our opponents or prevent them from making large gains though our line. The backs played a good game considering the support they received. There was no interference so that Tech. men could plunge through and get the runner before he could gain a yard. Andover's line was also weak. The same line which held the heavy Tufts and Bowdoin men fell down easily to the attacks of the Tech. backs. Tech. on the other hand had fairly good interference and the line made good holes for the backs to plunge through. Captain Young, Chadwell, Wickes and Sands did Andover's best work, while Hayden, Howland and Heckle played the best game for Tech.

Tech. kicked off and Sands caught the ball gaining 10 yards before he was downed. Being unable to gain, Andover was forced to kick, but Underwood returned the kick, Young catching it on the 80 yard line. Andover then pounded the Tech. line, but being unable to gain, the ball went to Tech. It was then forced down the field to the 10 yard line by end and centre plays, but by a fumble Tech. lost it. By end plays of Holman and Sands, Andover gained 15 yards but failed on the next four downs, Tech. getting the ball. Andover's centre was then attacked for three and four yards at a time, so that the ball was gradually forced down the field and over the line for a touchdown. Worcester kicked a goal. Score, 6-0.

Howland caught Andover's kick-off and gained 20 yards. Underwood punted but Andover failed to gain and so was forced to kick. The ball went outside and Young fell on it. The team then took a brace and gained 15 yards on centre plays, but the ball soon went to Tech. on downs. Underwood punted when time was called with the ball in the middle of the field.

The only change in the team in the second half was the substitution of Allen for Johnson at left guard. Tech. gained five yards on Andover's kick-off. Underwood punted. An-

dover then made small gains through the centre but was soon forced to give up the ball. The ball then changed hands a number of times, but Andover fumbling, Underwood made another touchdown by a 10 yard run. Worcester failed on the try for goal. Score, 10-0.

Howland caught Andover's kick-off but was at once downed by Wickes. Tech. made two centre gains and then their right-half gained 20 yards around the left end by excellent interference. After three more centre plays Tech. lost the ball. Holman failed to gain and Sands punted. On four downs Andover got the ball again. But still Andover could make no gains either around the ends or through the centre, so the ball was given to Tech. At this point of the game Andover's line was the object of a fierce attack of the Tech's backs and a series of centre plays results in the ball being pushed over the line just as time was called. Worcester failed to kick the goal.

Preliminary Catalogue.

The preliminary catalogue appeared yesterday and shows a total enrolment of 448 students in the Academy. The classes are divided up as follows: Classical department, Seniors 112, Middlers 62, Junior Middlers 64, Juniors 39; scientific department, Seniors 44, Middlers 73, Junior Middlers 44, Juniors 10; total, 448. Massachusetts leads in point of representation with 134 students, New York is second with 72, Connecticut third with 33, and Illinois fourth with 26. The list of professors and teachers numbers twenty, including the two additions made this fall.

In consideration of the fact that many applications were refused this year on account of lack of accommodations, it will be seen that the school has experienced no great decrease in membership.
