BOSTON COLLEGE-ANDOVER.

The home Team loses by Score of 14 to 8

Through lack of team work and in ability to break up mass plays, Andover was again defeated last Saturday. The men lacked that snappy playing which has characterized their work during practice. The ends were deplorably weak. The backs put up a strong game and somewhat atoned for the weakness of the line men. Quinby's tackling and all-around work was the feature of the game. McGillicuddy and White did effective work for the visitors.

Time was called at 3.45, Andover having the kick-off. Long caught the ball and gained five yards before he was downed by Funk. Boston then commenced to encircle the ends. A double pass was tried with success and the ball was brought to Andover's 5-yard line. Andover held for three downs, but Graingle was then pushed through the centre for a touch-down.
