## BOSTON COLLEGE--ANDOVER.

The home Team loses by Score of 14 to 6.  
Poor Team Work.

Through lack of team work and inability to break up mass plays, Andover was again defeated last Saturday. The men lacked that snappy playing which has characterized their work during practice. The ends were deplorably weak. The backs put up a strong game and somewhat atoned for the weakness of the line men. Quinby's tackling and all-around work was the feature of the game. McGillicuddy and White did effective work for the visitors.

Time was called at 3.45, Andover having the kick-off. Long caught the ball and gained five yards before he was downed by Funk. Boston then commenced to encircle the ends. A double pass was tried with success and the ball was brought to Andover's 5-yard line. Andover held for three downs, but Graingle was then pushed through the centre for a touch-down. Vahey kicked a goal. Score 6 to 0.

Graingle caught Elliot's kick-off and Quinby tackled after a run of 20 yards. In two successive plays, Funk broke through and tackled the runner for a loss. On the next play, Boston fumbled and Funk secured the ball for Andover. White made a brilliant run of 25 yards around left end. Here Andover was given 10 yards for off-side play, but immediately lost the ball on downs. Boston tried several criss cross plays with great success. In a few more plays, White scored the second touch-down. Vahey failed at goal. Boston gained but little from the kick-off and the ball remained in the middle of the field for the rest of the half.

In the second half, Barker took Elliot's place. On the kick-off, Barker ran 10 yards. Funk followed with fifteen more. The Boston men held firm and obtained the ball on downs. White made a splendid run of 40 yards around Cady's end for a touch-down. Vahey again failed at goal. Barker kicked off to McGillicuddy who ran 26 yards before he was downed. Boston netted 20 yards, but on a fumble, Funk secured the ball. Cady gained 5 yards around right end which was followed up by telling gains by White, Barker and Rogers. After a few more plays, Rogers went through right guard for a touch-down. Barker kicked a goal.

Boston's kick-off was fumbled and Murphy dropped on the ball. On the second down Boston punted. Cady carried the ball to the centre of the field. Barker punted 35 yards. McGillicuddy caught but was downed in his tracks by Cady. Time was called with the ball in Andover's territory.

## LAWRENCEVILLE LETTER.

Honor System Adopted. Foot-ball Schedule.

LAWRENCEVILLE, N. J. }  
Oct. 11, 1896. }

The class of '97 has just inaugurated a system entirely new to Preparatory schools, namely the "Honor System." The object of this is to abolish cheating forever in examinations by members of this class, and to obtain for the future graduating classes, the privilege of conducting their tests as gentlemen of honor, without the supervision of a master.

The Fourth Form now will have the chance to show that they are both old enough, and have moral strength enough to live up to their agreement with the Faculty, and from now on we are sure there will be no dishonesty among the members of '97.

The prospects of a successful foot-ball season are not very bright at present. Captain Mattis was injured and has decided to retire permanently from the team. To counterbalance this however, Richards, last year's guard has consented to come out and captain the team. The line is much lighter than usual, and the loss of Dibble and Davis behind the line will be greatly felt.

The men seem to suffer from inexperience and lack of knowledge of the game, but great trust is reposed in C. E. Street, the head coach, a brother of W. B. Street who trained the teams of '94 and '95 so successfully.

The team has played only three games up to the present date, winning once, and being defeated twice. The scores were: Lawrenceville, 6, Princeton Scrub, 18; Lawrenceville, 8, New Jersey Athletic Club 4; Lawrenceville, 0, Princeton Scrub, 19.

Lawrenceville expects to put a very strong team upon the track this year. Of course Dibble's loss in the long jump and dashes will be felt, but there is some very good material in the school for all the events.

The baseball outlook is very prom-

ising, for of last year's team there are back in school, Captain Mattis, Arrott, Drake, Green, Cadwalader and Hastie.

Righter's position at second base will be very hard to fill, but it is hoped that some new men will show themselves capable of filling this vacancy. In tennis a subscription tournament was in progress all last week. Hastie '97, and Van Rensselaer '97 are to play off the finals this week, immediately after which the doubles will be commenced.
