**Andover-6, M. I. T.-6.**

On the campus last Wednesday, M. I. T. and Andover played an exciting game which resulted in a tie. Owing to the slippery condition of the field, Tech had a decided advantage over her lighter opponents and used it with telling effect. In the first half it seemed impossible for Andover to resist the mass plays which M. I. T. directed against the line, but in the second half matters were reversed and the home team not only held their adversaries when necessary, but pushed them down the field for a touchdown. Simmons, Clemmens, Burdick and Schrieber made their first appearance and did good work; Burdick and Schrieber showing up especially well. Quinby played his usual good game at quarter. For Tech, Sanchez and Underwood put up the best game behind the line and Wheeler in the line did some pretty tackling.

Time was called at 4.15 with Andover in possession of the ball. Sauchez caught the kick-off and gained seven yards. By steady rushes through the line, the ball was advanced to Tech's 40 yard mark, when it was forfeited to Andover on downs. Burdick gained his length through left guard and tackle, followed by Barker for two yards more. The next play proved ineffective and Barker was forced to kick. Underwood fumbled, Holladay recovering it for Andover. M. I. T. took a brace and regained the ball on their 25 yard line. They found a weak spot in Andover's center and pounded it effectively. On the second down, with the ball on the 35 yard line, Technology lost it for off-side play. Andover was unable to gain and Barker punted for 30 yards. Again Tech worked the center and carried the ball to Andover's 2 yard line. On the next play Underwood fumbled, and Barker dropped on the ball behind the line. For some reason, what should have been a touch-back, was called a safty and M. I. T. was credited with two points. The ball was brought to the 25 yard mark where Barker kicked off. During the rest of the half Andover's goal was free from much danger.

In the second half M. I. T. substituted Brown for Nesmith at left tackle and Andover, Abbott for Bartley at left guard. Underwood kicked off to Barker, who behind good interference, ran 20 yards. Ellis and Bur-

dick made good gains through the line, and Barker encircled left end for 24 yards. Tech held well and recovered the ball on downs. The Boston backs bucked the line to good advantage and gradually worked the ball down the field to Andover's three yard line, when Underwood scored a touchdown. The attempt at goal failed. Barker kicked off to Emery, Schrieber tackling in good form. Sanchez and Underwood tried the center without success, and it was Andover's ball on downs. Barker made a slight gain, and aided by Funk's 15 yards through the left tackle, and plunges through the line by Ellis, the ball was placed on the visitors 15 yard line. On the next play Burdick made a brilliant run around left end for a touchdown. Barker kicked goal. Score 6-6. Schrieber caught Underwood's kick-off and covered 10 yards. Burdick encircled left end for 30 yards. Ellis gained through centre. Barker then punted to Sauchez. M. I. T. kicked on the second down and Quinby dropped on the ball. After a few plays, time was called with the ball in Andover's possession in Tech's territory.

Too much cannot be said in condemning the habit of crowding over the foot-ball field while the team is at practice. Any man who has the welfare of the school, as regards the foot-ball question, at heart is duty bound to give the team the best possible chance to exercise itself. The fact that the police force is not always present at daily practice should not prevent the same state of affairs existing as at the scheduled games when all are at the side-lines behind the ropes.

## The October Mirror,

The October *Mirror* which appeared Wednesday evening is a very presentable number and reflects much credit on its editors and contributors. The only thing to be regretted is that one of its stories has been plagiarized from a contemporary monthly magazine and except in setting and detail is almost a direct copy. This is a matter in which the *Mirror* editors should exercise the sharpest scrutiny to avoid as there is nothing more discreditable to a magazine than this. Otherwise the editors are to be commended for their efforts and we think they should not be too severely criticised for what was certainly an oversight on their part. The opening article is by A. W. Ryder 94, and is a strong appeal for the introduction of the game of chess in preparatory schools.

Mr. Ryder's article is very interesting, particularly to those who participate in the school tournaments and we hope

that it will arouse a further interest in the game in school. Chess is a game which always appeals to intelligent men and wherever it is found is a sure sign of culture for as Mr. Rykor says "A fool can't play it, and a sport won't." "Left in a Crater" is a well written story, and shows considerable merit in its dialogue, but it lacks in depth and plot. "Sindibad" however is very good, both in its setting and general description. It is a modern version of the old Arabian Night's "Sinbad", and the author has very cleverly satirized the Arabian merchant's character.

The editorial columns form an important part of the issue and contain a strong and impartial argument in favor of a renewal of the Andover-Exeter contests. The rest of the editorials are very good also, as are the "Mirage" and "History of the Month"

All in all the whole number is very good and the managing department is to be congratulated on the promptness and expediency with which it was gotten out. It is to be hoped that remaining numbers will come out with equal regularity and despatch as great dissatisfaction was occasioned last year by the *Mirror's* failure in these respects.

This property supplements the Hull gift of \$1,000,000 for biological laboratories by giving the University the finest island lake biological experiment station in the world. Such a station will be of great benefit to the biologist of the country. The property is the gift of Mrs. Edward Roby, Mr. C. B. Shedd and Mr. E. A. Shedd, of Chicago.

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
