LAWRENCEVILLE 12; ANDOVER 4.

Andover puts up a grand game but superior kicking wins the game for Lawrenceville.

TRENTON, N. J., Nov. 20. The third annual foot-ball game between Andover and Lawrenceville was played at Lawrenceville yesterday afternoon and resulted in a victory for the latter, although Andover played a strong steady game and clearly out-played their opponents at nearly every point of the game. Twice she had the ball within a few yards of the line but Lawrenceville held firmly and Andover failed to gain the required ground. Lawrenceville was slightly heavier in the line and put up a splendid defence at critical points. Andover was very weak at kicking and the backs fumbled miserably, all of which defects Lawrenceville took prompt advantage of and thereby won the game.

The day was a perfect one for the game and the field was in splendid condition. Many Princeton men were present and Governor Griggs of New Jersey watched the contest from the side lines.

The game was called at 3 o'clock and Lawrenceville won the toss and chose the east goal having a strong wind behind her. Elliot kicked off for Andover but it was a very weak attempt. Lawrenceville returned the kick to Quinby who fumbled and Lawrenceville fell on the ball. Cadwalader gained 10 yards through the centre and then the Lawrenceville backs pounded the line until they had advanced the ball to Andover's 4-yard line. Here Andover held firm and secured the ball on downs. Elliot only kicked 20 yards and McCord then made an attempt at a goal from the field but failed. The ball was taken out to the 25-yard line and Elliot kicked to Mattis who was downed in the middle of the field.

Here Cleveland made a beautiful run of 25 yards around Andover's end and then Lay made a quarter-back kick which advanced the ball to Andover's 10-yard line. Cadwalader first gained 3 yards and was then pushed over the line for a touchdown just six minutes after play had begun. Cadwalader kicked an easy goal. Score 6 0

Elliot kicked off to Mattis who returned the kick. Here Andover was given 10 yards for interference with the centre. An exchange of punts

followed and Andover secured the ball and repeatedly made gains of 5 and 10 yards through the tackle. They were then given 10 yards more for interference and Burdick on the next play made a run of 25 yards round the end. Here Lawrenceville was off-side and Andover got 5 yards. White made a plunge through the center for 8 yards which advanced the ball to Lawrenceville's 10-yard line. He then made a pretty run around Dudley's ends for a touchdown. Elliot failed at goal. Score 6-4.

Lawrenceville resorted to a kicking game for the remainder of the half and when time was called had the ball in her possession not far from Andover's line.

Lawrenceville kicked off at the beginning of the second half to Quinby, but regained the ball shortly after for off-side play. Cleveland and Kafer then made good gains but Lawrenceville was then compelled to kick. Andover in turn punted to Lay and McCord made a second trial from the field, this time from the 30-yard line, but again failed and Andover kicked off from her own 25-yard line. In the next play Elliot was injured and Barker took his place. After several centre plays White made a beautiful run for 30 yards around right end but was tackled by Lay on Lawrenceville's 10-yard line.

On the next play however Lawrenceville secured the ball on a foul but immediately lost it themselves on a fumble. It was Andover's ball again on Lawrenceville's 5-yard line but Lawrenceville held firm and Andover failed to gain the required ground. McCord then punted but the kick was partially blocked. The Lawrenceville ends were down the field in an instant, and Dudley securing the ball after a fumble by Andover, ran the whole length of the field for a touchdown. Cadwalader kicked the goal. Score Lawrenceville 12, Andover 4.

After Andover had kicked off the play was very even for the remainder of the game, and when time was called it had become so dark the players could hardly be distinguished.

Items of Interest at Worcester Academy.

Our foot-ball season closed Nov. 7th with a glorious victory, considering the marks in the previous games. The team went into the game with Exeter with the "do or die" spirit and we had practically won the game in the first few minutes of play. The eleven has steadily improved ever since the season began. At the beginning of the year there was only one old player and most of the candidates were inexperienced men. It was gratifying to see as a result of the seasons work, the exhibition of strong playing against a good team. On the whole the season has been a success although one of the most important games was lost.

The debating societies of the school, the Legomathenian Society and the Sigma Zeta Kappa, have begun their work for the winter. Many new members have been added to their rolls and three or four meetings have already been held.

The musical organizations have been taken hold of with a great deal of enthusiasm. Quite a number of fellows have registered with the glee club showing their desire to sing. Mr. Bailey has been elected leader. Many others have handed in their names for the orchestra, the banjo and mandolin clubs. Sometime during the winter term a concert will be given in which all the clubs will take part. The rehearsals at present will be in preparation for that event.

A German club has recently been formed in school. Conversation and reading will take up most of the time of the meetings. The president is a German and also among the members are many of the Faculty who have lived in Germany. On election day a note was taken to find out the feeling in school in regard to the presidential candidates. The result was a sweeping majority for McKinley and Hobart. The regular work in the gymnasium began last week.

H. Richards, Jr. '97, Captain, left guard. This makes his second year on the school eleven. Age, 18 years; height 5 ft. 11 in.; weight 168 pounds.

P. J. Cadwalader, '97, has played right guard on the foot-ball team for the past three years. Age 20 years; height 6 ft. 2 1-2 in.; weight 225 pounds.

G. M. Wattes, '97, left tackle. Age 18 years; height 6 ft. 1 in.; weight 165 pounds. He will captain the base-ball team this Spring.

S. A. Dodds, '96, right tackle. Age 18 years; height 5 ft. 11 1-2 in. weight 160 pounds. This is his first year on the eleven.

C. R. Dodds, '97, plays left end on the team. Age 17 years; height 5 ft. 9 in.; weight 142 pounds.

C. Dudley, '97, occupies the position of right end. This makes his second season of foot-ball. Last year he was a member of the track team. Age 18 years; height 5 ft. 7 10 in.; weight 144 pounds.

A. E. Arrott, '98, full back. Age 19 years; height 5 ft. 9 in.; weight 160 pounds. Arrott has pitched on the ball nine for the past three years.

J. K. Adams, '97, plays half back on the team. This is his first year. Age 18 years; height 5 ft. 8 in.; weight 148 pounds.

C. Cleveland, Jr. '99, half back. Age 16 years; height 5 ft. 8 in.; weight 155 pounds.

J. D. Kafer, '99, is the left back. Age 16 years; height 5 ft. 10 in.; weight 155 pounds. Kafer plays on the team this year for the first time.

H. McCord, '98, fills the position of full back. This is his first year on the team. Age 16 years; height 5 ft. 9 1-2 in.; weight 180 pounds.

J. Dana, '99, center rush. Age 17 years; height 5 ft.; weight 175 pounds. This is his first year of foot-ball.

Charles Grilk, '94, has been chosen to represent Harvard in the intercollegiate debate with Princeton. He was an alternate in the Yale-Harvard debate in '95.

The *Yale Epitome*, a new periodical, has just appeared. It is to be published, annually and deals solely with college publications, its aim being to reprint representative articles from each.

Thirty-four candidates for the Harvard base-ball team have been practicing batting and fielding under Captain Dean for the last three weeks. During the last few days a short game has been played every afternoon.

F. B. Smith, '93, H. W. Letton, '94, and G. C. Greenway, '95, lead the batting average of the Yale nine in the championship series with Princeton. J. J. Hazen, '94, and F. T. Murphy, '93, are respectively second and third in the fielding average.
