Latin Commons 6; Phillips St. 0.

Latin Commons for the second consecutive year won the Street Team Football Championship Tuesday afternoon by defeating Phillips Street 6-0. The campus was in wretched condition but in spite of this fact both teams put up remarkably strong game. The Phillips Street line seemed at times unable to withstand the fierce attacks of the Latin Commons backs and her ends were also found wanting on several occasions. Clemons, French and Olney did the best work for Latin Commons, while Davison and Jameson played best for Phillips Street.

Phillips Street kicked off and Latin Commons rushed the ball back to the centre of the field but there lost it on downs. Phillips Street could not gain and Weston kicked to Chapman. C. L. carried the ball down the field by short rushes, and Billings made a touchdown from which French kicked the goal. Score 6-0.

Phillips Street kicked off again and immediately afterward got the ball on a fumble and rushed to the twenty yard line. Here Latin Commons held firm and soon carried the ball out of danger.

In the second half neither side scored although Phillips Street twice had the ball on Latin Commons fifteen yard line. The game closed with the ball in Latin Commons possession on Phillips Street's ten yard line.

Class Meeting.

At a class meeting of P. A. and P. S. '97, Tuesday, the report of the Photographic Committee was made and after considerable discussion it was decided to postpone the awarding of the contract until other Photographers were heard from.

Latin Commons 12; Morton St. 0.

At 3.30 Saturday afternoon Latin Commons and Morton Street played the first game of the Street Championship series with the above result. Latin Commons played a hard and steady game throughout, at no time allowing her goal to be endangered. Morton Street on the contrary played without snap or life, allowing her opponents to go through the line or encircle the ends almost at will.

In the first half Morton Street was unable to gain possession of the ball. Manning kicked off to Latin Commons who carried the ball back 25 yards before being downed. A succession of end and center plays left the ball on Morton Sts. 5 yard line and on the next play Billings was pushed over for the first touchdown. French kicked an easy goal.

The second touchdown was made five minutes later by Corse in the same way. Time was called for the first half with the ball on Morton Sts. 25 yard line in Latin Commons possession. Score 12-0.

In the second half Morton St. took a brace and after the ball had changed hands repeatedly on downs, time was called with the ball near the centre of the field, neither side having scored during the half. The American School at Rome.

The great interest which Americans have always felt in the historical treasures of Italy and Greece has been lately evinced in the American school of Classical studies which was established at Rome in October, a year ago. Professor Frothington of Princeton, who was instrumental in instituting the school, is secretary of the executive committee, and Mr. C. C. Cuyler is Treasurer. Professor Marquand is at the head of the department of art and archaeology and is giving courses in Pagan and Christian Archaeology.

The school entered upon the second year of its existence about the middle of last October with every promise of success, a number of students having signified their intention of pursuing studies there. Besides the course offered by Professor Marquand, the following will be given: in Italian lectures on the Catacombs by Professor Marucchi, and a course in Numismatics, at the Vatican, by Professor Stevenson. In German: Prof. Hulsén will direct a study of Topography, and Professor Warren also will have charge of a course in Palaeography with practical work on the manuscripts in the Vatican Library. Somewhat less than five thousand dollars was spent upon the library last year in addition to the many donations received, and a smaller appropriation was made for the ensuing year. It

was intended to commence diggings near the Coliseum, so that students might have the advantage of original investigation and work in untried fields, but the Italian authorities do not allow any foreigners such privileges. Professor Warren of Johns Hopkins University, the Director, hopes to take the students on an extended trip through Italy, but definite plans have not yet been made. The more important places near Rome, however, may be seen, and students are encouraged to spend two months in Greece under the care of the Director of the American School at Athens. —Lx.

Because of the Thanksgiving recess the PHILLIPIAN will not be issued on next Saturday.

With the close of the Street Team Foot-ball games the fact has been noted that all the teams have been considerably injured, because players from the Scrub eleven have been allowed to step in at the last moment and take part in the championship games.

As the series begins immediately after the first team's season is over the Scrub men are given only a very few days to learn the signals and to practice with the street team. Good teamwork is thus totally lacking; individual playing only can be accomplished.

It is true that the scrub men have had hard daily practice with the first team, but nevertheless team work is the result only of many weeks training and cannot be obtained in two or three days.

An injustice is done to those men who have faithfully worked during the whole season only to be crowded out at the last moment by men from the Scrub eleven. This impairing feature should be abolished next year.

The second game in the championship series resulted in a victory for Phillips Street in a loosely played contest.

In the first half Salem Street could gain but little while Phillips Street back-went through the line almost at will, and touch-downs were scored by Jameson, Davison and Weston. O'Brien kicked one goal, making the score 14 to 0 in Phillips Street's favor.

In the second half Salem Street kicked off and Phillips Street brought the ball back 40 yards but lost it on downs and after a few short gains, Goodchild on a double pass ran sixty yards for a touch-down. No goal was kicked. There was no more scoring, and the game closed with ball in Salem Street's possession on Phillips Street's fifteen yard line. For Phillips Street, Jameson Davison and Long played the best game; Goodchild and Boynton did well for Salem Street.
