Chess Club Tournament.

The Fall tournament of the Chess Club was finished on Monday and won by H. M. Russell '98, with J. M. Morgan '98 second. At the start there were twenty-one entries, divided into three divisions. The winners were Russell, Locke, Morgan, Amsden and Lindenburg. These five players constituted the finals, which resulted in a tie between Russell, Morgan and Locke, each having won three matches and lost one. On the play-off Russell won, and Morgan and Locke tied for second. By toss, Morgan gained second place.



W. D. Osgood, the Pennsylvania half-back, was killed while besieging a fort in Cuba.

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


The last literary meeting of Philo for this term will be held next Friday evening in Society Hall. The programme is as follows:

The committee of overseers of Harvard college on composition and rhetoric, after an examination of the entrance papers of last year found a deplorable amount of illiteracy among the students just from preparatory schools. They saw that this college had before it work which should have been done in "prep" schools. Much money, time and energy was to be spent in teaching what should have been taught in their preparation for college. Prof. Goodwin says: "There was no conceivable justification for using the revenues of Harvard college or the time and strength of her instructors in a vain attempt to enlighten the Egyptian darkness in which no small portion of her under-graduates were sitting." And the committee further proposes to print this year the papers of all candidates applying for admission, thus comparing the method in the different preparatory schools, and bringing in this way before the public eye the true state of affairs.
