Chess Tournament.

The regular winter tournament of the Chess Club will commence this afternoon, Jan. 13th. There were twenty entries, which have been divided into four sections of five men each. The two winners in every division will play together in the finals, and the four with the highest final score will represent Andover in the match with Worcester Academy to be held about the first of March.

Each man is to play one game with every man in his division. These games must be played on the day scheduled, otherwise they will count as a loss for both parties. The results of the games, signed by both players, should be dropped in the box in the lower hall not later than Chapel of the day after they are played. The time-limit will be fifteen moves to the hour. The preliminary rounds will close Tuesday, Jan. 19.

S. L. Fuller, '94, H. '98, has been elected manager of the Harvard University football eleven.

By the will of the late Henry F. Pierce, a bequest of \$50,000 is left to Harvard College.

The faculty of Amherst College has refused to allow the Senior Dramatics to take a trip during the Easter vacation.

A conference of eleven western university presidents is being held at Madison, Wis., at which some important action on foot-ball is expected to be taken. A team from Missouri University has made a trip South this winter without faculty permission and this has caused some commotion in western foot-ball matters. President Jesse of the University of Missouri is known to favor the abolition of the game and is expected to press a resolution to that effect. As he is known to have some support among the other presidents, the result of the meeting is awaited with interest.

The University of Pennsylvania crew will row the Naval Cadets at Annapolis on May 29.

The Yale hockey team will play Princeton at the St. Nicholas' rink, New York, on Feb. 22.

The University of Wisconsin has accepted the challenge of the University of Pennsylvania to row a race on the Schuylkill River.

Permission has been granted by the U. of P. faculty to the baseball team to make an extended tour in the South. They will start on April 9 and return on April 18.

The new Dormitory to be erected at Columbia University will be named after Alexander Hamilton, who graduated from that institution.

The Boston Athletic Association is planning to hold a "Marathon race" on Patriot's Day, April 19. The course will be from Boston to Framingham.

Candidates for the University of Pennsylvania crew began practice the first part of this week. Four of last year's crew are back.

James Murray of New York has been engaged as professor of fencing at Yale. He has arrived and taken charge of the candidates for the fencers' team at the university. Yale has accepted the invitation to enter the inter-collegiate fencers' tournament, which will be held during the Easter vacation. It will take place in the Fencers' Club, New York City.

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
