Lawrenceville Letter.

LAWRENCEVILLE, N. J.,
JAN. 25, 1897.

The most important Athletic event which has taken place recently was the meeting held at the Hotel Colonnade in Philadelphia, last Thursday Jan. 21st for the purpose of forming an interscholastic track league between Hill-School, St. Paul's and Lawrenceville. Delegations were present from all the above mentioned schools. Messrs. Lane and Dudley represented Lawrenceville. St. Paul's found that it would be impossible for them to enter into a league this year because of the large schedule of games which they have, but a constitution was drawn up by the delegates binding the schools to a three years agreement commencing with next year. The agreement is to hold a meet each year on school grounds only, the first one to be held at Lawrenceville, the second at St. Paul's and the third at Hill-School. Ten events were selected, three men from each school being allowed in every event. If possible a dual meet will be arranged with Hill School for this year.

At a school meeting held last Wednesday the following rules were adopted.

I. No member of the Lawrenceville School shall wear a black sweater or jersey having any stripes measuring less than one inch upon it, unless it be a sweater or jersey representing one of the School teams of which he is a member.

II Only the following shall be allowed to wear the red L.

1 Members and managers of the foot-ball teams. 2 Members of the track team who win a first place or two second places in an outside meet. 3 Any man winning an interscholastic tennis tournament.

III The white L. shall be abolished.

IV The track team monograms shall be red and black.

V The Hockey Team shall be allowed to wear a monogram not in red and black.

A committee was also appointed to revise study-laws of the Athletic Association.

A dinner was given to the men who played in the Exeter game, Saturday night at the Mansion House, by G. P. Elliott '99.

In the B. A. A. indoor games on February 6th Yale is to be matched against Holy Cross in the relay race.

The Harvard athletic committee will issue an official statement of the negotiations for the renewal of athletic relations with Yale in about a week.

It is proposed by the alumni of Hotchkiss School at Yale to present a cup to be contested for by the two athletic associations of the school.

Bryn Mawr College will offer annually eight competitive scholarships (four of the value of \$300 and four of the value of \$200) to candidates presenting themselves for the spring matriculation examinations.

The Pennsylvania intercollegiate oratorical contest will be held in March. The following colleges will be represented: Lehigh, Lafayette, Franklin and Marshall, Ursinus, Gettysburg, Swarthmore and Muhlenburg.

J. P. Hamilton, a blind student at the University of Michigan, holds seven first prize medals for catch-as-catch-can wrestling. He has never been beaten in wrestling inside his own class. He won the state championship at the intercollegiate meet.

The management of the Yale hockey team have just arranged for a series of three games between Yale and Princeton. All three will be played in the Clermont Avenue rink, Brooklyn, a \$300 silver loving cup to be presented to the victors. The dates for the games are Saturday, February 20; Monday 22d, and probably February 27th. The officials are to be appointed later.
