The regular meeting of Philo was held last evening in Society Hall with a fairly good attendance. Prayer was made by Gardner. Tirrell delivered the critique. An extemporaneous speech was made by Freund on the "Custom of having an Annual Senior Banquet." Skinner rendered a declamation, choosing as his subject, "King Robert of Sicily." His delivery was excellent and showed careful preparation. Gardiner followed with an address entitled "Point of View." Eldredge gave a select reading on "The Death and Burial of Buck Benshaw."

The question for debate was, "Resolved, That Senators should be elected by the people." The affirmative was led by Chapman, assisted by Jeffrey; negative by Stebbins, with Williams as assistant. From the house Freund, Perkins, Gardiner, and Nash spoke on the affirmative and Eldridge, Skinner, Wheeler, and Ferry on the negative. The vote before the debate was, affirmative 10, negative 18. Afterwards two ballots brought a tie. The President gave his decision to the affirmative.

## Eligibility Rules at Princeton.

The following eligibility rules have been recently adopted at Princeton.

1. A student coming from another college cannot represent the university in championship games until he has pursued a course of study occupying not less than a year.

2. A student (by this is meant a student not a candidate for a degree) cannot play in any of the championship games until a year after entrance.

3. A student forfeits the privilege of representing the college in athletic contests in case he play, either in term or in vacation, in games at which gate money is taken, as a representative of any other organization.

4. No student under conditions is allowed to engage in championship games. A lightly conditioned student is allowed to play in practice games, but before he can represent the college in championship games every condition must be removed at the time of the above mentioned game.

5. A dropped student shall not be eligible to play on any athletic team for one year after the time he has been dropped—*Yale News*.

The attention of the school was called a few days ago to the approaching trial for the Draper Prizes. It seems therefore appropriate to say a few words at this time concerning the literary side of the school life and to urge the students to take greater interest in this phase of their education. Up to the present time the lower class men have given very little attention to literary work and it is to them that our appeal is chiefly addressed. By them the school publications, papers and literary societies must be carried on in the future, and they must lay hold of the work with a will. In a school of this kind, where athletic spirit is high, literary work is oftentimes given too little support. It should be remembered that Andover has a reputation to maintain in literary fields as well as in athletics. Let the under-class men respond in large numbers both for the support of the papers and the prize competitions, for in a short time everything will have to be given over to their care.

J. H. Bullock, Trinity Cambridge University, put the 16-lb. shot 39 feet 9 inches, on February 17, breaking the university record of 39 feet 1 inch, made in 1886.

A memorial to the late President Walker is soon to be erected by the students of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. It has been decided by a committee of the students to place a bust in the corridor of the Rogers building. This will cost approximately \$1,290, which is to be raised by a subscription among the students. The committee has chosen Daniel C. French to design the memorial. Mr. French is a sculptor of "The Minute Man" at Concord and was a close friend of Gen Walker.

Yale and Harvard reached an agreement on Saturday for their football game this year. It is to be played at New Haven on Nov. 13. As the Yale-Princeton game is to be played on Nov. 20 it is now improbable that Harvard will meet Princeton this year. Since Nov. 13 and 20 are both taken, the only remaining date is Nov. 6. This, however, would compel Harvard to play three games in as many weeks, as the Pennsylvania-Harvard game has been arranged for the same date as the Yale-Princeton game.

The Faculty at Yale has voted not to allow the annual Freshman-Sophomore base-ball game this year, in consequence of so-called undignified conduct on the part of the Freshman and Sophomores, on Washington's birthday. The Faculty has given notice to the effect that students must have a higher scholarship average to compete in the athletic contests. This bars out many of Yale's best athletes.

Yale has formally challenged Princeton to a foot-ball game to be played on the Saturday before Thanksgiving, at a place to be decided later, preferably neutral grounds.

The Columbia Alumni are collecting funds for a building to be called the "Alumni Memorial Hall," on the new University grounds.

The Faculty of Brown University will exempt all members of the Senior class from final examinations, whose standing has been sufficiently high.

The University Glee Club of New York City, composed of college graduates, will give its second concert on April 29th, in the Madison Square Garden Concert Hall.

Harvard will enter three relay teams at the B. C. A. A. games on March 11. One will compete with Georgetown, another with Williams and a freshman team will meet a team from Exeter.

At the annual dinner of the Cornell Alumni Association of New York, held last Saturday night, \$2,400 was subscribed to defray the crew expenses for the coming year.

The current number of *Harper's Round Table* contains an excellent illustrated article on the prospects of the interscholastic meet to be held in Mechanics' Hall, this afternoon.

The Cullis Indian School has applied for admission to the relay races to be held at Franklin Field, Philadelphia, on April 25. It is likely they will be asked to run in the four mile relay race in which the University of Pennsylvania, Harvard and probab'y Yale will compete.

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
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
