## Lawrenceville Letter.

LAWRENCEVILLE, N. J. }  
MARCH 8, 1897. }

The class of '97 held its mid-winter promenade on Washington's birthday. Owing to the lateness of the debate, the dancing did not begin until 10 o'clock and continued until 2 o'clock. It was a thoroughly successful and brilliant affair, the excellent music being one of the prominent features. The committee for the promenade were, Messrs. Hall, Lane, Lay, Boyd and Serles.

The eighth annual debate between the two school literary societies, Calliopean and Philomathean, was held on the evening of Feb. 22d. The question for debate was, "Resolved, That the immediate annexation of Canada would be beneficial to the United States." The debate was ably and finely argued on both sides, and the board of judges, consisting of Prof. H. B. Scott, Prof. W. H. Smith and Prof. G. S. Patton, all of Princeton University, awarded first, second and third places respectively, to D. V. Hutchings '97 (Philo), F. W. Fort '97 (Calli), and E. L. Fox '98 (Philo).

The Dramatic Club appeared last week in their annual production. Two performances were given, one in the afternoon and the other in the evening. The Club presented a light comedy in four acts, entitled "Josiah's Courtship," adapted by Mr. Raymond.

The Gun Club held a shoot with the De Lancy school at Lawrenceville last Saturday and was defeated by a score of 72 to 60. The weather was most unfavorable for shooting, which accounted in a measure for the poor scores. Fox, for De Lancy, did excellent work, shooting 21 out of his 25 birds.

Track team practice will be begun Monday afternoon in order to get the men in condition for the relay races which will be held in Philadelphia, April 24th. On the fifteenth of May, the team will compete at Princeton in an interscholastic meet, where medals will be given for the first three places of every event.

The first weeding out of the candidates for the base-ball team occurred Monday, fifteen being taken out. There are left now twenty-five men and the out-look for a good team is very promising.

The Hockey team went to New York Saturday night and defeated Cutler's School at the St. Nicholas

rink by a score of 2 goals to 1. The work of Lawrenceville was brilliant and called forth much applause from the spectators who were present.

James W. Brine has received the order for the '98 base-ball team.

The squad of candidates for the Yale Varsity Crew has been reduced to 18.

Pennsylvania was defeated in debate by Cornell Saturday night at Philadelphia.

According to the Princeton catalogue the total enrollment in the University is 1,045.

The Yale-Princeton gymnastic meet will be held on March 26th in the Yale gymnasium.

Arthur Temple Strong, P. A. '92, Yale '96, was married Feb. 20, at Metuchen, N. J., to Helen Gilbert.

Branch '99, Terrill '93, Bristol ex-'96, Chadwell '96 and Edwards '96, are candidates for the Williams base-ball team.

William I. Swoope, of Clearfield, Pa., P. S. '82, Harvard '85, made sixty campaign speeches for the Republican National Committee last fall, and is lecturing this winter on "The Needs of the Hour;" "The Right to Kick;" "The Money Question;" "On Shakespeare."

John D. Rockefeller has made a gift of \$40,000 to Mount Holyoke College. The money will be used in the erection of three cottages for the accommodations of the students.

The following dates have been fixed for the Harvard-Princeton base-ball games: May 15, at Princeton; May 29, at Cambridge; and in case a tie, a third game on neutral grounds June 1 or 2.

Chicago University is outdoing itself in the number of indoor meets being held. It has held one nearly every week. Next Saturday the University and the athletes of the First Regiment hold a dual meet in Chicago's gymnasium.

The New York Alumni will hold their biennial dinner at the Waldorf, Tuesday evening, the 6th of April. The evening is selected to accommodate boys now in the school, who are invited, together with their fathers and other friends.

Cornell is to have a naphtha launch, designed by one of its professors for the purpose of carrying on practical investigations in the department of geology and paleontology. It is expected to have the boat on the lake by the first of May, when short trips will be taken by the classes to various points rich in geological formations.

There is some discussion about holding the Intercollegiate athletic meet in Philadelphia instead of New York this year, as President-elect Shiras and some of the executive committee men are said to favor it. The reason given is that the University of Pennsylvania is better able to take charge of the meet, and it is thought that the attendance there would be increased.
