Letter from J. H. Knapp

NEW YORK CITY,

To the Students at Phillips Academy:

A short time before my removal from Lawrence, Massachusetts, to this City, I was visited by a Committee, who presented me on your behalf with a Loving Cup, which, they said, was indicative of your kindly feelings toward me for my services in connection with the foot-ball team. No one could have rejoiced more in Andover's victory over Exeter than I did, and for the little help which might have been gotten from my association with the team last Fall, I certainly was fully and amply repaid in the joy which came to me from that victory.

The renewed athletic relations with our old rival could not have been more auspiciously inaugurated than by the victory over Exeter, and I hope that this has opened up an era of perpetual good feeling between these two ancient and honorable rivals. In the numerous cares incident to a change of home and of business location, this beautiful testimonial of yours has received a tardy acknowledgment, but my thanks to you are none the less sincere, and I shall always treasure the Cup as a reminder of my pleasant relations with you during the foot-ball season of 1896.

Inquiry will be addressed by several Yale students Sunday evening.

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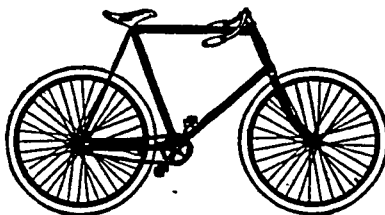

Professor Seymour, chairman of the management committee of the American School at Athens, has announced that the excavations in Greece will be discontinued on account of the threatening war.

The intercollegiate shoot for the cup, offered by "Shooting and Fishing", will be held at Wellington on May 28. Teams will be entered from Yale, Harvard, Princeton, Columbia and University of Pennsylvania.
