ANDOVER-HARVARD 2nd

The Collegians Win a Close Game.
Score 3-1

On Monday afternoon, the spectators were treated to a close, snappy game of ball. For clean sharp playing, it will be difficult to equal the game played by the two teams. Notwithstanding the high wind and unpleasant state of the weather the teams made but four errors all told. The feature of the game was the inability of both sides to hit the pitchers. Fitz was in fine form and pitched a strong game allowing but one hit in nine innings. Hawkins showed up very creditably. He gave six base on balls, but these were scattered through nine innings, which is a marked improvement over his work in previous games. Harvard made only three hits off his delivery.

Elliot, Chapman and French did fine work in the infield. In the outfield Barnwell carried off the honors by three difficult running catches. Coburn, who was tried at first for the first time showed up exceedingly well.

For Harvard Holt, Litchfield and Forster did the best work. Morse and Sears also made some sensational catches of high flies. In the first inning, Fitz struck out the Andover men in order, and Harvard was retired without a man reaching second.

In the next inning Chapman struck out, Stephenson hit a swift one to Fitz who threw it over first and Stephenson reached third and scored on a passed ball. The next two men went out in order. In their half, the visitors scored two runs. Vincent got his base on balls, Litchfield made a hit to left and reached third on Pingree's wild throw and scored a moment later on a close decision by the umpire.

Not an Andover man reached first in the third inning. For Harvard, Sears got his base but was put out at third on a double play by Chapman, Coburn and Elliot.

Neither side did anything of note in the fourth and fifth. In the sixth Hawkins reached second but the next two men were unable to advance him. Harvard scored their third run on a base on balls, a balk, a wild pitch and an error by French.

French was the only man to reach second during the remainder of the game.

There is now in existence, a rule in regard to the Street Teams, which is manifestly unfair, and which, unless attended to at once, will cause trouble again this year. It is that a man who has been at the training table is debarred. This of course gives a fellow who has been taken to the table and very shortly afterwards dropped, no further practice, for another year.

One of the main objects of the street team is to develop material for the 'Varsity.

This rule could be amended by changing it so as to read that those who are at the training table two weeks before the Exeter game shall be excluded.

Unless the managers attend to this immediately, it may become permanent, and cause much more trouble in seasons to come, than it has in the past.

Courtesy to visiting teams is a matter on which it should not be necessary to dwell, yet notwithstanding that only two games have been played on the home grounds there have been several incidents which have brought forward only too distinctly a certain element in the school that must be suppressed. It has been the pride of Andover ever since the establishment of the Academy that all visiting teams have been treated with the utmost politeness. When an error is made by our opponents even though it gives us a decided advantage there should be no ungentlemanly manifestations.

Courteous treatment and generous applause of our opponent's good plays have always been characteristic of Phillips and have greatly aided our management in securing such games as we now have scheduled. We have a reputation to maintain and let no man do anything that will detract from the enviable position Andover holds today, that of a gentlemanly and fair opponent.

Ever since the street teams have been reorganized as distinctive athletic organizations there has always been more or less of disagreeable feeling aroused over the matter of the eligibility rule. Once for all it must be settled. If we are to have any harmony in this matter some plan must be devised which is fair to all concerned and then it will be our duty to live up to it. At the first glance this may not seem to be a very important

matter but it must not be looked upon in such a light. This question should receive due deliberation and personal differences should not be considered. The main object of the street teams is not simply to furnish amusement to fellows, on the contrary it is a part of the school athletics which can not be underestimated, for the experience and development obtained from these teams often furnishes valuable material for the 'Varsity.

Let us consider the most advisable means surmounting this obstacle. It has been suggested in a communication in another column that the rule should be altered so as to read "Any man who is at the training table two weeks before the Final game with Exeter shall be debarred." This seems the only way to overcome the difficulty and at the same time not injure our prospects or lower the standard of the street teams.

A team which has shown so much improvement in so short a time deserves the hearty support of every man in school and there is no excuse for the weak cheering so noticeable during the New Hampshire College and Harvard second games.

The true Andover spirit is to cheer and encourage the players whether ahead or behind and we should feel it our duty to keep that spirit alive at every game.

M. I. T. is to present "Dandy Dick," an English play, April 23, at Boston.

Principal Bancroft attended the meeting of the American Philological Association held in New York Thursday.

Allen '96, Yale '00, bids fair to be a permanent fixture in the 'Varsity boat at No 6.

The Yale track team has twenty men at the training table, and is soon to send twenty more.

Harvard, Cornell and Yale are all to race in cedar boats this year. Yale has formerly used a paper shell.

The board of Control at the University of Chicago is supporting Stagg, its athletic director, in his fight against the A. A. U.

At the Harvard A. A. games Friday, Hollister ran the half mile in 1m 54 2-5s., lowering the Harvard record by 2 2-5s, and Grant did the mile in 4m 27s, which is 1 1-5s better than the Harvard previous record. Starbuck P. A. '84 ran second in the mile.

At Princeton, only those men who play in the Harvard and Yale football games are entitled to wear a University "P".

Lewis '95, Hinkle '95 and Poynter '96 are among the men to represent Yale in the four mile relay race at the U. of P. meet.

Two hundred and ninety two required and elective courses are offered at Princeton. There are also eighty-one peculiar to the Scientific Department.

C. S. Verrill of Yale has broken all strength records by making a total, in a recent test, of 1676; surpassing the totals of 1638 by Chadwick, Yale, and 1623 by Lovering, Harvard.

Statistics from sixty seven colleges in thirty seven states, show that athletic men stand one half per cent higher in their studies than the average of the whole college.

In order to encourage spring practice in football and also to develop kickers, Captain Minds, of Pennsylvania, has offered three prizes, one for the best punt, one for drop kicks and one for place kicks.

A new illustrated monthly magazine entitled "The College Athlete," appeared April 1, devoted to athletics in colleges and preparatory schools. Chase, Hickok, Orton, Cross, Shaw, and others will contribute.

The State University of Washington has the largest athlete of any college in the country. He is a half Indian, weighs 210 pounds, is six feet 6 inches in height, and on foot can capture and throw a mustang pony. A strong effort is being made by the Carlisle Indian school to get him next year for the foot ball team.

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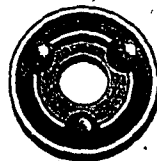
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
