ANDOVER---CRAIGS OF LOWELL

Andover Wins a Close Game. Score 7-6.

An evenly contested game was won by Andover last Saturday. The game was interesting throughout and ended in a highly sensational manner. In the last half of the ninth inning, with two men out and a man on second and third, Ganley came to the bat for the Craigs, and made a low drive over second. Barnwell came in from centre and by one of the most remarkable catches ever seen on the Andover campus retired the side and closed the game, a victory for Andover.

The general play of the team showed marked improvement over the previous game, the errors being kept down to three. A very pretty double play was made by Barnwell and Chapman. The batting of the team was the best since the New Hampshire College game. Andover scored nine hits in all. Pingree and Stephenson led at the bat. Stephenson relieved Hawkins, who split his finger, in the fifth and pitched a good game for two innings. Then Elliot went in the box and was very successful, striking out four men and allowing but one hit. The visitors seemed puzzled by his speedy delivery.

The first two men went out to Kane. Stephenson hit safely, but was put out stealing second. Slines made a hit, took second on Hawkin's error, and scored on a single by Castles. In this inning good team work was displayed by French and Waddell. Castles started for second and Waddell made a short throw to French who returned in time to put Connors out at the plate. Andover made three runs in the second on Chapman's force out, hits by Barnwell and Pingree, and a sacrifice hit by Gilpatrick. The Craigs scored one run in their half. No scoring was done in the third, but in the next inning the Craigs made four runs as a result of two singles, two doubles and two bases on balls. Andover scored four runs in the seventh and practically won the game. Pingree hit safely over second, Gilpatrick and Jones were hit. French made a timely single, sending in Pingree. Gilpatrick and Jones scored on Slines's error. French scored on Stephenson's sacrifice and McCarty's error. No more scoring was done during the remainder of the game.

Slines, Kane and Scot played the best game for the Craigs, while Barnwell, Elliot and Waddell did good work for Andover.

#### Lawrenceville Letter.

LAWRENCEVILLE, N. J. APRIL 26, 1897.

On Saturday evening the seventeenth the idea of a summer camp for the advancement of poor boys from the slums was discussed, and after a number of strong speeches by the masters and the students, unanamously adopted.

It is proposed to select a half-dozen or so of poor boys and to take them for an outing of six or eight weeks. Relays of about the same number of students, who have volunteered, will probably be sent every two weeks.

As far as can be learned Groton is the only American school carrying on a similar work. The utmost is being done towards its success.

The Relay League consisting of four men, Capt. C. T. Dudley, '97; H. T. Willis, '97; T. H. Yard, '99, and C. A. Blythe, Jr., '99, left Lawrenceville on the twenty-third to enter the games given by the University of Pennsylvania.

Our rivals were Pennington, Hill School of Pottstown, Bordentown Military Academy, Shady Side Academy, and the Catholic High School. Our team made the second best time of all preparitory schools, and won its race. Every member received a silver loving cup and the school a banner.

To-day Andover plays one of the hardest games of the season. Dartmouth has established a record even thus early in the year and although we cannot hope to defeat them, nevertheless our showing should be a creditable one. The team gave evidence of its ability to play an "up-hill" game last Saturday, and we are justified in expecting a similar occurrence to-day. If all the fellows would collect on one stand and form a compact mass the cheering would undoubtedly have more effect than if widely scattered. There is one thing in cheering which must be observed, and that is regular time, and snap.

We have been asked to call the attention of the Seniors to the fact that their class day subscriptions will soon come due. It has always been the custom to pay these promptly, and there must be no deviation from the rule this year. The success of the exercises depends more largely upon this matter than might be expected. When all the subscriptions have been paid the committees will have a firm basis whereon to work and can limit or increase their expenditures accordingly.

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The honorary degree of Doctor of Science has been conferred upon Dr. Nansen, the Arctic explorer, by the University of Cambridge.

A special library is to be added to that of the English department at Harvard in memory of Dr. Childs. A large number of volumes has been already received.

Yale's spring football practice began Thursday under the supervision of Bull '89, as coach. Thirty candidates were out.

The Harvard class of '72 will celebrate this year its 25th anniversary, and in connection with it, present s \$6000 clock to be placed in the tower of Memorial Hall.

A special meeting of the N. E. I. S. A. A. will be held in Boston April 30, to act on the proposed amendments to the constitution. These amendments relate to the age limit.

The world's record for the 25 mile road race was broken by J. J. McDermott, in the Marathon games, held under the auspices of the Boston Athletic Association. McDermott's time was 2 hours, 55 minutes and 10 seconds, lowering by 10 seconds the previous record.

It has been announced that the next-meet of the Intercollegiate Athletie Association will be held at Berkeley Oyal on May 28 and May 29. It is easily accessible from New York, and in many ways superior to Manhattan Field, the scene of the contests in the past few years.

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
