Academy Faculty.

A number of changes have been made in the Faculty this year, some only temporary and others final. Prof. Forbes, professor of Latin, has left for a year, when he will return and fill the same place. He has been travelling in Europe all summer with his wife and when last heard from was in Switzerland. He will probably study in Berlin this winter.

Mr. Pettee, instructor in Mathematics and Registrar, will also return in a year and enter upon the same duties. He will be in Europe all the year and will study at Freiburg in Baden, Germany, and at Cambridge University, England.

Mr. Phillips will fill Prof. Forbes' place as head of the Latin department. Mr. Eaton and Mr. Newton will each take part of Mr. Pettee's work. Dr. Bancroft and Miss Abbott will take charge of the Registrar's office.

Dr. Bunn has obtained a position in a school in Ohio. Mr. McClenahan has obtained a fine position at the head of all the missionary schools of Egypt with his headquarters at Asyut. Mr. G. U. Lewis will complete his course at Harvard by taking two years more.

A. W. Ryder, P. A. '94, who obtained his degree of A. B. at Harvard in three years, will take Mr. McClenahan's classes and some of Mr. Phillips'.

Mr. H. I. Ford, who was here year before last, will return and take Dr. Bunn's place as instructor of English. Mr. Brewster will take Mr. Lewis's place as assistant in Chemistry and Physics.

Mirror Notice.

Editors of the Phillipian:

School opened on Sept. 15 with an attendance of 243, which is a notable increase over last year when work began with only 211 students present.

On Wednesday afternoon, the day on which school opened, the foot ball squad was out in full force on the foot-ball field and McCornack of Dartmouth who has been engaged to coach the team during the entire season gave them their first drill. There has been vigorous practice every afternoon since. The first game of the season will be played with Tufts on Saturday, Sept. 25. At present there are about thirty-five men trying for the team of whom only four, Captain Higley, Zimmerman, Syphax, and Haggerty were on last year's team. As a rule the candidates are lighter than usual, especially in the line, but this is made up in quickness. Every one looks forward to a good season.

Following is a schedule of games: September 25, Tufts at Exeter; September 29, New Hampshire College, at Exeter; October 2, Dartmouth, at Hanover; October 9, M. I. T., at Exeter; October 13, Bowdoin, at Exeter; October 16, Harvard 1901, at Cambridge; October 23, Worcester at Exeter; October 30, Boston College, at Exeter; November 6, Cushing Academy at Exeter; November 13, Andover, at Exeter.

There has been an addition to the faculty in the person of Mr. John C. Kirtland, instructor in Latin and Ancient History, who comes to us from Hobart College where he held the position of Assistant Professor of the Latin Language and Literature.

In the place of Mr. Winsor, instructor of History and English, who resigned his position at the end of last year, has been appointed Mr. Ralph H. Bowles who has taught during the past year in the academy at Lake Forest, Ill.

The suggestion concerning the athletic house is timely and will probably be taken into consideration by the Track Team Management.

This afternoon our team meet their first opponents of the foot-ball season and we take this opportunity to remind the fellows, both new and old, that their support is solicited and expected from now until after the Exeter game.

True support will mean that the fellows not only come out as spectators but that they use their voices to good effect under the leadership of the cheering staff. Fellows should also keep in mind that we are hosts and the opposing team consequently deserves the utmost consideration. Whether or not we are victorious we have perfect confidence in Mr. Stearns and Capt. Elliot.

At a meeting of the Athletic Advisory Committee last June it was decided that some arrangements be made by which the accounts of receipts and expenditures of the several branches of athletics in the Academy could be kept to better advantage. There has been much dissatisfaction in the management of the athletic funds in the past few years

and it was agreed that besides the Graduate Treasurer, Mr. Ripley, another Treasurer, appointed by the Advisory Committee from the undergraduates, should assist in caring for and expending the collections and gate receipts of each Association, acting purely at the dictation of the Advisory Committee.

It was thought that the Undergraduate Treasurer, by this plan, besides assisting the several managers, would greatly help Mr. Ripley, whose task has been a difficult one and whose endeavors to rid us of a heavy burden of debt have only been repaid by legacies of new incumbrances incurred by poor management on the part of those in charge.

H. Saterlee, '97, was appointed Undergraduate Treasurer by the Advisory Committee. Mr. Saterlee is a thoroughly competent man and the Managers of the athletic teams will find support in him. It is hoped that this new plan will bring about the desired results and besides assisting in the keeping of the accounts of athletic funds will act as a check upon extravagance in team management.

Editors of the Phillipian:

The recent rifling of the athletic house prompts me to suggest that wire netting be placed over the upper windows just as is already over the lower ones. The authorities have known that it has been a risk to leave this isolated building thus unprotected and there is no reason why the building should not again be broken into during term time, especially since the lockers are well filled then, and would tempt the thief to run the slightly additional risk.
