Andover Scored Against Brown in Snappy Game last Wednesday

Andover suffered defeat last Wednesday, for the first time this season, in the game with Brown Warsity The game was by far the best seen on the camples this redification with the exception of the second half, when Captain Fultz filled his position so ably it proved to be the closest game that

Andover has played thus far.

Although the weather was a little warm for foot-ball, the game was fast and the interest was kept up from beginning to end. Every man on the Andover team played well and the work of the centre men was avast improvement. The playing of Schreiber, Roby, Burdick and Quinby deserves special mention. When Brown found she was not able to make long gains through the line the game became a kicking contest in which Brown easily proved superior.

For Brown the playing of Captain Fultz was remarkable, while Hopkins, Wheeler and Pratt distinguished themselves. The halves were twenty-five and twenty minutes, respectively.

FIRST HALF.

One of the distinguished alumni of Phillips Andove Academy, United States Commissioner of Education, Honorable William Torry Harris, Ph. D., LL.D., will contribute the introductory chapter.

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

Charles F. Thomas, P. A. '93, Yale '97, has gone abroad to study in Germany and France the languages of those countries.


