Obituary.

Caleb Emery, a member of the Academy in 1838, died Dec. 1, at his home in Brookline. He was born in Dover, N. H., and graduated from Dartmouth College in 1842. He was the first principal of the Charlestown High School and then became a master in the Boston Latin School, remaining fourteen years, Phillips Brooks coming under his instruction. In 1864, Mr. Emery returned to the Charlestown High School and was its principal for more than twenty years.

College Base-ball Prospects,

The base-ball outlook this year promises a closely contested series between Yale, Harvard, and Princeton. Each of these colleges loses about the same number of last year's team.

Princeton's greatest loss will be that of Jayne, to whose pitching belongs much of the credit of the success Princeton had last season. Beside Jayne, Princeton will lose Bradley, centre.field; Smith, second base; Altman, right-field and pitcher; and Captain Wilson, pitcher and third base. Princeton has Kelley, first base; Captain Butler, short-stop; Kafer, catcher; Hillebrand, third base; Barret, third base; and Easton and Suter, outfield-

Harvard will lose Paine and Scannell, one of the best college batteries in the country. It will be difficult to fill their places, although there is some good material in the lower classes. Ex-Captain Dean, second base; Stevenson, third base; and Beale, centre-field, have also graduated. President Eliot on Foot-ball.

The following statement about football has been made by President Eliot of Harvard. It is taken from the New York Evening Post:

"The grounds on which the arguments are based for the legal prohibition of intercollegiate foot-ball do not seem sufficient in my mind to-warrant favor. I understand that a bill has been passed in the Georgia Legislature making the playing of foot-ball a crime, simply on the ground that serious and sometimes fatal accidents are liable to occur in hard-fought contests. But if we stop to consider other sports, we find that there are every year serious accidents in baseball, boxing, fencing and other gymnastic games. Rowing and sailing are enjoyable pastimes, yet one reads of many drowning every year. This does not seem to lessen the interest in rowing or sailing. Everybody cannot play foot-ball. It is only the strong and well-built men who can expect to play the game with any degree of success. So I think the playing of football should not be prohibited without just cause."

It seems very strange that after all that has been said about forming a hockey team this year and in fact for several years past, and with the general approval of the school, that some definite step has not been taken toward


