The Andover hockey team played its first game Wednesday on Rabbits Pond, defeating a team picked from town players, 4-0, in two fifteen minute halves. The school team showed good team work and passing, while the opposing team seemed to lack practice. The game started at 3 P. M. In the first half Andover only scored once, Ward making the goal, although the play was almost entirely in the town teams territory.

In the second half the town players were completely out-classed. Brown started the scoring and Childs followed with another goal soon after. For the rest of the half the town team played a strong game, but Andover scored once more just before time was called, Brown making the goal, after a fine dash.

Forum.

The third regular meeting of Forum was held last night in room 9. The meeting was opened by a prayer by Outland. Kimball then gave a very well rendered declamation and W. E. Day a very enjoyable select reading. Littlefield followed with a speech on the gymnasium question and Butkiewicz gave an extemporaneous address on the subject of "The China Question." Johnston spoke on "The Life of Benjamin Franklin."

The debate then followed. The subject was: Resolved, That the Influence of the Press on Private Action is Injurious."

The affirmative was supported by Grinnell assisted by Aldrich, the negative by Robinson assisted by Hubbard. P. W. Thomson, Charwate and Solomon spoke from the house on the affirmative, Ryman and Barsamian on the negative.

The vote before debate was: affirmative 13; negative 6; after debate: affirmative 16, negative 1. The chair gave his decision with the house.

After the critique by Brainard the meeting was adjourned.

Philo.

The regular weekly meeting of Philo was held in Society Hall last evening. After the opening prayer by Satterlee, G. T. Russell and P. B. Bruce were proposed and accepted for membership. It was then moved and carried that the Philo debaters, for the Philo-Forum debate, be allowed to spend \$10 for the purchasing of any articles necessary for the preparation of the debate; also that a committee be appointed by the President to make arrangements for the annual Philo dinner.

The literary program was then opened with a declamation by Roberts, which was very well delivered. The debate for the evening was, "Resolved, That in municipal elections the voters should be influenced by the fitness of the candidate, rather than by party allegiance." Hughes and Man supported the affirmative. T. Howard and Archbald spoke on the negative. After a strong debate by both sides, the victory was awarded to the affirmative by a vote of 18-4. The meeting then adjourned.

The ninth annual contest in Oratory took place on the last Tuesday of the first term.

The judges awarded Cameron Mackenzie '99, first prize and second and third to Fox '98, and Kafer '98, respectively. The first prize amounted to \$30, and the second and third to \$12 and \$8.

During the Xmas. vacation the school suffered two losses by death. Charles E. Greene, President of the board of Trustees, died at his home in Trenton. Mr. Greene has devoted the late years of his life to the interests of Lawrenceville and Princeton, and by his death both institutions have suffered loss that is irreparable. The public buildings of the school have been draped since his death, as a slight tribute to his esteem.

It was a shock to the school to hear that again death had entered the ranks of our student body, and this time Martin Wells Kellogg was taken from our midst by typhoid fever.

His class have worn the crape band upon the right arm, since their return, out of respect to his memory.

The first call for base-ball candidates was issued last week, to which some fifty fellows responded, and although we will have but one of last year's team to build upon, still the outlook is not as dark as it might be, and we have some very promising material.

The Hockey team has been unable to do any work so far this year, owing to the lack of ice, but the manager has received several very good challenges, which were accepted.

Henry W. Greene, son of the late Charles E. Greene has been elected President and Treasurer of the Board of Trustees.

Throughout the winter term compulsory exercise is being maintained. Golf is the most popular game and the school has now completed the second course for the use of the students.

The Preliminary debate to choose those who shall represent the two Societies on Washington's Birthday, was held on Friday last.

The Philomathean Society selected Fox, Kafer, and Mackenzie, while the Calliopean Society put Augus, Barron and Smith, against them.

A resolution to the effect that the undergraduate body heartily approved of a University club and wished to assure the graduate committee, who have the matter in charge, of their earnest support, was unanimously carried.

After the meeting, several hundred men formed in line and marched about the campus.

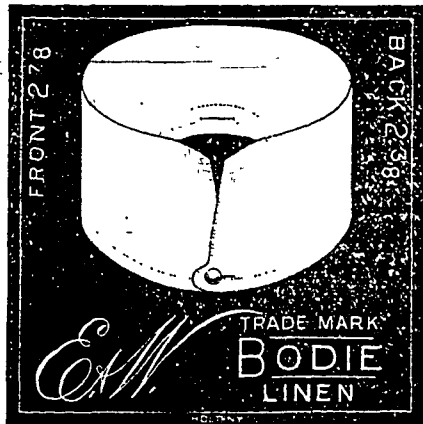
Intercollegiate Athletes in England.

A plan is under consideration by the Intercollegiate Athletic Association by which a team of athletes composed of the first and second men in each event in the intercollegiate games, will be sent to London during the summer to compete against a team of Oxford and Cambridge athletes.

Fifty men have been registered as candidates for the Cornell base ball team.

The Glee club of the University of New York City will give its annual concert on the evening of Jan. 27.

Columbia will this year take part in three dual track meets, one with Brown, one with Cornell and one with Princeton.

The course at the Cornell Law School has been changed so as to require three years' work instead of two as formerly.

Prof. Carl Barrus, of Brown University has been elected a member of the British Association for the Achievement of Science.

In the current number of *The Illustrated American* is a photograph of the intercollegiate chess tournament, in which Princeton's representatives are shown.

James C. Holderness of Cambridge, has been elected captain of the Lehigh University foot ball team. Holderness played full back on Lehigh last fall.

J. O. Rodgers, P. A. '94, Yale '98 will take charge of the Yale freshman crew candidates as soon as the Varsity crew candidates are called out.

Frederic Russell Nourse, Harvard '99, has been appointed manager of the Varsity football team for next year, subject to the approval of the Athletic Committee.

During the last eight years 27 Yale men, 23 Princeton, 22 Harvard, 15 University of Pennsylvania and one Cornell man have been chosen on the All-American elevens.

A college of commerce and politics is to be established under the auspices of Chicago University, with the object of teaching practical business politics, finance, trade and insurance.

Only twenty seven men have handed in their names as candidates for the Harvard Freshman baseball nine. Last year there were forty-nine candidates, and the year before eighty.

Mrs. D. C. Leavenworth has given \$1,000 to the Yale Medical School in memory of her husband, D. C. Leavenworth, M. D., of the class of '65. The income will be used for the general expenses of the school.

In response to a request issued by the athletic authorities of the University of Michigan, representatives from Chicago, Illinois, Northwestern, Wisconsin and Michigan met in Chicago recently and formed a baseball league.

Pennsylvania, Cornell and Columbia Athletic Teams have given their assurance that they will compete at the open indoor athletic meet of the B. A. A. on February 5th. Princeton is the only one that has not entered, of the Eastern colleges.

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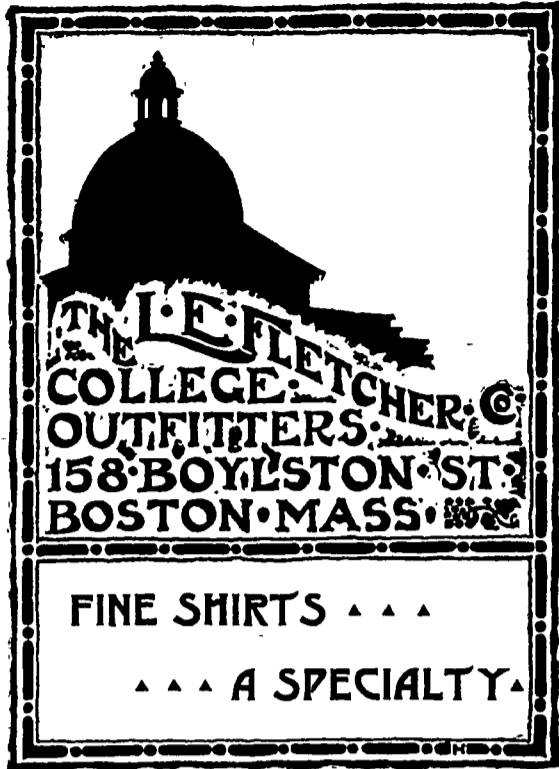
