Press Club.

We print below the Constitution of the Academy Press club.

PREAMBLE.

We, the undersigned members of Phillips Academy, desirous of keeping the school before the public and in touch with its alumni by communications to various newspapers and magazines throughout the United States, and wishing to encourage journalism in the school and to facilitate the workings of the publications do hereby join ourselves together in the form of a press club to be called the "Phillips Andover Press Club."

NAME.

ART. 1. The name of this organization shall be the "Phillips Andover Press Club."

OBJECT.

ART. 2. Its object shall be as is set forth in the preamble.

MEMBERSHIP

ART. 3. All members of the editorial boards of *The Mirror*, *The Phillipian* and *The Pot Pourri*, shall be members of this Club, and any member of the school may be elected by vote of the Club.

OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES.

ART. 4, Sec. 1. The officers of this Club shall be a President, a Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer.

Sec. 2. Besides performing the duties defined for him in the "Rules of Order," the President shall call special meetings of the Club either when ordered by three members of the Club, or at his own discretion; and he shall furthermore appoint correspondents to the various newspapers and magazines which the club may select.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Vice President to assume the duties of the President in the absence of the latter.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep an accurate account of all meetings of the club, to have charge of all the club's documents, and all correspondence not otherwise provided for.

Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to have charge of all funds of the Club, to make disbursement under the direction of the President, to keep an accurate account of all receipts and expenditures, and to make a written report at the last meeting of each term.

Sec. 6. The election of officers shall be held on the last regular meeting of each term of Phillips Academy. Special elections may be held also when vacancies occur. All officers shall be elected by ballot; but if only one candidate be named for office, he may be chosen by acclamation.

MEETINGS.

ART. 5. Regular meetings of this Club shall be held in the Academy library on the second and last Thursday of each term, at 8. P. M.; special meetings at the call of the President as provided in Art. 4, Sec. 2.

FUNDS.

ART. 6. The necessary funds shall be raised by equal assessments on the publications represented, made by vote of the club, and by annual dues of one dollar (\$1.00) to be paid by every member of the club, not representing one of the aforesaid publications, within one month after his election, and at the beginning of each school year thereafter.

POLICY.

ART. 7, Sec. 1. Authority, "Robert's Rules of Order" shall govern the procedure and business of this club in all cases to which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution.

Sec. 2, Quorum. One half of the active members of this club shall constitute a quorum for ordinary business.

Sec. 3, Voting. There shall be no voting by proxy. Election for officers shall be by ballot.

Sec. 4, Amendments. No part of this Constitution shall be altered, amended, or suspended unless the motion to alter, amend or suspend has been submitted in writing, at least one week previous, and has received a two thirds vote of the active members.

Sec. 5, Dissolution. Should this club ever be dissolved, the Faculty of Phillips Academy shall take possession of its property of all kinds, and hold the same till another club, similar in its objects, policy, and bearing the same name, shall be formed. To such new club, the faculty shall then deliver the former property of this club for their use and benefit.

Charles Grik, ex-P. A. '94, Harvard '98, has been elected president of the newly organized Harvard University debating Club for the first term.

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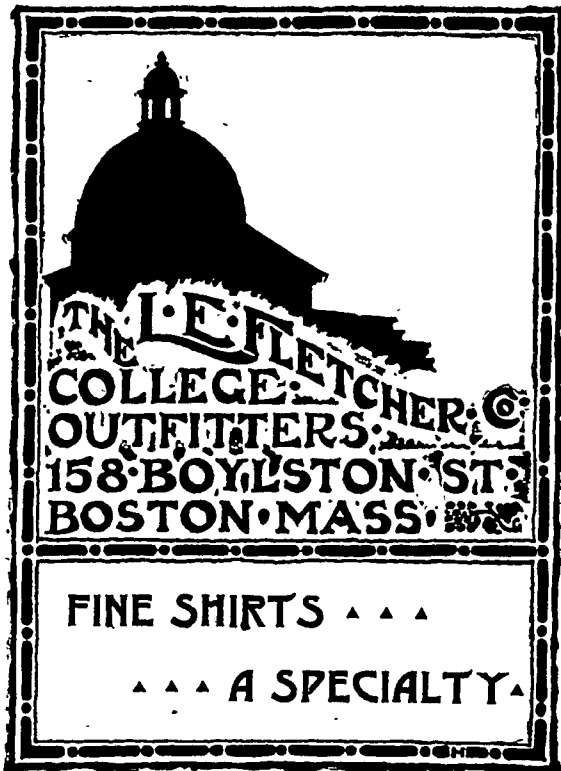
