#### FALL HANDICAP MEET.

1900 Wins Relay Race; '99 Wins Meet by 15 1-2 Points.

The Fall Handicap Meet and class relay race, held Thursday, proved a a great success and gave promise of a bright outlook for next spring. 1900 easily won the relay race. The class of '99 won the meet, having 48 points, 1900 came second with 32 1-2 points, and '01 third with 151-2 points, while '02 scored 2 points.

Metzger '99 broke the school record by four inches, for the hammer throw, held by himself.

1900 won the relay in a very pretty race. In the first quarter, C. W. Littlefield '99, W. W. Shaw '00, R. A. Blending '01, C. B. Yardley '02, started, Littlefield took the lead and gained, but at the finish Shaw passed and beat him by 10 yards. W. F. Dennison '99, D. Nicoll '00, J. W. Reid '01, and C. Sumner '02 releived their respective classmen. Nicoll took the lead and increased it about 10 yards. J. I. Fowler '99, A. W. Robertson '00, D. W. Mahoney '01, and H. S. Look '02, continued the race. During this quarter Robertson increased the lead of '00. The last quarter was run by Alan Fox '99, W. B. Jordan '00, H. L. Petit '01 and W. A. Schick '02. At this time there was no doubt as to the outcome of the race. 1900 was well in the lead and Fox was not able to reduce it. Jordan finished about 35 yards ahead of Fox, Schick followed closely and Petit was quite a distance in the rear.

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
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

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
