Amherst 14. Andover 4

Andover was defeated last Wednesday by Amherst in one of the worst played games that has been seen on the campus this year. The team seemed to lose heart from the start and were unable to gain confidence again throughout the rest of the contest. Errors were frequent, some of them appearing almost inexcusable. The home team was unable to hit Rushmore at all, though he is not considered up to the standard of many of the pitchers against whom the team have batted this season. Fourteen were struck out. The opposing team played steadily throughout and made their hits when most needed. Matthews, Lanigan and Littlefield did most of Andover's batting. Matthews led off with a slow grounder to second which he beat out. Lanigan sent him to second with a safe hit and Saunders walked to first, with the bases full Angus hit to second and died at first thus retiring the side. Amherst was unable to score in her half while Andover was only able to get a base on balls. In the first half of the second inning the visitors scored twice on a wild throw by Saunders, and from this point Andover seemed to lose her nerve entirely. Amherst retired the home team in the third by striking the first three men out, and increased her own lead by two runs. Andover went out in order in the fourth while Amherst rolled up three runs. In the fifth although Matthews lined out a two bagger and Lanigan singled to right the next two were struck out making one of the three times during the game that two men struck out with two or more on bases. With three balls and a strike Matthews put a straight ball over the center fielder's head for a home run, it was probably the longest hit seen on the campus this year. In the last half of the seventh Amherst made four singles and a three bagger which netted six more runs. Andover seemed to take a brace in the eighth and made three runs. Amherst was unable to finish the game having to take an early train to Boston, and the game was called with a final score of 15 to 4.

We earnestly hope that before this appears in your columns, that the rupture between the former president of the Dramatic Club and several aspiring supernumeraries of that organization will have been healed; for as the time is drawing near and no preparation is being made for the presentation of the usual June play, we cannot feel but that the school must suffer, until their differences of opinion regarding unpaid fines, shingles, distressed members, justice and defective constitutions and by-laws are settled.

There is no doubt in the minds of the majority of the fellows but that the former president of the Dramatic Club is right and that the attitude he has taken toward the question is perfectly justifiable. No captain of any of our teams has ever worked harder or more faithfully for the success of that team than did Irvine in developing the material that formed the cast in "She Stoops to Conquer," and now the very fellows who profited most by his labors and those upon whom he spent hours of his time, in order to make them presentable in their minor way, are starring in such grand, public exhibitions as "Buncoed out of my Shingle," "She Stoops to Defraud," and "Supes after Noteriety."

We hope that the fellow who is so ardently pleading for shingles and justice for his silent, unfortunate friends, and who, through his philanthropic disposition brought about this rupture will seek now to undo the injury for which he is chiefly responsible.

The discourtesy which Forum received at the hands of Philo, last Friday night, deserves more than passing notice. There is no one whom fellows listen to so readily as one who has just been through college; a young man capable of saying just what he means and of making the fellows understand what he wants to say. The good that it is possible for such a man to do is inestimable and some efforts should be made by the Society of Inquiry to have more young men address the society.

the White and Blue.

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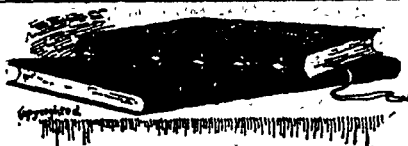

letic games held at Dartmouth.

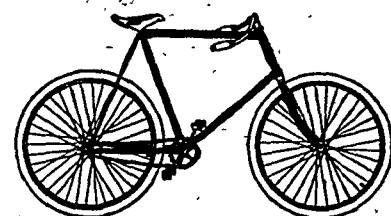
Quinby '98 is doing very creditable

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
