New Hampshire College 26; Anddover 0

New Hampshire College defeated Andover on Oct. 11, in a game not marked by good playing on either side. Fumbling was frequent and sometimes inexcusable. Andover's team was handicapped by the inability of five regular; men to play. The punting on both sides was fair. Andover's weak point seemed to be her centre and tackles, through which New Hampshire made repeated gains. Andover made nearly all her gains around the end.

Runlett, who made the long runjust before New Hampshire scored, should not have been allowed to go har the distance he did. The attempt to tackle him seemed, from the side lines, to be puny.

The game was called at 8.20 with New Hampshire in possession of the ball. Calderwood kicked thirty yards: to Botchford, who carried it back to the centre line. Andover kicked thirty yards, and Rafferty got the ball on a fumble. New Hampshire got the ball on downs, and lafter na few plays kicked out of bounds, Andover securing the ball. The next play New Hampshire got the ball on a fumble. Soon after, Calderwood kicked to Baldwin, who ran ten yards. Andover : punted: After a : few more plays, Andover again got the ball on a kick, and made forty-four yards before New Hampshire secured the ball on a fumble. After a series of short rushes, mostly through the tackles, New Hampshire kicked to Baldwin. Andover kicked back to Runlett who a little later ran fifty yards to Andover's one-yard line. He was pushed over the line for a touchdown in the next play. Calderwood kicked the goal. . Score, New Hampshire College of Andover 0.

After three more plays time was called with the ball in New Hamp-shire's territory

In the second half, Winslow was substituted for Baldwin at quarter, Butkiewicz for Weeks at left guard, and Weeks for Coonley at right tackle.

Calderwood caught the kick-off and ran five yards. After four rather fruitless plays, Calderwood kicked, New Hampshire securing the ball on a fumble. Presently New Hampshire kicked to Winslow. After three downs, Andover punted. Two plays after, Calderwood kicked out of bounds.

Stevens tried the ends for three yards, and Mackay the centre for three. After a few more plays in which nothing was gained, Andover punted out of bounds. Two plays later Reinhardt got the ball on a kick and ran ten yards. After this till the end of the game, Andover kept brac ing up and pushed the ball well into New Hampshire's territory before time was called.

Commander Eaton's Lecture

Commander Eaton of the United States Navy, who had charge of the "Resolute" during our recent war with Spain, gave a very interesting talk last Thursday evening, to the fellows of the school and their guests, on the "Battle of Santiago." His account was very thrilling of the events that led up to the battle, and how the Spaniards could have inflicted a great deal more harm on our ships had they cused better judgment, even if they could not have prevented capture:

He described very modestly his own share in the engagement and also spoke somewhat of the troops on the main land, and how they fared.

One thing that he laid especial emphasis on, was the fact that while the Spanish ships were in the harbor of Santiago, they allowed an American warship to approach within about two miles of them every night of the blockade and use the search light on them.

Altogether, it was a most interesting talk and those that did not hear it were very unfortunate.

The New Dormitory

The new dormitory, now under construction opposite L. C., is the first of a system of dormitories which will, in time, supplant the present house system.

The building which is to be three stories high, will have a front of 185 feet on Phillips street and a depth of 30 feet.

It will be built of brick with granite trimmings and practically fire-proof.

There will be three entrances on Phillips street and in front of each will be a granite porch.

It will contain eighteen double suites of rooms; each consisting of a study 16x16 1-2 with two large windows, a fireplace and mantel and set of book shelves; and two bedrooms 10x11 with one window each.

The basement will be fitted with baths and a thoroughly modern heating apparatus for the whole house.

This building will be a valuable addition to P. A., as the need for more rooms near the school is constantly growing.

Let us hope that this, the new Bancroft" will soon be followed by others of its kind until there are rooms for all the fellows on the school grounds.
