## Universities at the World's Fair

The more important universities of the country have joined in a common University exhibit at Paris in 1900. The small space allotted, makes it impossible for each University to be given sufficient room to make an individual exhibit, such as was made at Chicago in 1893. The commissioners are gathering from each University statistics, covering the year 1898-99, and showing how many courses were offered during that year, how many students were in attendance upon the courses, and how many instructors were employed.

The statistics will be divided into certain large groups, such as Language and Literature, Pure Science, History and Economics, Engineering, Law, Medicine etc. These statistics have been prepared and forwarded to the commissioners.

In addition, each university has been given a small space in which to make an exhibit, laying particular stress upon one department of its activity. Thus Harvard will exhibit its Astronomical work, Columbia its Pedagogy, and the University of Pennsylvania its Archaeology, including its important explorations.

It is believed that the common exhibition made in this way, while perhaps not so attractive to the casual sight-seer, will have some features which will make it much more valuable to the student of education, than were the large exhibits at the exposition of 1893.

## Football Outlook in the Colleges.

Harvard is the only one of the "Big Three" whose football team for next fall will not suffer much from graduation. Her only losses will be Burden, Boal and Donald, and as Boal did not play in the Yale game this fall it means a loss of only two men to Harvard. She will have Campbell, Hallowell, Daly, Lawrence, Burnett, Sawin, Kendall, Ellis and Reid of this year's team back, besides nearly all of the promising substitutes who were nearly as good as the regular men.

Yale will suffer considerably more than Harvard, as Capt. McBride graduates next June, as well as Francis, Richards, Hubbell, Snitzer and Hale. The latter, however, may possibly return for a post-graduate course. The ends will be stronger than this year if Thomas and Coy can both play. Hillman and Cook, a first class substitute tackle, will return to college as well as Brown and Olcott, this year's guards. Fince has another year yet and with Dupee, Sharpe, Keene and Chadwick behind the line, Yale ought to be very strong.

Princeton this year loses Edwards, Hillebrand, Poe, Booth, Reiter and Wheeler, but will be greatly strengthened by Young, the famous Cornell quarter back of '97, who was ineligible this fall. Hutchinson, the regular quarter, will be back and also, Pell, Beardsley, McCord, Palmer, Roper, and several of the best substitutes:

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
