Andover's Hockey Season Has a Dubious Opening.

The Newtowne A. A. defeated Andover in the first game of the season by the score of 6 to 0. Owing to Andover's lacking two very strong men, who could not play on account of deficiency in scholarship, the team work was very poor and showed either lack of practice or poor material.

The Newtowne Team, on the contrary, showed excellent team work and were all very fast, displaying much hard practice on their part. O'Day and Dousman undoubtedly played the best game for Andover, while Lyman and Connell did the best work for the visitors.

The game was called at 3.55 o'clock by Referee Dutcher. Newtowne started off with quick, snappy rushing and within 30 seconds of play, had scored their first goal. In about the same time they added one more to their list, and one more later on in this half.

Andover took a decided brace in the second half, but Newtowne scored three times, thus clinching the game. The final score was Andover 0, Newtowne A. A. 6.

Harvard-Yale Boat Race.

At a meeting of the captains and managers of the Harvard and Yale University crews held in Cambridge on January 6, the details for the races at New London next spring were decided upon. The following is the programme of the University, four-oared and Freshman crew races. All the races will be rowed down stream with the tide. The University race will be rowed on June 28 at 11.30 o'clock.

The race of the substitutes of the University crews will be rowed as soon after the University race as possible. The start will be at the beginning of the four-mile course.

The Freshman race will be rowed as soon as possible after the four oared-race. The starting point will be at the two mile mark of the four mile course.

The change of order of the University race from last event to first was made necessary this year on account of the tide. The referee and other officers of the regatta have not yet been chosen.

It was an uphill game, pluckily fought by the team, against a team which is as good as any, if not the best, New England team. It must be remembered that Newtowne generally defeats Harvard. Neither should this defeat take away interest in the team from the student body. The team needs the support of the whole school. Hockey is being played more and more each year in the colleges. The hockey team is just as much a representative of Andover as the football or baseball team, so let the fellows encourage the team in every way possible.

No Race with Harvard and Yale.

Those who had suspicions, that Harvard and Yale had sent a challenge to Cornell for a boat race this year were relieved of their doubts yesterday by a statement of Freddie Colson, now chairman of Cornell's rowing committee. Reports from the eastern institutions had it that the rowing authorities there were expecting to hear from Cornell. Mr. Colson stated, however, that Cornell has heard nothing from either Yale or Harvard regarding boat races, nor had there been any negotiation either direct or indirect. Cornell has not, at any time, expected or intended to enter a crew at New London for the same reasons that she refused to row there a year ago.

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
