REVIEW OF SCHOOL YEAR.

Increase in All Branches.

This year as far as it has progressed has been an exceedingly successful one for Phillips Andover.

P. A. has done so well in every line that, if she holds out, the school year of 1900 will obtain an honored place in the history of the academy.

There is a slight increase in attendance over last year, about twenty more.

A larger number of fellows made the honor rolls during the past fall term than in the corresponding term last year.

The signs are also promising for an excellent baseball team this year. There are a number of last year's men back and there is a large amount of good new material.

The new dormitory is about completed and the amount necessary for the building of the new gymnasium has finally been raised.

The Senior class is a good one and will undoubtedly bring great credit to P. A.

The school publications have received increased popularity. The contributions to the *Mirror* have been of a higher grade than those of recent former years.

The *Pot Pourri* also promises to be a very good number this year. The *PHILLIPIAN* stands, as it always has in the opinion of the fellows, as a paper in which the sentiments of the school are expressed as well as possible.

Although the hockey team has not had an opportunity to show what it could do, on account of the weather, nevertheless, the team is a good one and is worthy of the school.

The Call to the Universal Day of Prayer for Students.

In accordance with the decision of the General Committee of the World's Student Christian Federation, Sunday, Feb. 11, 1900, is appointed as the Universal Day of Prayer for Students. The committee which has been appointed for this day includes official representatives of the Christian student movements of Germany, Scandinavia, Great Britain, France, the Netherlands, Switzerland, the United States, Canada, Australasia, South Africa, Japan, India, Ceylon, China, and other lands, including 1,300 student societies with a membership of over 55,000 students and professors. During the past two years this day has been observed in over thirty different countries by Christian students.

B. A. A. ATHLETIC MEET. ✓

Exeter is Easily Defeated by Andover.

Exeter's relay team was defeated last Saturday evening at the B. A. A. indoor meet at Mechanics Hall. P. A. won by a good two-thirds of a lap and not once was there any doubt as to the winner. The race was beautifully run from start to finish.

The victory was well earned and was a fit reward for the hard training that the fellows who ran, have had. The Exeter men ran a very game race although they were outclassed.

Schick beat his opponent Dean, out by five yards and Botchford who ran next for Andover increased this lead to a lead of ten yards over Knibbs.

Captain Crawford ran the next relay against Jones of Exeter, beating him out by nearly a half lap.

Cates for P. A. and Frye for P. E. were the last pair to run. Cates ran well and crossed the tape two-thirds of a lap a winner.

Crawford and Cates ran their relays in very fast time. Schick qualified for the finals in the 40 yard dash but failed to get a place.

G. L. Hasbrouck won the 45 yard low hurdles; doing it in 5 1/4 seconds.

J. K. Esser qualified for the finals but did not get a place.

The time made by the relay team was 3 min. 17 2/5 seconds. Faster than the time made last week at the B. C. A. A. meet against Harvard Fresh.

The showing made by P. A. was very good indeed and the chances are much improved for a victory over Exeter in the dual meet this spring.

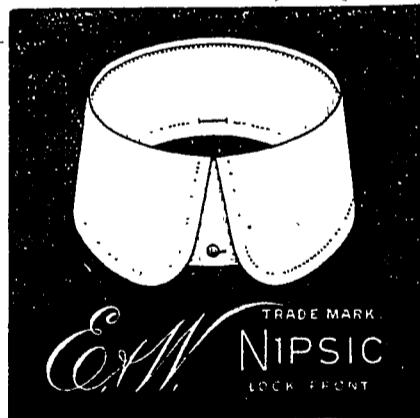
The results of the B. A. A. meet were most pleasing and satisfactory, from an Andover standpoint. The relay race with Exeter was, contrary to expectations, an easy victory for Andover, and one which brought great credit to the school, especially, as so many college undergraduates viewed it. This makes the second victory for

the relay team, and shows that our chances for a good track team are brighter than ever. The other men who entered the meet, although very few, should be heartily congratulated for the good showing they made.

An interesting enterprise, exploited under the leadership of the West Point Association, has for its purpose the graphic reporting of football games throughout the country. Each college joining the movement, by a small expenditure, secures a hektograph, and plots the important plays in each game on paper ruled to represent the gridiron. That the plays may be accurately shown, plotters are to be permitted the freedom of the side lines. Immediately at the close of each game extra diagrams are to be drawn off and mailed to all colleges within the agreement for posting on conspicuous bulletin boards. Representatives of about ten of the largest institutions have signified an intention to follow out the plan. Associations interested in promoting the unique and educative scheme are directed to the president of the West Point Association for information by printed circular and correspondence.
