Editors of the Phillipian:—

Several seniors have been for the first time informed, at this late day, that the courses which they have been taking this year, and which they were told were sufficient for a diploma, do not comprise enough hours to secure one. It is obviously unjust that these seniors should be deprived of a diploma through no fault of their own. The catalogue says that eighteen hours of senior work are enough to secure a diploma, and does not say that it is necessary to take four hours in addition to the Yale requirements. For many, it is now impossible to remedy this error. It is the fault of the wording of the catalogue, and of the senior class officers, and as such should be remedied by the faculty. This is an injustice to every senior.

The first article is a story by H. L. Wadsworth entitled "Love vs. Friendship." In spite of this rather tragic title, the story is interesting and well told.

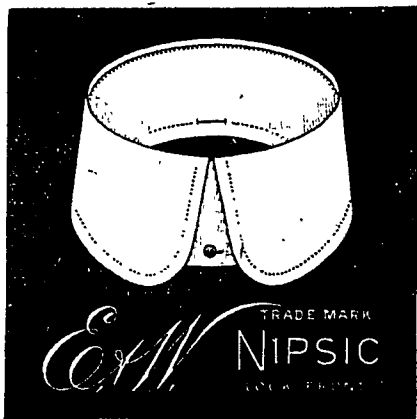
"Not the Golden Rule," by Chittenden, is written in easy, flowing style. The sketch shows originality, as its title would indicate.

The second annual debate between the University of Michigan and the University of Pennsylvania last Friday was won by Michigan by a unanimous vote of the judges.

Mrs. Robert Goelet has presented to Columbia College a bronze statue, "Alma Mater" in memory of her husband. The statue which will cost \$25,000 will be placed on a pedestal before the University Library.

Tewksbury, of the U. of Penn. who has made a very good showing of late in track work especially in the short distance sprints, is to represent his college at the Olympian Games in Paris next summer.

Professor E. J. Phelps of the Yale faculty, who has been ill for so long, died last Friday. His loss will be greatly felt by both the faculty and students. He has been Professor of Law in the Law School for the past 18 years.

A memorial service was held in the Superior Court at Lawrence, Tuesday afternoon, for Theodore Moody Osborne, a member of the Essex bar, and for several years a trustee of Phillips Academy. Principal Bancroft was seated on the bench with Judge Bishop (class of '54,) who is holding this term of court. Resolutions were presented by Mr. Crowley, and remarks were made by Mr. White and Mr. Northend. Judge Bishop concluded with a thoughtful address, and ordered the resolutions on record.

The three musical clubs will give a concert Thursday at the Tewksbury Almshouse, Tewksbury. They will leave Andover on the 6.45 train and return on the 9.40 from Tewksbury. The concert will commence at 8 o'clock.
