Andover was defeated Thursday for the second time this season in a very exciting game with Dartmouth College. The game was full of surprises and Andover had a good lead up to the seventh inning, when Dartmouth scored her first run. Cook, who pitched for the visitors played for the first time this season, and in the first few innings seemed very much out of form, giving seven bases on balls in two innings, but towards the last he improved greatly and did some very good work. Stephens pitched a hard and constant game but seemed to go to pieces in the last and was hit by Dartmouth nine times. However it is but natural that his endurance should not be great so early in the season. Andover clearly lost by her poor batting; some of the men supposed to be the hardest hitters struck out and only three hits were made.

The out-field was very fair but did not have much to do as most of Dartmouth's hits were infield grounders. Lanigan's brilliant catch in the fourth was one of the features of the game. The in-field work was also very good and shows great improvement. Rinehart was sure of everything that came his way and Tobin at first, is a very steady player. Matthews did not play his customary good game but is sure to do much better after a little practice. Captain Winslow played excellently throughout, he made two good hits and did not make any passed balls.

Lanigan, Tobin and Winslow played the best game for Andover, and Brown, Wainwright and Pingree for Dartmouth.

Although Dartmouth beat Exeter only 7 to 6 last Wednesday, Captain French, P. A. '97, considers our team far stronger at present.

1901 Class Team Election.

At a meeting of the candidates for the 1901 baseball team yesterday, Captain Angus resigned and J. L. Burns was elected to fill his place.

The 1902 class team was defeated on the Salem Street campus yesterday, by the Pynchard High School with a score of 12 to 10.

This afternoon on the campus, Andover will play Colby College. Saunders who pitched for Andover last year holds the same position on the Colby nine.

Mr. William Henderson Wadhams, P. A. '92, Yale '96, Harvard Law School '96, now of the firm of Latting (P. A. '69) & Wadhams, 34 Pine St., New York, was married April 26, at Christ church, by Rev. Frederic Palmer, P. A. '65, to Miss Caroline Drummond Reed.

Track Team Prospects.

The track season is well under way and a good estimate can be made of the team's chances this spring.

Of last year's men, Captain Crawford, Cross, Jordan, Goldsmith, Benedict, Colby, Hasbrouck, Cochran, Bloomer, Butkiewicz, Matthews, Schick, Newton, Derr, Sherwin, Latting and Thompson are back.

Andover will be well represented by Schick and Matthews (if he runs) in the sprints. Schick is speedy and is always to be counted on; Matthews is also a good sprinter but on account of baseball will have but little time to practice. Of the new material, Sumner and Botchford are the most promising.

For the 440 yards, Cross, Jordan, Benedict and Shattuck of last year's team are back. Cross has a fine stride and is one of the best runners on the team. Both he and Jordan won points against Exeter last year and will probably do so again this year. Among other runners who are out for this distance is Botchford of the Andover-Exeter Relay team, who is the most likely of the new men.

Crawford is about the only reliable man for the half. Cates is a candidate but it is not at all sure that he will enter this distance.

In the mile, Goldsmith and Latting are back. Goldsmith's running is well known and his remarkable endurance was well shown in the meet last fall. Latting has perseverance and good form and has a very fair chance of winning a place in the Exeter meet. Hasbrouck is the only man back for the hurdles. He is excellent at taking the jump and his finish is strong. Esser, a new man is a likely aspirant. He has not worked at the hurdles long but is constantly improving.

Andover will be strong in the weight events. Butkiewicz is the only last year's man who is back, but Levine and Kinney are promising candidates.

Newton and Colby are back for the high jump. Colby is rapidly improving and will give Newton who is rather heavy a hard struggle for first place.

For the broad jump, no one of last year's men is here again. Fallows and Dougherty are doing the best work at present.

Thompson is the only pole vaulter of last year. He does pretty well and shows improvement.

The most promising men for the bicycle are Cochrane, Sherwin, Michael and Armstrong. Sherwin won his "A" last year and Michael won his the year before. Cochrane holds the Andover record for the two mile Charles River road-race. Armstrong is a fairly good rider though somewhat unsteady.

On the whole, though Andover has lost some very valuable men, the prospects are all in favor of a successful track season. The following men have coached the track team candidates during the last two weeks: Kimball, P. A. '99; Ellis, P. A. '97; Daly, captain of Harvard football team for 1900; and trainer Peet, trainer of the U. of Penn. track team.

Foster Classical Prizes.

H. B. Foster, P. A. '92, now of John Hopkins University, has offered prizes of twelve and eight dollars for excellence in reading Greek and Latin prose respectively. He gave similar prizes in '98 for Latin composition and Greek geography.

The following are the conditions under which this year's prizes shall be awarded.

I. The two competitions shall take place as soon as feasible after Decoration Day, 1900. The Professor of Greek and the Professor of Latin shall agree upon a satisfactory date or dates, and shall have general charge of the examinations.

II. A prize of twelve (12) dollars is offered for excellence in reading Greek prose aloud. Each candidate shall select a passage for previous preparation, the reference to which he shall hand in to the examiner in writing, in advance, and shall moreover be tested on a passage at sight.

III. A prize of eight (8) dollars is offered for excellence in reading Latin prose aloud under similar conditions.

IV. The examiners shall determine from what work or works selections are to be made.

V. These examinations are open to the entire school without restriction, save as to fitness and ability of the candidate. To insure this end, each candidate shall beforehand register his name with the proper examiner.

VI. The judges shall be appointed by the principal of the academy.

VII. The prize winners, and such (if any) as receive honorable mention shall be announced on Commencement Day, 1900.

Both literary societies are now stronger than they have been for many years. This is a sure indication that debating, which has begun to come to the front here this year, will find a firm basis and will be of more importance next year. Arrangements ought to be made for outside debates such as the one which Exeter held with the Harvard Sophomores last year. This would undoubtedly double the interest in debating. Exeter's debating societies have frequently expressed themselves in favor of a joint debate between Andover and Exeter, and there is no reason why we should not have this as well as football and baseball games.

It would be well for the proper authorities to open negotiations early and let us have an Andover-Exeter debate next year.

Rev. W. D. P. Bliss of P. A. '74, who has been prominent in the Social Reform movement for many years, gave a lecture on "Socialism" before Prof. Gardner's class in political economy at Brown, on the 17th inst.

The following men are to act as judges for the Yale Princeton debate: Prof. W. A. Dunning of Columbia University, Pres. R. P. T. Raymond of Union College; and Hon. W. S. Strong ex-mayor of New York City.

Cornell will send a team of not more than seven men to the Olympian Games at Paris. The expense of the trip will be borne by the alumni.

The University of California has pledged itself to raise \$5,500 as its share of the permanent endowment of the American School at Athens. Of this sum, \$1,250 has already been donated.

W. D. Washburn, jr., P. A. '83, has written a pamphlet on "The Crime against Puerto Rico."

The class of 1900 at Cornell has appointed a committee to edit and publish a Cornell song book.

A change from a three term to a two term system at Cornell, has been made by the board of trustees upon the recommendation of the faculty.

Henry B. Joy, P. A. '83 is Secretary and Treasurer of the Fort Street Union Depot Co., of Detroit, Mich.

C. W. Littfield P. A. '99, and W. W. Clark P. A. '99, P. Lindenburg P. A. '99 and J. O. Tobin P. A. '99, are trying for the Freshman baseball team at Yale.

Charles Cadet Shoyer, of Leavenworth, Kansas, who was in P. A. '98, the Middle year, classical, and of the class of 1901, Literary, University of Michigan, was instantly killed, April 7, by an express train near Ann Arbor. Shoyer was walking with others on the track, and apparently he was so interested in an impromptu shooting match in which they were engaged, that he did not notice the approach of the train, nor the warning whistle of the locomotive. He was about twenty-five years of age and a young man of great worth and promise.

Wellesley college has recently received a gift of \$200,000.

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A small party is now being formed in the school to go to Europe this summer under unusual advantages. Several of the fellows have already signified their intention of taking the trip. The party will be conducted by a graduate of Yale University, under the direction of Messrs Dunning & Sawyer of Boston, managers of foreign tours.

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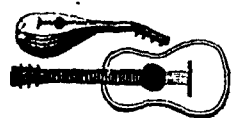
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
