Commons Defeats Phillips Street.

The street team games were started on last Saturday, when Commons defeated Phillips street 6 to 0. The playing of both teams was very good. Although the game was very closely contested, the score does not show the strength of Phillips street.

Phillips street had the better team work and played the steadier game. In the first half they pushed the ball to the eight yard line where they were held on downs, and in the second half they had it on Commons one yard line, where in three attempts they were unable to push it over the line.

Commons made most of their gains through Phillips line; Watkins making their touchdown after an eight yard run through tackle. Bishop and Watkins did good work for Commons while Dousman, Rust and Fry played well for Phillips street.

Yale-Princeton Game.

The following tells the whole story of Yale's superiority over Princeton on last Saturday.

In the first half Yale rushed the ball by straight playing 249 yards and carried the ball back after punting 57 yards. In the second half 295 yards were gained by running in punts, a total of 544 yards by rushing and 122 yards in the broken field—666 yards, or three-eighths of a mile, as a total for the game.

Against this, Princeton carried the ball approximately 96 yards.

In the first half two punts were each run in for 15 yards.

Reiter made 38 yards after Stillman lost the ball, and two other ground gaining rushes in this half netted the Tigers three and two yards respectively.

Then in the second half Duncan's run of 17 yards and other gains of four yards and two yards were all Princeton was able to make in 35 minutes of play.

Yale's longest gain was 20 yards but three times the ball was carried by rushing for more than 80 yards, twice for more than 50 yards, not including the running back of Mattis' kicks.

Princeton punted nine times, averaging 35 yards, the longest punt being 45 yards. Yale punted less, her kicks averaging 30 yards each.

In the Yale-Princeton game last Saturday, four of Andover's players on the '99 team secured their Y's and P's. The Boston *Globe* in speaking of the game said: "One of the interesting features of the game was that before it ended almost all of Andover's crack team of last season was scattered over the field in the two elevens. Bloomer and Rafferty were in the Yale rush line while Davis and Butkiewicz played for Princeton."

The following Andover men played on the Yale Freshman team against Harvard. Winslow (captain), Drummond, O'Neil and Cross. F. J. O'Connor P. A. '00 played guard for the Harvard '04 team.

The subject for the debate between the Harvard Freshmen and Exeter academy will be Resolved; "That the permanent retention of the Philippines by the United States is desirable." The Freshman club has until Nov. 16 to make its choice of sides.

Where Yale Was Founded.

At Branford, Conn., a tablet to the founders of Yale University, presented to the town by ex-President Dwight of Yale, in the name of the Connecticut Society of Colonial Dames, was unveiled at the southeast corner of Branford Green. Saturday afternoon, Nov. 10. After the presentation by Dr. Dwight and the speech of acceptance in behalf of the town by Dr. C. W. Gaylord, the assembly adjourned to Blackston Memorial Library, where President Hadley of Yale delivered an address.

The tablet bears this inscription:

"In the house of Rev. Samuel Russell was held in 1700 the meeting of the Colony of Connecticut, where they gave books for the founding of the collegiate school which now bears the name of Yale University."

At the top of the tablet is a likeness of the Russell homestead, and below are the names of the ten ministers who gave the books.

Fall Registration.

The fall registration as given in the Preliminary catalogue shows a total of 391 students, slightly less than last year.

The classification, according to the various classes, is as follows:

Classical Department—Class I, 53; Class II, 71; Class III, 57; Class IV, 33. Total, 214.

Scientific Department—Class A, 35; Class B, 73; Class C, 55; Class D, 14. Total, 177.

The football team is to be congratulated in their election of Weeks for captain of next year's eleven. Weeks by his hard and conscientious work on the football field in the past three years has shown himself capable of leading an Andover eleven, and has justly earned for himself the responsible and worthy position lately conferred upon him. We feel sure that under his control the coming year will be a marked one in our football history.

In closing, the Phillipian, in behalf of the school wishes to assure our 1900 team and captain Collins that the only defeat of the year does not detract in the least from their enviable record of the past season, and for this and their earnest efforts we thank them heartily.

A series of Cross Country runs will be held this fall for the purpose of giving the men who desire to try for the distance events in the spring, an opportunity to get some very valuable training. These runs will be Hare and Hound chases and will be run after the same manner as those which are now in progress at Harvard and Yale. The series will consist of five runs, the first to take place the latter part of this week. In order to lesson the possibility of a tie, the scoring will be done by points, first place counting 5 points, second 3, and third one. A trophy cup will be given to the man scoring the greatest number of points. This cup will be on exhibition in the show case in the upper hall before the first run.

All men who can possibly do so are urged very strongly to take part in these runs. They offer excellent opportunities to develop strength and endurance; and now especially when the football season is over, and the

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means of getting active exercise are few, these runs open up a way in which every fellow can keep himself in first class condition for the work later in the year.
The fact that they are to be Hare and Hound chases, ought to do away with that element of "grinding" which characterizes the long drawn out Cross Country runs, and tend to make them interesting as well as beneficial. The distance of these runs will vary from two to four miles.
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College Hockey League.
The Intercollegiate Hockey League will meet in New York next week to determine upon schedules and membership. Cornell University has appealed for membership in the league. If her application is accepted, the membership of the league will include Yale, Princeton, Columbia, Brown and Cornell. Harvard wished to join the association last year, but could not secure the consent of the Faculty. The Faculty's objection may be overruled this season, for a league with Yale, Harvard, Princeton, and Columbia in it, would certainly be productive of some interesting contests.

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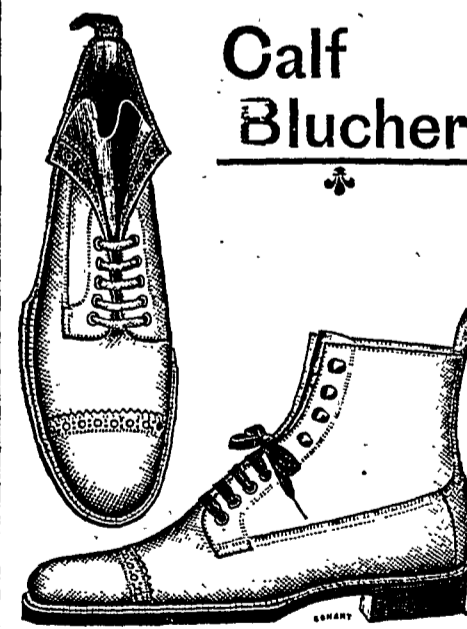
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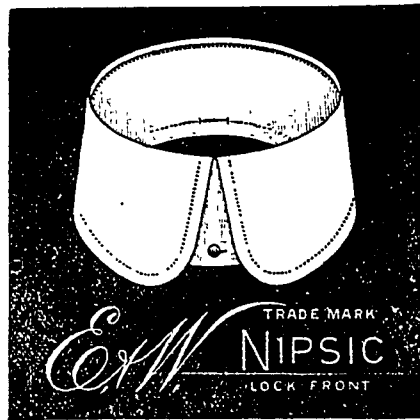
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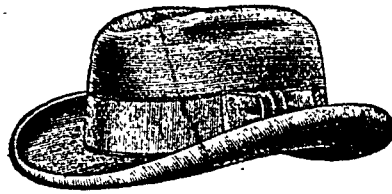
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
