Good Showing Made by Hockey Team.

Last Saturday, Andover tied the Harvard Sophomores in the first important game of the year with a score of 2 to 2. Both teams played a fast and aggressive game and although playing an extra five minute period, they were unable to break the tie. The teams were very evenly matched, Harvard being slightly stronger on the defensive, and Andover more aggressive. In the second half Andover excelled Harvard in team work. Time was called at 2.45, Harvard got possession of the puck and after some minutes of spirited rushing, Pier succeeded in making a goal. Neither side scored again until the end of the first half, when after rushing the puck down the rink, Morey passed it to Reed, to O'Brien who scored. Score, Andover 1, Harvard 1.

In the second half there were two changes in Harvard's line up, McEarty replacing Clark; and Locke going in for Wright. After about seven minutes of play in the second half Wright scored again for the visitors, just before he was retired. Andover's second goal was made by Reed. Both sides failed to score in an extra five minutes. Final score Andover 2, Harvard 2.

For Harvard, Clarke and Pier played the best game, while O'Brien, Dousman and Silleck all played very well for Andover.

Hockey.

Now that the hockey season is well under way fair estimates can be made. The team as a whole has made steady improvement in team work during the season and at the present time is fairly efficient in passing, but inaccurate in goal shooting. On account of the number of conditioned candidates, the squad to select from has been very small.

Silleck at point is an unusually good player and especially good at shooting.

P. L. Reed still holds his position as forward and has shown steady improvement over his last year's work.

Dousman also has improved steadily.

Bird at goal, is doing fine work and is a promising candidate for that position.

O'Brien, forward is a new man and has shown up exceptionally well.

Huiskamp plays a good individual game but is poor in passing, the same applies to O'Day.

Morey is slow in passing but has improved greatly and will probably overcome this later on.

Peck has been kept from practice a great deal on account of conditions but is a hard player.

Darr is good on offensive work but poor on defensive and not accurate in his shooting.

Carter on the contrary is good on defensive but weak on offensive work.

P. R. Reed's defensive is good and his offensive shows improvement.

Stimpson is playing a good game at goal.

Hodge is a very fast skater, but does not use his head or keep his position well.

Altogether the prospects are fairly promising.

Obituary.

GEORGE CONGDON FONSE.

George Congdon Fouse died Thursday, February seventh, in Washington, D. C. Mr. Fouse was the son of Lieutenant George Fouse, formerly of the U. S. N. but now retired. He graduated from Andover in 1890 and entered the Sheffield Scientific school. After graduating from there in 1893 he entered the business of civil engineer with office in Boston, but after pursuing this for a year and a half he entered the law school at Columbia University. Before he had finished his course of study there the Spanish war broke out and he enlisted in the Fourth Immune Regiment. He served in this through the war. Then he finished his course at the law school and last June he received his master's degree from the University of Columbia. Last October he passed the examinations for admittance to the bar and was just beginning his career when he was taken with his last sickness.
