Forum Banquet.

Forum held its third annual banquet at the Mansion house last Saturday evening. After an excellent course dinner, Toastmaster McEwan in a few well chosen remarks introduced Prof. Forbes who, representing the faculty, spoke very interestingly on the Roman Forum. In his talk he said that, like the Roman Forum which had been excavated and widened about half its length in the last three years, he hoped the Andover Forum would widen out and develop as much in the next few years. The next to speak was one of the alumni, Mr. Fred Lewis Collins, P. A. '00, who told of the good advantages offered at Harvard. W. A. Schick, Jr., then spoke on the Executive Committee, after which a break was made from the regular program and G. Browning, vice-president of Philo, was asked to speak a few words in behalf of his society. Beals followed with a very good talk on the weighty subject, "The Power of Oratory." The next subject, "The Athletic Advisory Committee," was taken by another alumnus, Mr. E. W. Baker, '00. Beale then addressed the assembly on the "Andover-Exeter Debate." He regretted that, notwithstanding the fact that Andover and Exeter contested in every branch of athletics, yet we did not meet in any literary way, and he also failed to agree with the Faculty in their decision on the matter. Mr. Whitney of Harvard, was next asked to say a few words. After Ryder had spoken as chairman of the dinner committee, Welsh spoke with his usual carefully chosen words. Barney came next and was requested to talk on the subject of "Smoking in Commons," which he handled very capably. After a few words had been said by Park and Davis, Cook ended the speaking with a short talk on the financial condition of Forum.

Altogether the dinner was a great success and much praise is due to the committee in charge of it, consisting of Ryder, chairman, Davis and Bishop.

Obituary.

Philip Coombs Knapp, P. A. '37, Dartmouth '41, died recently at his home in Lynn, Mass., of cerebral hemorrhage and old age. He was one of the oldest graduates of Andover and Dartmouth.

Philip Knapp was born in Newburyport, December 30, 1814, and was the oldest son of William Knapp. He prepared at Andover and from here entered Dartmouth where he graduated. After his graduation he taught school in Plymouth, Attleboro and Lynn until 1849. He then was employed in the First National Bank of Lynn until 1854, when he entered the employ of the National Bank of Commerce of Boston. He filled this position until September 1899, when he retired from business. He was a resident of Lynn from 1846 to 1878 and then moved to Boston but later returned to Lynn. He married Miss Sarah Moore in 1847 and she died in 1899. Two sons Charles W. and Philip C. survive him.

Change in Baseball Rules.

At a recent meeting of the board of directors of the National league the following changes were made in the baseball rules. As these apply to college teams and will be used this season they will be of interest to the school.

Rule 17 is changed so that a catcher shall not be allowed to stand over ten feet behind the batter at any time and this shall be marked by a line to define the position.

Rule 43. The first and second foul balls shall be counted as strikes if not caught. After second no more fouls to count as strikes except attempted bunt as heretofore.

Pitched ball hitting batsman shall be called a ball.

Rule 32, 1. The pitcher shall not delay the game over twenty seconds on penalty of having a ball called.

2. Pitcher shall not throw the ball to any player except catcher if the batsman is ready, except to catch a baserunner, on penalty of having a ball called.

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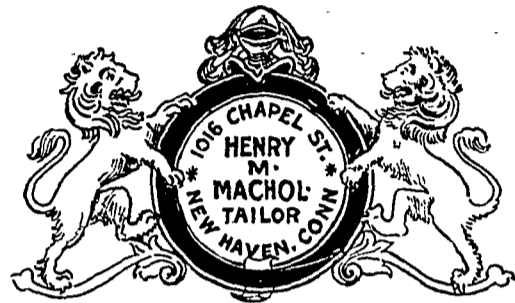

Could not those in charge take the matter in hand and take steps toward introducing a custom which would be so useful to all concerned? P. A.

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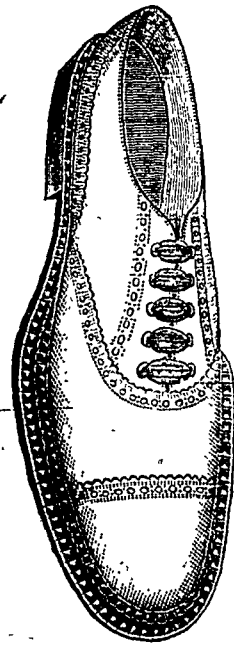
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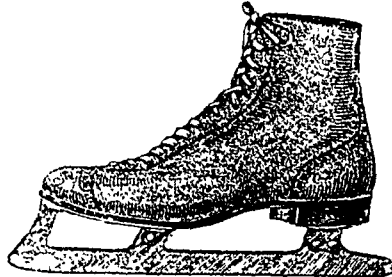
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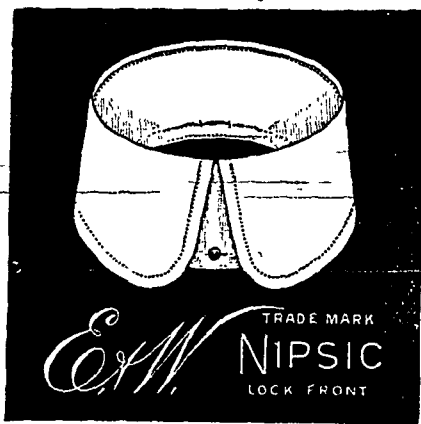

No photographs will be received after the end of this term.

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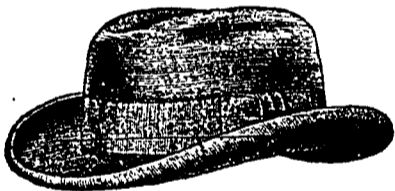
