New Department of Archaeology.

Although the announcement of the founding of a new department in the Academy has given rise to many inquiries, no public mention has been made by the Trustees either of the source or the amount of the gift in accordance with the wishes of the donor. It is known however that the Archaeological Department will be established on a foundation larger than any other single gift to any of the Andover institutions. For the present its work will be confined to American Archaeology. In the building to be erected, for which a sufficient sum of money is provided, will be displayed collections numbering forty thousand or more specimens. A distinguished expert in the department has been appointed Curator and will be the resident director and instructor. It is the especial hope of the generous benefactor that the building will become the center of the social life of the school much as the gymnasium will be the centre of its athletic interests. The funds provided are sufficient for salaries, current expenses, a moderate amount of original work in the field, the publications of results and the increase of the collections. None of the present overburdened resources of the Academy will be taxed for the support of this new addition and it will provide a new attraction for parents and friends who come up to see the school.

With this Archaeological Department and the gymnasium in the near future, Andover's prospects look very bright indeed and there is no reason why, a few years hence, the catalogue will not enroll 500 instead of 400 students.
