New Department of Archaeology.

Although the announcement of the founding of a new department in the Academy has given rise to many inquiries, no public mention has been made by the Trustees either of the source or the amount of the gift in accordance with the wishes of the donor. It is known however that the Archaeological Department will be established on a foundation larger than any other single gift to any of the Andover institutions. For the present its work will be confined to American Archaeology. In the building to be erected, for which a sufficient sum of money is provided, will be displayed collections numbering forty thousand or more specimens. A distinguished expert in the department has been appointed Curator and will be the resident director and instructor. It is the especial hope of the generous benefactor that the building will become the center of the social life of the school much as the gymnasium will be the centre of its athletic interests. The funds provided are sufficient for salaries, current expenses, a moderate amount of original work in the field, the publications of results and the increase of the collections. None of the present overburdened resources of the Academy will be taxed for the support of this new addition and it will provide a new attraction for parents and friends who come up to see the school.

With this Archaeological Department and the gymnasium in the near future, Andover's prospects look very bright indeed and there is no reason why, a few years hence, the catalogue will not enroll 500 instead of 400 students.

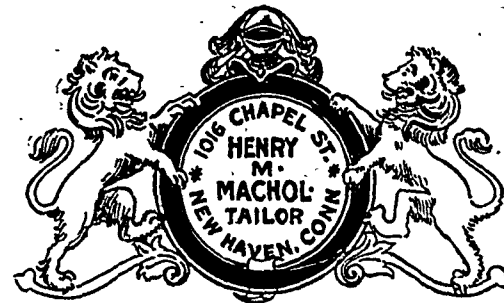

for their special use and all that is asked in return is that they stay there. The police force is organized especially for the purpose of keeping them quiet, but it can do nothing without the co-operation of the fellows. Everyone ought to feel it his duty to do all in his power toward the management of this troublesome element. So far this season, great disorder has prevailed and instead of helping the police force the fellows in the bleachers encourage the town delegation into regular rushes of fighting by throwing candy to them. As soon

as this performance commences they leave their bleacher at once and overrun the whole grounds. This may afford great amusement to the students but it causes great annoyance to the players and distracts attention from the game.

Another feature is the language used by these lads, which is decidedly indecent and which is encouraged rather than frowned upon by the school body. While this may seem a trifling matter yet it undoubtedly accounts for the lack of outside attendance at the games.

All this disturbance may easily be done away with and done this afternoon if everyone will give it proper consideration. '01.

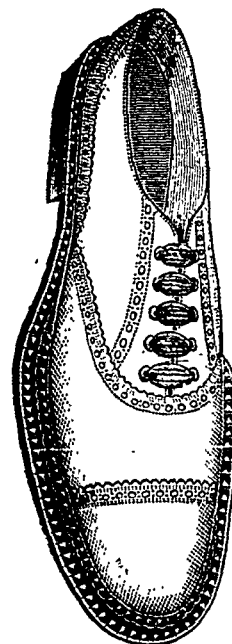

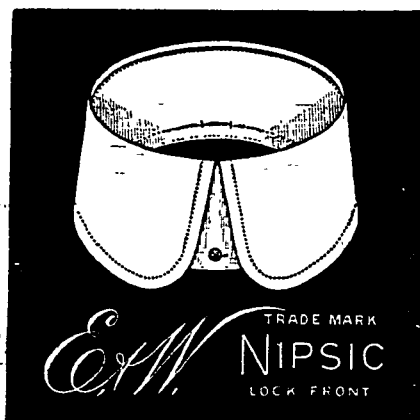

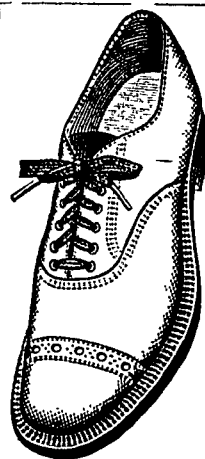
