ANDOVER 9, EXETER 2

Campbell Strikes Out Eleven Men And Allows Only One Hit. Capt. Matthews Plays the Game Through behind the Bat with Badly Torn Thumb.

Team Plays Almost Errorless Game.

Last Saturday on the campus Andover defeated Exeter in the second game of the Championship baseball series by a score of 9 to 2. One of the largest crowds that has ever witnessed an Andover-Exeter contest was present, although Exeter was very poorly represented, including a great many people from Boston. Campbell, the Andover pitcher whom Exeter protested three days before the last game was declared eligible last Wednesday and retaliated on his protestors by striking out 11 men and allowing them only one hit. He seemed to grow stronger as the game progressed and was far too speedy for his opponents. Capt. Matthews, behind the bat, gave an exhibition of sand that would have inspired any team to win. Early in the game his

thumb was split across the second joint by a swift ball and badly torn at the bottom, so that the bone projected. With his hand in this condition Matthews played the game through, giving Campbell just as good support as before and proving very nearly as strong at the bat. He made a single off Jackson and when they thought they could steal Exeter found him just as capable as ever to catch them at second.

The game was mostly played by the battery for Andover, although what the rest of the team had to do they did well. Huiskamp and Scribner

did especially effective work, the latter's running catch in the third inning being a feature of the game. Andover obtained a comfortable lead of six runs in the second inning by bunching her hits and steadily increased her score from that point.

THE GAME.

O'Brien the first man up made a long drive of the first ball pitched which was caught by Rockwell. Huiskamp and Mathews walked. Campbell advanced them both a base but Scribner was out on a grounder to Gilman. Exeter then came to the bat and Rockwell bunted to Campbell who threw wild to first giving Rockwell second. Peters and Cooney fanned and Mathews threw to Huiskamp catching Rockwell, in an attempt to steal third.

Trude opened the second with an infield fly which Rogers dropped. Hasenwinkle then flied out to Rockwell and Lanigan singled advancing Trude to second. Farson got to first on a ~~scratch~~ hit. O'Brien then sent a grounder to Rogers and was safe at first but Trude was thrown out at the plate. Then with the bases full Huiskamp lined out a pretty hit over second scoring Lanigan and Farson. Mathews walked and Campbell flied to Spencer who dropped the ball allowing O'Brien and Huiskamp to come home. Scribner then hit for two bases sending Matthews and Campbell across the plate. Trude retired the side with a grounder to Rogers. For Exeter Rogers fanned and Gilman got his base on balls but Campbell struck out Jackson and Woodsum.

In the third Hasenwinkle the first man at bat, was unable to find the ball. Lanigan singled but Farson's long fly to center was gathered in by Rockwell and O'Brien was out on a grounder to Gilman. For Exeter Scribner's beautiful running catch sent Merrow to the bench and Spencer fared no better with one to Trude. Rockwell retried the side with a foul fly to Huiskamp.

Huiskamp led off in the fourth with a single to right. Matthews tried the same place but was out. Campbell's pretty two bagger into deep left sent Huiskamp home and Scribner's hit to right advanced Campbell to third. Both were left on bases when Trude struck out and Hasenwinkle was thrown out at first. Exeter scored her first run in this inning. Peters

INTERSCHOLASTIC TRACK MEET.

Three Records Broken.

The annual Interscholastic track meet was held last Wednesday at Soldiers' Field, Cambridge. Andover won second place, an unusually good showing, considering the small number of men entered. In the hundred yard dash Schick would have undoubtedly lowered his record of 10 flat but for a mistake in measuring, by which he ran 105 yards, doing it in 10 1-2s. In the 220 he tied his record of last year. Kinney threw the hammer 139 ft. 9 1-2 in., breaking both the Interscholastic and the Andover records. In the low hurdles Scheuber of Hopkinson lowered the records by four-fifths of a second and in the broad jump both Ayers of Roxbury, and Fallows beat the old record, Ayers winning it with a jump of 22 ft. 1 1-2 in. Fallows jumped 21 ft. 11 1-2 in., 5 1-2 inches better than the Andover record made by him in the dual meet last year.

Dear Sir:—

Mr. Sherman L. Whipple, Mr. Jeremiah Smith, Jr., and I sat last evening as a committee to determine the merits of the complaint of professionalism against Mr. John Campbell, pitcher of the Phillips Andover academy base ball nine. These charges were preferred on the strength of an affidavit which stated among other things as follows:—

"That said Campbell was a member of Glenwood Base Ball club . . . that on the eleventh day of August, 1900, I paid to said Campbell money for his services in pitching a game of base ball . . ."

We are of the opinion that relying upon this affidavit the spirit of true sportmanship required the action taken by the Exeter authorities. We have thoroughly examined the writer of this affidavit and Mr. John Campbell, and have had presented to us other affidavits from members of the Glenwood Base Ball Team, and have listened to other evidence. The evidence presented to us substantially modifies and explains the meaning of the affidavit, and upon careful consideration of this evidence we are satisfied that the charges of professionalism against Mr. John Campbell were unwarranted, and we hereby completely exonerate him therefrom. We observed that the spirit of the Exeter representatives was entirely free from partisanship, and that their entire conduct seemed to be actuated by sportmanlike motives.

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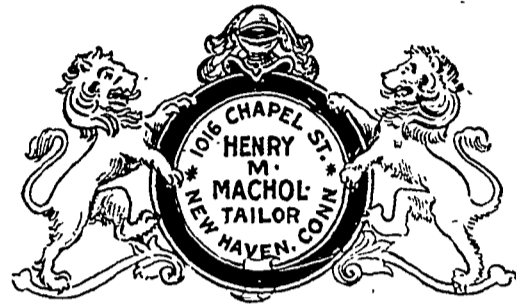
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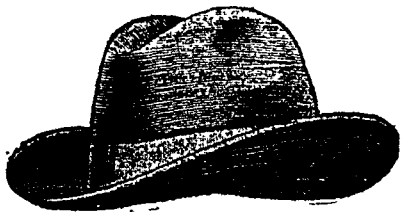

fied out to Farson. Cooney walked and was sent to second by Rogers, coming home on Gilman's two-bagger into deep left; Jackson fanned, retiring the side and leaving Gilman on second.

Andover made another run in the fifth. Lanigan fied out to Peters who also threw Farson out at first. With two gone O'Brien made a pretty hit to left, got second on a passed ball, third on an error by Gilman, which also gave Huiskamp first, and tallied on a single by Matthews. The side went out on Campbell's fly to Spencer. Campbell in the fifth made short work of Exeter by striking out Woodsum and throwing Merrow and Spencer out at first.

Andover made her last run in the sixth. Scribner got first on a wild throw to Gibson. Trude fied out to Woodsum but Hasenwinkle scored Scribner with a two-bagger to left. Lanigan fouled to Cooney and Farson was out on a grounder to Woodsum. In Exeter's half Huiskamp threw Rockwell out at first. Peters drew a base on balls, stole second and was advanced to third on Cooney's sacrifice, but Rogers fanned, retiring the side.

In the seventh O'Brien fouled out to Merrow. Huiskamp walked and Matthews, handicapped by the condition of his thumb, struck out. Campbell sent Huiskamp to third with a single but Scribner fied out to Woodsum. Campbell fanned Gilman and Jackso. Woodsum walked and stole second and Merrow closed the inning with a fly to Lanigan.

In the eighth Trude fied to Rockwell and Hasenwinkle died at first. Lanigan reached first on a dead ball but Farson was thrown out at first by Peters. Exeter scored her last run in the second half of this inning. Spencer walked, stole second, got third on Rockwell's sacrifice and scored on a passed ball. Peters drew a base on balls but Matthews threw him out at second. Lanigan made a fine running catch of Cooney's fly and retired the visitors.

In the ninth O'Brien for Andover fied out to Merrow, Huiskamp singled and got second on an error. Matthews was safe at first as Peters threw wild but Campbell's grounder forced Huiskamp out at third and Scribner was out on a grounder to Gilman. For Exeter Rogers went out, Hasenwinkle to Campbell, Huiskamp threw to Hasenwinkle, shutting

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off Gilman. Merrow finished the game
 by fouling out to Matthews, leaving
 the final score 9 to 2 in Andover's
 favor.

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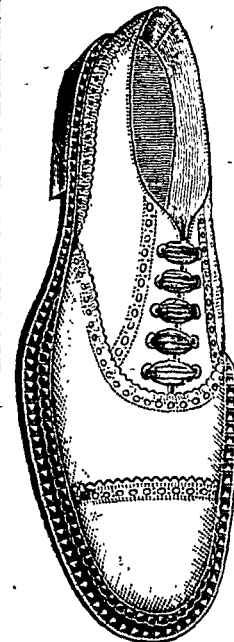

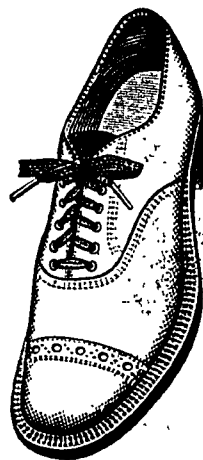
