FOOTBALL.

Andover, 17; Williston, 0.

Andover defeated Williston Seminary last Saturday, 17 to 0, the entire score being made in the first half. The visitors appeared heavier, but Andover went through their line for large gains, besides putting up a strong defensive game. The team played together well, every man getting into each play. Taylor punted well and Watkins did good work in running down punts. Ewing was rather slow in giving signals, and this naturally slowed down the plays some. The backs too, were a little slow in getting started but on the whole the team did good work, and showed much improvement. The playing in the first half was strong and full of life but in the second half the team let up some and then the game was pretty even. The first touchdown was made by Taylor in the first two and one half minutes of play. Taylor's goal from the field was one of the features of the game.

FIRST HALF.

Taylor kicked off to Williston's 15-yd. line where O'Connell caught the ball and ran 3 yards. Williston was held for downs and the ball went to Andover. Kinney and Bliss netted 12 yards. Taylor made the first touchdown and kicked the goal.

Andover received the kick off on her 35-yd. line. Failing to gain on the next two downs Taylor punted 33 yards. Williston fumbled and Watkins fell on the ball. Bliss and Taylor, with Kinney, back, made steady gains for Andover and Arnold went through for the second touchdown. Taylor kicked the goal.

Williston kicked off to Andover's 20-yd. line. Bliss lost 2 yards and Taylor punted 40. Bliss regained the ball on a fumble. Andover failed to gain and Taylor punted 35 yards. After an exchange of punts Andover secured the ball on Williston's 10-yd. line where Taylor kicked a goal from the field.

Williston kicked off to the 20-yard line. Watkins caught the ball and ran 25 yards. Andover lost 5 yards and the ball went to Williston on a fumble.

Time was called with the ball on Andover's 30-yd. line. Score—Andover 17; Williston 0.

SECOND HALF.

Williston kicked off to the 30-yd. line to Ewing who ran 15 yards. Taylor gained 10 through tackle. Andover was penalized 10 yards for offside. Bliss bucked the line for 22 yards but Andover lost the ball and 5 yards for interference. McMillian and O'Connell hit the line for 8 yards.

Andover regained the ball on downs and Bliss made 10 through tackle. Mains was here substituted for Taylor and Cates for Clark. Andover lost the ball by a fumble. Williston punted to Ewing who ran 5 yards. After a short gain by Mains Willis-

ton's line held firm and Gilbert punted 40 yards. Mains blocked Williston's punt and Davis fell on the ball. Humbird here replaced Bliss at half.

Time was called with the ball on Williston's 20-yd. line. Score—Andover 17; Williston 0.

Friday afternoon will be held the annual Fall Meet and relay races on the Upper Campus. The Phillipian wishes to take this opportunity to impress upon the entire school, and especially its new members, the importance of giving to track, our most hearty support and co-operation from the outset. Otherwise we can never expect to win.

Our successive defeats in the dual meet, have been due to the fact that Exeter shows much more interest in track than we do.

Now that we are about to have the use of one of the best school gyms. in the country, it certainly seems as though our chances for a victory should be materially increased. Whether or not we are to retrieve our past defeats, depends to a great extent upon the Fall Meet: we cannot realize this too fully.

The custom of clapping the team as they come into morning chapel, which has been prevalent in the past, has not been observed as yet, this year. It is one of the few ways we have of showing our appreciation for the work of our teams. This afternoon we play with Newburyport, the game which was cancelled last Saturday. It will be a hard game and the team will certainly merit as a recognition of its services, the honor of being clapped into chapel tomorrow morning.

Material for the November issue must be submitted by Saturday October 19th, for the December issue by Saturday, November 10th.



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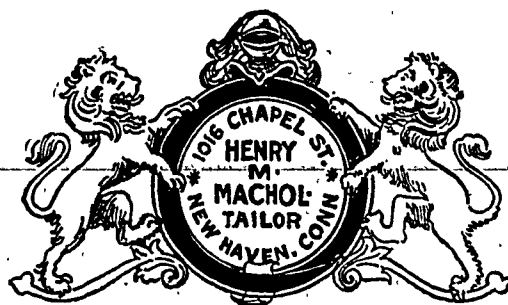
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Obituary.

WILLIAM BUEHLER LAMBERTON
 William Bueler Lamberton, of Harrisburg, Pa., died of heat exhaustion in Philadelphia, Friday, July 5.
 Mr. Lamberton was born in Harrisburg, Pa. March 14, 1855. He prepared at Andover, and graduated at Yale with high honors. Deciding on law as his profession, he entered the law office of his father, where he studied for a time. In 1877, he went abroad, studied at the University of Leipzig, travelled a while and returning to Harrisburg in 1878, was admitted to the bar of Dauphin County. In 1881 he formed a partnership with his brother, John M. Lamberton, Yale '78, for the practice of law, which firm continued till 1887. Since that time he has practiced alone. He was admitted to practice before the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania in 1882 and before the Supreme Court of the United States in 1890. In 1893 he was elected a member of the American Bar Association. In 1880 Mr. Lamberton was appointed counsel for the Harrisburg, Philadelphia & Reading Railroad, and since that time has given special attention to corporate taxation. He was a member of the Harrisburg Club, the Rittenhouse Club of Philadelphia, and the Inglenook Club and the Philadelphia Gun Club. He was also a member of the Dauphin County Historical Society and Secretary of the Harrisburg Benevolent Association as well as a member of the Board of Trade of Harrisburg. He was unmarried.

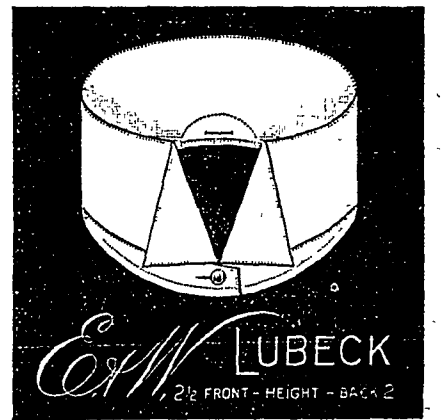

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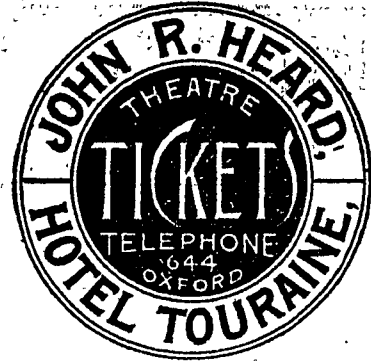
