FOOTBALL

Yale Freshmen, 11; Andover, 0.

Andover was defeated by Yale Freshmen last Saturday, 11 to 0, in a very hard fought contest. Yale played rough football and two of her players were disqualified. Twice the home team was within three yards of the goal line but was unable to force the ball over. The Freshmen scored once in each half.

In the first half Leavenworth got the ball on a fumble and made a touchdown for Andover but the score was not allowed as the referee claimed the ball was down. Yale had better developed team play than Andover and the tackle-back formation was able to make steady gains through the line.

Owsley, at half back, and Bissell, both of last year's eleven, put up a strong game.

The feature of the game was Taylor's 50-yard run around left end in the second half. On the whole Andover showed improvement over the last game.

FIRST HALF.

Andover won the toss and Taylor kicked off 45 yards to Tilney who ran 25 yards. Owsley failed to gain around end but made 5 yards through left tackle. White bucked the line for 3 yards and Bissell added 8 more on a tackle formation. White and Owsley gained 5 yards through centre and left tackle respectively. Bissell got 3 yards and then failing to gain Owsley ran around right end for 6 yards. Coonley and White netted 13 yards on the next three plays. Taylor broke through Yale's line and downed Owsley with a loss of 5 yards. Andover blocked Tilney's attempt at a goal from the field but Yale again recovered the ball. Owsley went through guard for 4 yards and White gained 2 more through centre. After the next three plays, all line plunges, White went over for a touchdown. Tiltley failed to kick goal.

Farmer received Taylor's kick off on the 5-yard line and returned it 10 yards. Andover gained the ball on a fumble and Kilney went through centre for 3 yards. Taylor made 4 yards by the next two plays and Leavenworth added 4 more through left tackle. Taylor hit the line for 12 yards and Gilbert went through centre for 2, but Andover lost the ball on downs on Yale's 3-yard line. Bissell took the ball through centre 4 yards. After a loss of 2 yards White punted 30 to Cates. Taylor failed to gain around right end and on a fumble Thompson fell on the ball for Yale. Owsley made 4 yards and Yale was given 10 for Andover's offside. Coonley went through the line for 8 yards but White was unable to gain. Farmer and Bissell made 8 yards on line plunges. Yale fumbled but regained the ball and Owsley ran 5 yards around right end. Bissell and White netted 5 yards and after slight gains, time was called with the ball on Andover's 15-yard line.

Score: Yale '05, 5; Andover 0.

Archaeological Building.

The bids for the new Archaeological building are all in and ground will soon be broken. The building will be situated on the corner of Phillips and Main streets where formerly stood Prof. Churchill's house, now moved up Main street, above the Pease House. It will be constructed of brick and stone and has been designed by Guy Lowell of Boston.

In planning the interior, Mr. Lowell has been guided by the fact that it forms a part of the large gift to the Academy not long ago, whereby an unnamed friend donated a fine archaeological collection with provision for a suitable building for the proper care and display of the many specimens.

In addition to being a museum, it also will be a sort of club house. The building will be fully one hundred feet long by fifty feet wide. Its exterior appearance will be rather plain, following along the lines of the other academy buildings, especially one which was designed by Bulfinch. The main entrance is in the centre, opening into a spacious hall wherein the largest specimens in the collection can be shown. On one side of this hall is to be a big exhibition room with an alcove, and on the opposite side is a similar hall, back of which are the custodian's office and private apartments, and a cataloguing room. The gift provides for the employment of a custodian and care of the collection.

The building is of two stories. The second floor is given over to a room, on one side of the main hall, to be used for lectures and entertainments, with a large platform provided for these purposes. This hall will seat 175 or 200 students. On the other side of the main hall is a large library and reading room and lounging place, with a stack room, which will make it possible to care for 15000 volumes. The windows on the lower floor are arched at the top, while those of the second are what architects term square headed. On the outside front of the building the pediment is finished with the seal of the academy, carved in granite, which matches the stone trimmings of the structure.

The basement of the building is commodious, but will not be completely finished at once, although the plan is to have eventually an assembly room, a grill room, various committee rooms for the athletic departments, offices for the *Phillipian* and *Mirror* and possibly a small cooperative store for the benefit of the students. The assembly room mentioned above will be elegantly furnished, and well adapted for lounging and reading. A definite center for the social life of the school will thus be provided—a thing for which we have long felt the need. In connection with the grill room there will probably be a fairly large lunch room. The reading room is to be divided into two departments one containing the daily papers where

talking will be allowed, and one set apart for writing and more quiet reading.

It is not known just when this building will be finished although it will probably be ready for use in the Spring term.

Obituary.

CHARLES WESLEY COIT.

Charles Wesley Coit, P. A. 1858, a well known real estate man of Grand Rapids, Mich., died last Wednesday morning at 5 o'clock in New Haven, Conn. He left his home Oct. 14, in good health apparently, to attend the bicentennial celebration. He was taken ill on Monday at Milford, Conn., where he had gone to secure lodging on account of the crowded condition of the New Haven hotels. The cause of his death was typhoid pneumonia.

Mr. Coit is survived by a wife and three sons, one of whom, Merrill, graduated from here last June and is now a freshman at Yale. The latter while here, was a member of the Glee club and an artist on the *Pot Pourri*. The following is a letter written by Mr. Coit to Mr. Eaton, who had requested him to speak at the commencement exercises here last spring.

Grand Rapids, Mich.,

June 5, 1901.

Dear Sir:—I thank you most heartily for your kind invitation to be present at the Andover commencement. Next year will be the class reunion of '62 at Yale, and if your invitation holds good for that time and dates do not conflict, I shall hope to accept then and can enjoy both occasions.

My memories of Phillips academy are precious. It did a great deal for me and I am sure it has for my son.

1902 Calendar.

The contract for the annual school Calendar this year has been given to R. A. Bliss, '02 and G. W. Howell, '02. As the work has already begun, the Calendar will in all probability be complete and ready for distribution by the 10th of December. The managers will commence soliciting subscriptions before Thanksgiving.

The general appearance of the Calendar will correspond to that of previous years, except that an extra page will be added. This page will be entirely given up to a memorial of Dr. Bancroft including a medium sized half-tone and a short sketch of his life. The cover will be similar to that of last year.

The cuts will be of much greater variety and interest this year than those of any former calendar. Blue will be the design color and the number of cuts will vary from 3 to 4 on a page. Pictures of the athletic teams and a combination of the musical clubs will be printed in larger sizes. A cut of the golf team is also to be included this year. Opposite the picture of each team will be half-tones of its captain and manager. The police force, cheering staff, Means and Draper prize speakers will be in medium sized cuts. Among others will be the following half-tones: the Faculty, Mr. Stearns, registrar, Mr. Freeman of the athletic advisory committee, Mr. Sawyer, the new treasurer.

The school views will consist of the Academy, the Science building, the new Gymnasium and Bancroft cottage. The list ends with a whole page given up to the school picture. The price as in former years will be one dollar a copy.

Philo's Special Announcement.

At the meeting of Philo next Friday evening, W. A. Mowry, A. M., Ph. D., P. A. '54, is to address the meeting. Dr. Mowry is one of the best known men in the educational world, both as a lecturer and teacher, and Andover, as well as Philo, is honored by such an alumnus. Dr. Mowry is one of the ten men who raised \$3,000 apiece to build the present academy building. He was a very close friend to Dr. Bancroft of whom he will speak. The subject of address he is to give at the meeting of Philo is, "Andover and Philo in the early '50's." This address is to be given in connection with the regular program, after which a short reception will be held. Everyone is cordially invited to attend. Dr. Mowry will also speak at Saturday morning chapel.

The 1902 and 1904 class pins have arrived. All who ordered any or wish to get any can secure them from S. S. Azhderian, E. C., 2-6.



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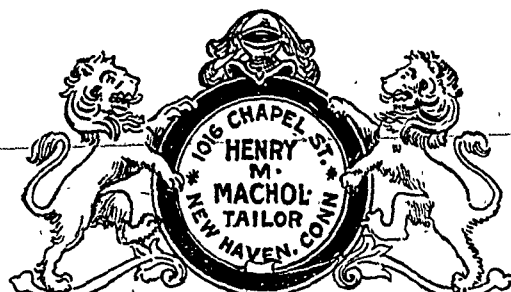

SECOND HALF.

The second half began with no change in either team. Tilney kicked to Leavenworth on the 15-yard line, who ran it back 10 yards. Leavenworth lost 2 yards but Taylor gained 7 through the line. Leavenworth again failed to gain and Andover was held for downs. Yale took the ball and Owsley went around right end for 7 yards. Coonley was here disqualified and Bettes took his place at right tackle. Farmer went through left guard for 3 yards. Preston was here substituted for Owsley. Andover held the Freshmen and got the ball on downs. Taylor hit the line for 8 yards and then gained 45 around right end. Gilbert made 4 yards but Andover was again penalized 10 for offside. Leavenworth went around left end for 10 yards and Taylor made 5 through tackle. Neal here took Wicke's place at right end in the Yale lineup. Leavenworth failed to gain but, with Kinney back, Taylor plunged through right tackle for 4 yards. The next three plays netted 10 yards for Andover. Pearsall, who was here substituted for Leavenworth, failed to gain, but Taylor in the next four plays advanced the ball 18 yards. Yale broke through the line with a loss of four yards to Andover. Taylor tried for a goal from the 10-yard line but was blocked and the ball went to Yale. Farmer went through tackle for 12 yards and Preston gained 15 more. Farmer hit the line for 10 yards and Andover was penalized 10 yards for offside. Farmer and White got 4 and 3 yards respectively. Washington was here

substituted for Sumner. Preston made 15 yards on an end run and the next three plays netted Yale 18 yards. White was then pushed over for the second touchdown. Tilney kicked the goal.

Taylor kicked off 35 yards to Tilney who advanced the ball 13 yards. White made 2 yards and Preston followed with 8 more around right end. Time was called with the ball on Yale's 40-yard line.

Rev. Franklin S. Hatch, P. A. '79, who is Secretary of Christian Endeavor work in India, expects to visit Ceylon during these autumn months.

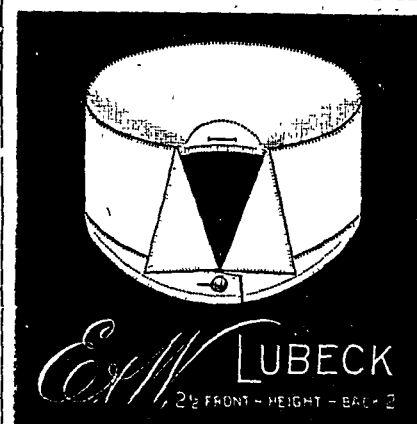
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Gun Club Notice.
