#### Communication.

#### Editors of the Philipian:

As a senior and one who has been a member of this school for four years. I should like to be allowed the privilege of asking a few questions in your columns, trusting that some one may see fit to answer them in your next issue. I should like to know why the whole school should not have a voice in the nomination of the three candidates for a managership. As it is now, the athletic advisory board is despotic in its power and, like a royal family, hands down to its friends the managerships from year to year. The argument can be raised of course that the present system saves trouble and secures the elections of the most able men. I do not say that the most able men for the positions are not elected every time, but nevertheless it is not fair to the school as a whole to leave the nomination of candidates to a few fellows. Andover is famous for its democracy, but is this in keeping with such a reputation? It is indeed surprising that we have put up with such a restriction for so long a time.

My plan would be to call a school meeting and allow any man to put up as many names as he might wish, and for these names to be recorded on a blackboard on the platform. After this, Mr. Freeman, or some other member of the faculty, could strike from the list any names which might be ineligible on account of low scholarship or for other\_reasons. Then a ballot could be taken and each mem--ber of the school allowed\_to write\_the three names which he might desire to have run for the position. Then three days later, the final election could be held in the usual way. This method would naturally take a little more time, but it would be far more fair to the school and more satisfactory to everyone.

Will you kindly state in your next issue the reasons against such a plan, if there are any, and to whom or before what body an amendment to the manner of electing managers should be put? I am voicing the sentiments of many by this communication and hope that a satisfactory answer can be given, or a change brought about.

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
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
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
