## HOCKEY.

Andover, 4; Brown, 1.

Last Saturday Andover easily defeated Brown University in a hard played game of hockey by the score of 7 to 1. Snow was falling throughout the game, which made fast play almost impossible.

Andover's defence put up the strongest game of the season and are responsible for Brown's small score. The forwards showed improved team work and kept their positions much better, especially during the second half. Andover's forwards showed more accuracy in their shooting than the Brown men, Hodge and Dousman especially. Paine played the best game for the visitors. Andover's defence men lifted better than in former games.

### FIRST HALF.

The game was called at 3.45. Andover took the puck and after some minutes of spirited rushing, Hodge passed to P. L. Reed, who shot a clean goal. Hodge then scored by individual work, and Dousman added another. Just before time was called Paine scored Brown's only goal.

Score—Andover, 3; Brown, 1.

### SECOND HALF.

Andover's team work was too much for their opponents, and shortly after the half opened, Dousman, receiving the puck on a pretty pass from Allworth, scored. The Andover forwards improved as the game progressed and P. L. Reed and Dousman shot goals in succession. The last goal was made by Allworth. Pevear and Paine here exchanged places, but no further scoring was done.

## Inquiry.

The regular meeting of Inquiry last Sunday was opened with a prayer by Gallyon. After scripture reading by President Gurley, Mr. F. Boyd Edwards, P. A. '96, chairman of the graduate advisory committee of Inquiry, addressed the meeting. He said in part:—

School is not so much a place of life in itself as it is a place to prepare for the battle of later life.

The phrase "who cares" is the most prophetic expression of failure. When the whole country was saying, "who cares", Abraham Lincoln laid down his life, that the negro might be freed. Again when all England was saying "who cares", Lord Shaftsbury devoted his life in the accomplishment of one object, that the children of England should not work in the mines and receive the neglect which had been accorded them for years.

Mr. Edwards next spoke of the large per cent of convicts and lunatics who were the result of drunkenness and sin. "Gambling is the most crying evil in New York society to-day, and after looking at the terrible evils which exist in New York and every large city, what man with good family and sober thought can look out on this vice and crime without doing his little share to better it. In President McKinley's life we find one of the most striking examples of personal influence. He started life with no conspicuous advantages and before his death he had won the affections of the whole country."

Mr. Edwards closed the meeting with a prayer.

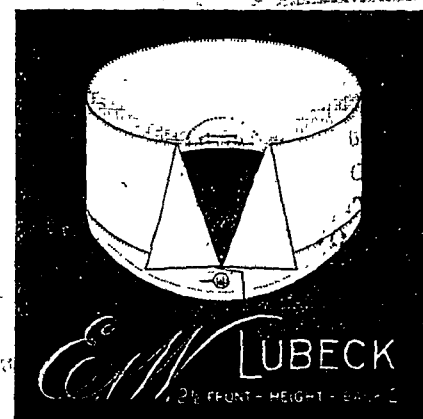
