## HOCKEY.

Andover, 2; Town team, 0.

Andover defeated the town team in a slow and uninteresting game of hockey last Saturday, 2 to 0. The game was characterized by rough play during both halves, and a great deal of disputing on the part of the town team. Neither side scored during the first half although Andover kept the puck in the territory of her opponents most of the time. Andover's forwards were too fast for the town team but failed to do enough passing. The defence had very little to do as the town team played a wholly defensive game, all collecting in front of the goal and making it difficult to score. The remarkable playing of Lynch for the town team at goal prevented the score from being much larger.

For Andover, Hodge and Dousman did the best work, although no one played in his usual form, which was partly due to the heavy wind. In the first half the forwards showed too much individual work and although they made many shots for the goal all were blocked. During the second half Andover showed great improvement in team play and shooting. Dousman made the first goal. Soon after the forwards carried the puck the whole length of the rink and Allworth scored on a pass from Hodge. Andover scored again but it was not allowed.

For the remainder of the game the town team kept close in front of their goal and no further scoring could be done.

### Capt. Chadwick's Address at Inquiry.

President C. O. Day of the Seminary, opened the regular meeting of Inquiry, Sunday evening, with a prayer. Mr. Chadwick, Yale '03, and captain of next year's football team, then addressed the meeting on the religious life at college. He said in part:

"When you fellows go to college you should enter into the Christian life. But if you are to be a Christian you must do so positively. You cannot be half and half, but should decide what you are to be and then bend all your energies towards living up to your decision. This same rule applies to athletics, studies and to work in after life. In your freshman year it may seem to you to be the best thing to follow after the sporty crowd but before long the strong men and leaders begin to show up as they are invariably bound to do.

"Another thing to be careful about is not to become over-enthusiastic in religion, for a reaction is bound to follow." Mr. Chadwick then cited instances of fellows who had listened to some great preacher and had gone out thinking that it would be an easy thing to live rightly and to help the world. In each case a re-action followed and with disastrous results.

He closed by showing how a person by becoming a good Christian can benefit other people even unconsciously besides saving themselves.

### Entertainment in Bartlett Chapel.

Last evening the Ladies Benevolent Society gave a reception to which two upper classes of Abbot academy and the senior class of Phillips were invited. About thirty from each school were present in addition to many townspeople. Several members of the Theological Seminary acted as ushers.

The Glee club opened the program with a song entitled "Willie had a Purple Monkey" which was well received and as an encore the club sang "The Tinker's Song" from Robinhood.

Next came the first scene of a pantomime of James Russell Lowell's famous poem entitled "The Happy Lot of Mr. Knott." The scene showed Mr. Knott in consultation with an architect, planning for the construction of a house, and proudly showing the woodland which he himself had made by the temporary erection of three trees, two of which were dead.

At the close of the scene, Mr. Rossister Howard, of Harvard, P. A. '98, sang a solo "I Cannot Help Loving Thee," by Clayton John. He responded to an encore.

The second scene of the poem was then presented in which several suitors for the hand of Miss Knott appeared. Mr. Knott wished his daughter to marry a colonel, but she had no hesitation in showing her dislike for the military man, as she already loved a doctor.

After this scene the Glee club sang "Please won't you be my H—m?" The song was well rendered and was repeated in response to a hearty encore.

The third scene followed, in which Mr. Knott finds his house haunted. The ghost of his wife comes in and moves about the house in her accustomed way. After a restless night he is just beginning to sleep when his domestic animals create a disturbance which makes sleep impossible.

Between scenes three and four Mr. Howard again sang a solo, entitled "Mattinata," by Tosti, and in response to a continued applause, gave as an encore, "Beloved, it was April Weather," by P. L. Atherton, P. A. '89.

Lastly came the final scene of the pantomime. By this time more ghosts have appeared and they go about all day working mischief. Soon the reputation of the house spreads and people of all descriptions come to ask the spirits questions. At last comes the Colonel whom Mr. Knott is trying to force his daughter to marry. The ghosts at once denounce him as a murderer and say they will abandon the house provided that Mr. Knott will allow his daughter to marry whom she will. He at once consents and gives his blessing. A minister is summoned who marries the couple at once.

### Andover Wins Relay Race.

Andover won the fourth annual relay race with Exeter at the B. A. A. meet last Saturday by one half a lap. The race had to be called earlier than usual in order to allow the Andover team to catch the 11.15 train.

Exeter won the toss and took the pole. Watkins ran first for Andover and on the first turn passed his man. Before finishing he had gained a lead of fifteen yards without apparent effort.

H. Edwards ran second and kept up a good steady pace throughout, considerably increasing the lead. R. Edwards who ran third for Andover increased the lead to 30 yards. Cates (capt) was Andover's last man. He ran a splendid race, finishing about one half a lap in the lead.

Although the race was not at all close, Andover beat her own previous record by 2-5 of a second establishing a new one of 3 minutes 17 seconds.

Andover had only three men in the open events.

Scullin ran in the 45 yd low hurdles but being unfortunate in the start was unable to qualify.

Kelley ran in the novice 40 yds dash and considering his lack of experience did very well.

McGovern, in the high jump, although having a six inch handicap failed to qualify.

Schildmiller and Petit, were entered in the mile but were unable to compete as the event came too late.

Andover did not expect to do much in the open events but her chief interest was centered in the relay race. There was a good delegation present and considerable cheering was done.

The whole class in archaeology has been invited to go to Harvard to see Dr. Peabody's museum whenever it may be most convenient for the members.

A pamphlet has been issued by Talcott Williams, P. A. '69, editor of the Philadelphia Press, entitled, "The Historical and Ethical Basis of Monogamy."

The subject for Harvard-Princeton debate, which will be held on March 26, is Resolved: "That Mayor Low should strictly enforce the excise laws in N. Y. City."

Prof. John M. Tyler of Amherst, teacher in Phillips 1873-1874 is to speak before the Stamford, Conn., high school on March 7, on the subject, "Education in the Twentieth Century."

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
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
