## BASKET BALL.

Andover, 45; M. I. T., 11.

Andover defeated M. I. T. 45 to 11 at basketball last Wednesday evening in Town the hall, making a record of three victories in three games played.

The home team outclassed the visitors in team play and were more aggressive. There was more or less unnecessary roughness throughout the game and both teams were repeatedly penalized for fouls. McGovern played the best game for Andover, making nine goals from the floor and three from fouls. Fitch played the best game for the visitors.

Andover was somewhat crippled by the temporary loss of Thompson, who was unable to play on account of illness.

### FIRST HALF.

The game started at 7.15 and Andover immediately took the offensive. After a few minutes of play, McGovern threw Andover's first goal. Technology did most of her scoring in this half, although Andover kept a safe lead throughout. The half ended with the score: Andover, 23; M. I. T., 9.

### SECOND HALF.

During the second half the ball was kept near M. I. T.'s goal most of the time. The visitors seemed to tire and rely more on individual work, while Andover played consistently and was able to increase her lead 22 points. The final score was: Andover, 45; M. I. T., 11.

## MEETING OF TRUSTEES.

Prof. Clifford Moore, of Harvard, and Pres. George Harris Elected to Board.

At a meeting of the trustees of the Academy last Saturday in the trustee's room, Tremont building, Boston, Prof. Clifford Moore of Harvard and Pres. George Harris of Amherst were added to the board of trustees.

Mr. Clifford Moore graduated from Harvard in 1889. While there he belonged to the Classical club, Everett Athenaeum, Natural History society, Phi Beta Kappa, Signet, and was prominent in Y. M. C. A. work. He graduated with honors in classics and delivered the Latin salutatory at commencement. He was also business manager of the *Harvard Monthly Magazine*.

From 1889 to 1892 he was a teacher of Latin and Greek at the Belmont school, Belmont, Cal. He married Miss Lorena Leadbetter of Charlestown, Mass., July 23, 1890 and was appointed professor of Greek here, Sept. '92. In 1894, Mr. Moore accepted a position as instructor in Latin at the University of Chicago and was succeeded by Prof. Benner. From '95 to '98 he was assistant professor of Latin in the same university and Dean from March to June '98. In Sept. '98, he was appointed assistant professor of Greek and Latin at Harvard. He received the degree of Ph. D. at Munich in 1897.

Prof. George Harris is a graduate of the Andover Theological seminary and of Amherst. He was for a while a pastor in Maine, and for some years has been pastor of the Central Congregational church of Providence. While there he was very influential in church work and city affairs, and was known as a man of activity and energy and as a convincing preacher.

In 1855 he was called to the chair of Systematic Theology at the Theological Seminary and held the place for 11 years. In 1899 he was chosen president of Amherst. President Harris is the author of several books, one of which is entitled, "Moral Evolution," a reply to a book on "Social Evolution." It is much spoken of for its vivacity of style.

## Hockey Captain.

At a meeting of the hockey team held last Thursday noon, Paul R. Reed '03 of Andover, Mass., was elected captain for next year. Reed was substitute on last year's team, and has played point on this year's hockey team. It was also voted to have jerseys instead of sweaters.

## Prof. Forbes at Forum.

Prof. Forbes then gave a short lecture on "The Magician of Middle Ages,—Virgil." As usual he was very humorous and interesting.

The subject for debate was Resolved, "That it is for the best interest of the United States army that army canteens be re-established." The affirmative was supported by Nutter and O'Nash, the negative by Angell and Otis. From the house Kellogg, Patterson, and Greely spoke on the affirmative; Bigwood and Ryder on the negative. 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
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
