ANDOVER WINS TRACK.

Defeats Exeter 53 to 51 in a Very Close and Exciting Meet.

Three Dual Records Broken.

Andover defeated Exeter in the dual track games, for the first time in five years, at Exeter, last Saturday. The meet was without question the closest and most exciting one ever held between the two schools. The result was in doubt up to the very last event, and the final score of 53 to 51 shows in some degree how evenly matched the teams were. Three of the dual records were broken in the field events, two of them by Andover and one by Exeter.

To much credit cannot be given to the Andover team for the spirit and determination shown from beginning to end. The result is particularly gratifying inasmuch as Andover won without having had the advantage of a winter gymnasium training. Andover showed her superiority clearly in all the track events, except the 100, 220, 440, 880 and mile. Mr. Peet deserves great praise for his work this year. The men under his care have developed wonderfully and were all in the best of condition. The support accorded the team by the school was the best in years. This victory gives Andover the lead in track again as she has now won five out of the nine meets held up to this time.

The 100 yard dash was the first event. Sumner, as was expected of him, won easily in fair time. Watkins was a good second. The Exeter men got a trifle the better start but at fifty yards, Sumner and Watkins led by a generous margin. They increased this lead to the finish. Higgins of Exeter won the third place. First and second places in the 120 yard hurdles were won by Exeter. Coffin and Anderson took the lead at the start and were never headed although Fry closed up in the last few yards and was beaten for second place by only a few feet.

The mile run was one of the prettiest events of the meet. Strayer of Andover took the pace at the start and held it for two laps. Ferry and Smith were running well within themselves in third and fourth places, respectively. Jenkins took the pace during the second lap but was soon forced to drop back. Smith then came up and led until the back stretch was reached on the last lap. Here Ferry passed him and increased his lead to the finish. Smith and Jenkins ran the last fifty yards side by side and tied for second.

Watkins won the 440 yard run in a comparatively easy manner. At the end of the first 300 yards Watkins was leading with R. Edwards and H. Edwards following in the order named. Runyon then passed the Edwards brothers and made a desperate but unsuccessful attempt to catch Watkins. The time was fast considering the poor condition of the track on the turns. H. Edwards se-

cured third, by a beautiful burst of speed in the last fifty yards.

Fry took the lead in the 220 yard hurdles and would undoubtedly have held it had he not stumbled on the fourth hurdle. He was running strong and was rapidly opening up a lead. He was unable to make up all the distance lost, however, and finished third. Anderson and Coffin finished first and second respectively.

Kinney, who had been ill some days before the meet was not up to his usual form in the shot put. Knowlton won it with a put of 39 feet 1 inch. McLanahan secured third.

The high jump was a surprise in that Andover secured three points, through a tie between Marshall and McGovern, for second place. Whitcomb of Exeter, who won the event, jumped for the record and established a new one at 5 feet 10 inches.

The 220 yard dash was another easy win for Sumner. He started out at a beautiful clip and at the end of the first 100 yards had a big lead. He maintained this lead to the finish. Peters and Higgins finished second and third. Grant, who had the pole was unintentionally interfered with by one of the officials as he passed.

The half mile was a walk over for Cates. At no stage of the race did he have to run for a place. Perkins took the pace for the first lap with Cates and Nichols running second and third. On entering the second lap Cates took the lead and held it throughout. Nichols ran a plucky race and did all that was expected of him. Allen of Exeter did not prove as dangerous as reported and had to fight for second place. The time was slow.

Andover was unfortunate in the broad jump, as neither Cates nor Campbell could get his form. Both had been doing better than 20 feet, and their failure to secure a place was a disappointment. All three places therefore, went to Exeter. The hammer throw proved a surprise to all. Brill and Capt. Connor were supposed to be able to throw better than 140 feet. Neither could equal this mark, however in the meet. Kinney who got first, broke the dual record with a throw of 145 feet, 7 inches. Chase secured third.

In the pole vault, McGovern cleared

BASEBALL

Georgetown 8; Andover, 6.

Last Thursday Andover was defeated by Georgetown in one of the best played games of the season. The batting was strong and the fielding very good. Beach caught a plucky game in spite of a split finger and Baker pitched strongly, although he failed to keep the hits as scattered as his opponents. The base running was a great improvement over that of the previous games. On the whole the game had life and snap to it and the team was seen at its best.

The Georgetown team played a good game but it was more their ability to bunch their hits than their superior playing which won the game for them.

IN DETAIL.

O'Brien opened for Andover with a hit to centre. Scribner reached first on fielder's choice when O'Brien was put out at second. Huiskamp was thrown out at first and Scribner failed to see second. Out of the four Georgetown men at bat only one reached first, the other three striking out.

In the second inning Beach flied out to Morgan and Clough singled to right. Gilchrist hit to centre, which O'Hara fumbled, and allowed Clough to come home. Carter and Baker struck out. In the second half Georgetown went out in one, two, three order.

In the third the home team failed to score and the visitors again went out in order.

The fourth was unfortunate for Andover as Georgetown bunched her hits and made five runs. Dorman singled to centre and Moran reached second on Baker's error. Morgan flied out to Carter and Dorman crossed the plate on the throw home. Aperious hit to centre bringing in Moran and stole second. O'Hara singled to the same place and Aperious reached third. Scribner's overthrow of Golden's hit at third allowed Aperious and O'Hara to come home. Drake's single scored Golden. Blewett went out on a foul fly to Beach and Dowling died at first, retiring the side. Andover again failed to score.

Hodge was first up in the fifth and was hit by the ball. O'Brien singled to centre field and Scribner was given fielder's choice. O'Brien was thrown out on second when Huiskamp also got his base by fielder's choice and Hodge scored on the throw to first. Beach failed to see first and Huiskamp was caught between first and second.

In the sixth no score was made by either side. Hodge opened the seventh with a hit to left. O'Brien singled to right and Hodge went to third on Drake's error. Scribner drove out a pretty two-bagger over centre, bringing in O'Brien and Hodge. Huiskamp struck out. Beach singled and Clough reached first on fielder's choice when Scribner was caught at the plate. Gilchrist singled to right field and Beach scored. Carter struck out.

In the second half Cox, who replaced Blewett in the box for Georgetown, reached first on an error by Hodge and second on a passed ball. Dowling walked and was sacrificed to second by Dorman. Moran hit for two bases, bringing in Cox and Dowling, crossing the plate himself on a two bagger by Aperious.

Scribner, first up in the ninth, failed to reach first as did Huiskamp. Beach walked and Clough singled to centre. A hit by Gilchrist scored Beach. No further score was made. Score: Georgetown 8; Andover 6.

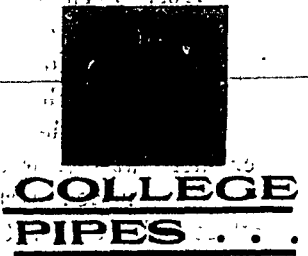

The doubles, which are now being played, will probably be finished by the end of this week.

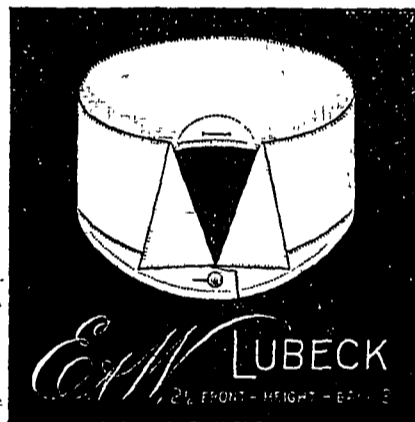

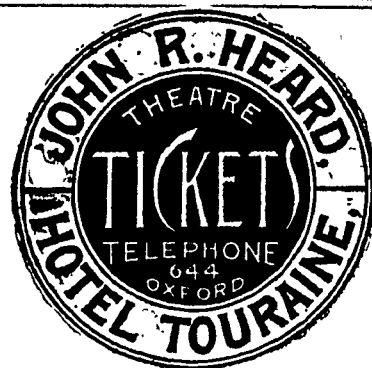
