ANDOVER WINS.

Defeats Stone School 18 to 0 in a Snappy and Fairly Well Played Game.

Last Wednesday afternoon Andover defeated Stone School 16 to 0 in a fairly satisfactory contest considering the time of the season and the number of new men tried out. On the whole the men failed to charge with the ball as they should have and they were uneven in blocking opponents. The handling of punts was not very sure, there being a tendency to catch them with the hands. Part of the work of the half backs was excellent, but still a good many times the runners failed to follow their interference. There was a very pleasing desire shown on the part of the men to assist each other. While the play on the whole was snappy, at least one touchdown ought to have been made in the second half.

FIRST HALF.

Andover won the toss and took the west goal with a slight wind at her back. Andrews kicked off for Andover to the 10-yard line, where Leatherbee gathered in the ball and ran it back seven yards. On the next play he circled left end for a first down. On two plunges through left centre LeMoynes got 4 1-2 yards, but Leatherbee was unable to gain the remaining half yard and the ball went to Andover on downs at Stone's 23-yard line.

Bullock secured two yards through left tackle and Cates added five more.

In two plays through left centre Bullock and Cranmer netted six yards and Humbird went through right tackle for two more. Cates tried left tackle with no gain but in two line plunges Bullock advanced the ball eight yards. Cates tried left tackle again with no gain, but on the next play Bullock went over for a touchdown and Andrews kicked goal. Score: Andover 6, Stone 0.

LeMoynes kicked off to Brown on the 15-yard line and heran it back 15. On the next play Humbird with good interference and excellent dodging, got around left end and ran 80 yards for a touchdown. Andrews kicked goal. Score: Andover 12, Stone 0.

Conrad received the kick-off on the 30-yard line and advanced the ball five yards. Humbird punted to LeMoynes on Stone's 20-yard line.

LeMoynes tried centre for a slight gain but Leatherbee lost three yards. LeMoynes punted to Dillon on the 40-yard line, who failed to advance the ball.

In three line plays Andover got eight yards, but on the next play lost five yards for off-side. Humbird fumbled but Cates made a quick recovery. Humbird secured 20 yards around left end and Cranmer made a slight gain through right tackle. Bullock fumbled and Stone regained the ball on her 17-yard line.

LeMoynes tried right guard and tackle twice without a gain, and then LeMoynes punted to the 45-yard line where Dillon received the ball.

Cranmer got a yard through right

tackle but Bullock hit the line for no gain. On the next, play a fake kick, Bullock broke through right tackle for 20 yards, and Cranmer and Humbird each got four more through the the same place. Cates hit left tackle for a gain and Cranmer skirted right end for 11 yards. On the next play Bullock placed the ball on the 9 yard line from where Andrews plunged through left tackle for a touchdown and kicked the goal. Score: Andover 18, Stone school 0.

LeMoynes kicked off to Dillon on the 10-yard line, who advanced the ball 25 yards. After three line plays netting 10 yards, Cranmer went around right end for 25 yards. Here Andover lost five yards for off-side. In the next play Cates fumbled but Humbird recovered the ball with a loss of three yards. Two line plays were tried, bringing the ball to Stone's 45-yard line when time was called.

Score: Andover 18, Stone school 0.

SECOND HALF.

At the beginning of the second half Reynolds was substituted for Cranmer in the Andover line-up. LeMoynes kicked off 50 yards to Reynolds, who punted back 30 to LeMoynes. Stone school attempted to kick but were blocked and Reynolds obtaining the ball, ran 40 yards. Reynolds interference, however, slugged, so the ball was given Stone school in the middle of the field. However, they were unable to gain and the ball went to Andover on downs. Dillon made eight yards and Reynolds added four more. Walker was then put in at right half and Reynolds went to full back. For Stone school Lovell was substituted for Leonard. Cates secured 18 yards and after that Andover failed to gain and thus lost the ball on downs. Devonshire made 5 yards but Stone school again failed to gain their distance and LeMoynes punted 25 yards to Dillon. After a few plays Heidrich was put in at left half and Guiney at left tackle. The ball was then advanced steadily down to field to the 7-yard line where time was called with the final score: Andover 18, Stone school 0.

FALL TRACK TEAM

1905 Wins the Class Relay Race. Guiney Breaks the School Record in the Shot Put.

The annual Fall handicap track meet was held yesterday afternoon on the upper campus. The day was very clear but cold and the track was in fair condition. Several new and promising men showed up well in the different events. In the shot put Guiney broke the school record with a put of 41 feet. The former record was 40 feet 2 in, held by R. P. Kinney P. A. '02. Douglass, Young, Brewer, Velie, Orr, and Nash all promise well for next Spring. Wilcox and Clough also put up good races.

By far the most exciting and interesting event of the afternoon was the class relay race.

On the first quarter of the race, Young '06, took the lead and finished well ahead of the second man. Clough '05, in the second round secured the lead for 1905, who held it until the end of the race, although Nash '06, made a pretty attempt to catch Douglass '05, in the last relay. Hon. Bird S. Coler, P. A. '86 is mentioned as the most promising candidate for Governor of New York state on the Democratic ticket.

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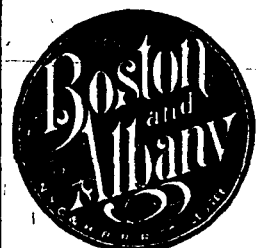
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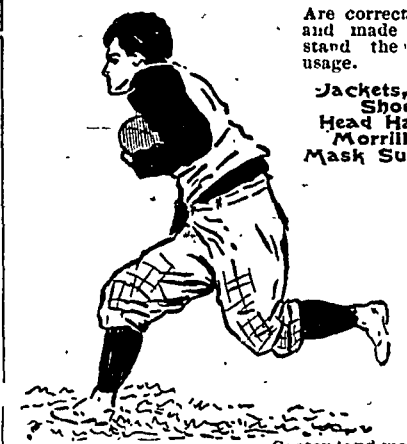
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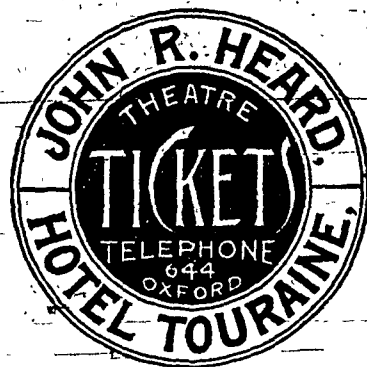
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
