ANDOVER WINS

Defeats Boston College in a Well Played Game on the Andover Campus.

Andover defeated Boston college 24 to 0 last Saturday afternoon in a well played game. Although the Boston line was heavier, man for man, still Andover held them easily, and the backs rarely failed to gain their distance. The play was hard and fast throughout, and gave an excellent trying out to the men. Considering that the team was composed largely of substitutes, they played a remarkably fine game. However there was a strong tendency to get offside, which caused much loss.

FIRST HALF

Boston College won the toss, and taking the east goal, Snllivan kicked off to Dillon on his 25 yard line. Dillon ran the ball into the 35 yard line and then Humbird went around left end for 35 yards. Cates followed through left tackle with 30 more. Conrad gained through right tackle, but Humbird failed to gain. Reynolds plunged through right centre for 2 yards, and Andrews got 4 more through left tackle. On two rushes the ball was advanced 7 yards bringing it to the 4 yard line, and on the next play Reynolds broke through right centre-for-a touchdown. Andrews kicked the goal. Score Andover 6; Boston College 0.

Sullivan kicked off to Reynolds on the 5 yard line. Reynolds, after running the ball in 10 yards, attempted to make a return kick but the ball was blocked and Boston secured it on Andover's 30 yard line.

Nickerson hit the line for a slight gain, but on the next play Andrews broke through and tackled Roper for a loss. Sullivan tried a place kick from the 35 yard line but the ball went wide and low, and Dillon, gathering it in on his 5 yard line, kicked 25 yards. Here Andrews broke through again and threw Roper for a loss. Crowley tried the centre but could not gain, and on the following play Andrews threw Roper for a 2 yard loss. Thus Andover secured the ball on downs.

Reynolds punted to Rondino on Boston's 40 yard line where he was downed in his tracks. Riley lost around right end but Roper gained around the left end. Sulliyan punted to Andover's 35 yard line where Dillon caught and ran the ball in 5 yards. Reynolds kicked to Rondino on his 25 yard line who fumbled, Dillon regaining the ball. However, as Andover was offside the ball was taken back to Andover's 30 yard line and it was second down, 10 to gain. On the next play Humbird circled left end and made a pretty run of 80 yards, thereby scoring a touchdown. Andrews kicked the goal, and the score stood Andover 12, Boston College 0.

Sullivan kicked off to the 10 yard line and Walker returned the ball to the 35 yard line. Walker then got 10 more around right end and Reynolds got through right centre for 4

more. Walker tried right end for no gain but Cates broke through left tackle for 25 yards. Conrad tried the opposite tackle for 6 more and Reynolds gained slightly through right guard. Walker went around right end for 3 yards, but on the next play the ball was fumbled and Boston regained it on her 18 yard line.

On two mass plays Boston netted 5 yards but on the following play fumbled and Conrad secured the ball, but Andover lost the ball and 5 yards for interference. Barry tried the line for no gain and on the next play, Humbird, by a fine tackle threw Roper for a loss of 10 yards. Time was called with the ball on Boston's 25 yard line and the score—Andover 12; Boston College 0.

_ SECOND HALF

In the Andover line up Heidrick took Humbird's place and Overall went in for Schildmiller. In the Boston line up Cramer, Tevlin, Green and Galliger took the places of Crowley, Nickerson, Sullivan and Roper.

Andrews kicked off to Rondino on his 25 yard line who returned the ball to the 40 yard line. Galliger tried left end for no gain and Riley lost 2 around right end, Brown making a beautiful tackle. Riley punted to Andover's 35 yard line where Dillon caught the ball and ran in 7 yards.

Walker netted 20 yards around right end but Andover lost 5 for offside play. After Walker had tried right end again for but a slight gain, Reynolds punted to Rondino at the centre of the field. Here Boston failed to gain her distance and the ball went to Andover on downs, On two plunges through left tackle Cates netted 11 yards, and Walker got 9 more around right end. Cates tore through left tackle for 3 yards but Reynolds did not gain through centre. Here Boston interfered and Andover received 5 yards and a first down. Cates got 4 through left tackle and Reynolds hit the line 6 bringing the ball to Boston's 15 yard line. Cates went through left tackle for 5 yards and Reynolds carried the ball over on the next play. Andrews kicked the goal. Score, Andover 18; Boston At this point Guiney College 0. took Cates' place.

Cramer kicked off for Boston to Guiney on the 25 yard line who ran it to the 35 yard line. After two plays that netted 5 yards, Reynolds punted to Riley in the centre of the field. He ran back 5 yards but fumbled on being tackled, and Brown fell on the ball. Reynolds pufited to Boston's 35 yard line, Rondino fumbled and again Brown recovered the ball. Two line plays advanced the ball 18 yards and then Andrews went through right tackle for 16 more, placing the ball on the 3 yard line. Here Brewer took Brown's place in the Andover line-up. Andover lost 5 for offside and on the next two plays failed to make the necessary distance and it was Boston's ball onther I yard line.

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Review of the Dramatic Club.

This fall the Dramatic club will give its annual vaudeville show sometime between Thanksgiving and Christmas, and it promises to be very good as some excellent new material has showed up. The feature of this entertainment is a farde of one act, while the remainder of the program is filled up with specialties and songs.

In the winter the club expects to give something of a higher order than has been presented for the last two or three years for its regular annual performance. The old members will not be assigned parts in this on the strength of their former work, but everybody will be given an equal trial. The club will also be coached by a professional, and thus a chance of very fine training is offered to all who are interested in this sort of work.

Everybody who expects to try for college dramatics should come out, as a member of the club here has a great advantage over all competitors when he gets to college. At Yale as everywhere else the dramatic club fills an important place in the life of the university, and is recognized and strongly supported by the faculty. Last year there were several old Phillips academp men on the cast of their play and Andover will probably be as well represented in the future.

Nothing definite has yet been decided as to what will be done in the spring term but, a farce is usually given at commencement time. All' money made by the club is given—to the school and last commencement it furnished a large part of the chapel decorations. Everyone who takes a part in any of the three performances during the year becomes a member of the club.

Changes in the Town Hall.

Work on the Town hall was begun last April and will be shortly completed. The building has been completely remodelled inside and is now one of the most convenient and well equipped halls of its kind. The total amount of money laid out will amount to \$9000.

A suite of offices in quartered oak and with all the modern conveniences has been put in the south side of the building and will be used by the town officers. The front entrance to the hall has also been torn out and rebuilt in handsome wainscoting, while the entrance hall is laid in tile with the town seal worked into the design, and the stairs are built of oak. The upper hall too has been frescoed and newly painted, and hard wood floors are being put in all over the building.

It is the change that has been made in the stage fixings and dressing rooms that will appeal particularly to the academy students how-All the numerous hall ways and closets that used to be behind the stage, have been torn out and a modern and convenient set of dressing rooms have; been put in. The stage is also being built over and while nothing has been added to it, it is much larger and deeper than formerly owing to the tearing out of the back rooms which space has only been partially filled by the new dressing rooms. New curtains and scenery have been added and everything done to make it as much like a modern theatre stage as possible.

In the rear of the building are the police cells and the police station.

The musical and dramatic clubs of the Academy will be especially benefited by these changes as they have occasion to make use of the hall several times during the year. The hall will be opened about the middle of next month with an evening of amateur theatricals, speaking, dancing, and a reception.

Irving J. French.
