Football Outlook at Yale.

Of the eleven regular men on the University team this year, Yale loses but three by graduation. These are Captain George B. Chadwick, 1903, left half-back; H. C. Holt, 1903, center, and G. A. Goss, 1903, right guard. Of the five substitutes who took part in the championship games, the following three graduate: F. W. Wilhelmi, 1903, left end; C. J. Hamlin, 1903, right guard, and O. S. VanderPoel, 1903, full-back. Four of the remaining men on the first squad graduate, as follows: J. C. Roraback, 1903, guard; H. C. McClintock, 1903, full-back; S. D. Ward, 1903, half-back, and R. R. Coffin, 1903 S., end.

Communication.

Editors of the Phillipian:

It is the custom here for the musical clubs and similar organizations to give certificates to their members to signify their membership. This certificate is usually framed and is not only an ornament to a room but also something that will last and will probably be highly valued in after years by its owner. On the other hand, the man who has won the right to wear an "A" on his sweater, has no such reminder of his exploits. While his "A" sweater lasts nothing further of course is wanted, but when this is worn out and he leaves the school for college or other pursuits, it would be a great pleasure to him to have a certificate or shingle, as it is usually called, denoting that he was a member of this or that team. The shingle would also serve as a proof, if the question was brought up as to whether a fellow was an "A" man or not, and would in this way help to prevent any men who should wish to do so, from wearing an "A" without the right to do it, in the summer or after having left school. This custom of giving shingles to members of athletic teams is followed at some of the colleges and it seems as if those who have the proper authority might easily introduce it here.

Andover Football Prospects.

The prospects for a successful football season next year, judging from the number of men of this year's team who will return, seems to be very fair. Out of the sixteen men who played in the Exeter game five only will probably graduate this year. Those men of the Andover team who will in all probability return to school are: Center, Guiney; guards, Andrews and Thompson; tackles, Stuart and Conrad; ends, Brown and Schildmiller; quarterback, Dillon; halves, Humbird and Veeder; full-back, Bullock. Those men who will not return are: Cates, tackle; Gillis, centre; Reynolds, full-back; Sumner and Overall, ends.

Intercollegiate Cross Country Championship.

The intercollegiate cross country championship was won by Cornell, with Yale a close second, at Morris Park, New Jersey, Wednesday, Nov. 26. The course is between six and seven miles in length with 44 jumps of various kinds. There was a slight rain the day of the race and the course was somewhat muddy, but the time made was good. A. C. Bowen of Pennsylvania, finished first, with O. W. Franchot of Yale, only a few feet behind him.

The scoring is done in the following manner: The man who finishes first counts one for his team, the third man counts three, the eighth man 8, and so on. Only the first four men from each team score, although a full team numbers seven, and the team obtaining the least number of points wins.

Following is a list of the colleges represented and their scores: Cornell, 24; Yale, 30; Pennsylvania, 53; Harvard, 59; Princeton, 75; Columbia, 110. A. C. Bowen who was the individual winner, covered the distance in 35 minutes; D. W. Franchot, who finished second, took 35 minutes, 1 second, and R. Williams of Princeton, the third man, took 35 minutes, 2 seconds. So far there have been five of these intercollegiate contests of which Cornell has won three and Yale two.

Obituary.

FRANCIS WOOD SANBORN.

Rev. Francis Wood Sanborn, P. A. '71, died at Marblehead, Mass., on October eighth. He was born in Marblehead, May 7, 1855, and was educated in the public schools of that place. In 1871 he graduated from Phillips Academy, and in 1875 received his diploma from Amherst College. Immediately afterward he took a three years' course at the Andover Theological Seminary and graduated in 1878.

In December of that year he was ordained to the ministry and was installed as pastor of the Central Congregational Church of Yarmouth, Maine, where he remained six years. From 1884 to 1896 he was pastor of the First Congregational Church at Newbury, and since that time has been living at Reed's Hill, occasionally supplying vacant pulpits, lecturing and travelling. At the time of his death he had been engaged for ten months of service at Lebanon, N. H.

In 1879, he married Miss Lizzie H. Bateman of Marblehead.

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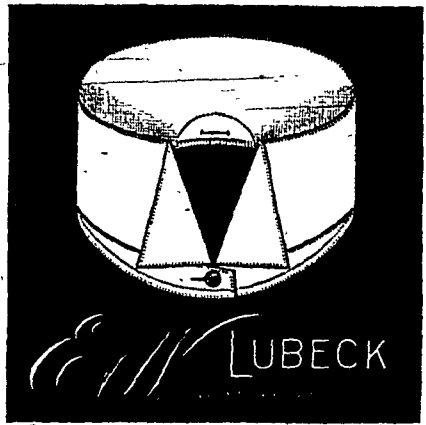
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Yale Baseball Schedule.
