TRACK PROSPECTS.

Prospects for Turning Out a Winning Team Next Spring are Very Promising.

As there are only five out of fourteen men from last year's track team in school this year the prospects for bringing out a winning team in the spring would be rather poor, were it not for the new material which showed up fairly this fall. As it is, however, only the hardest kind of work by everyone in school who has any ability on the track or in the field events can bring the season to a successful close next June. There were no cross country runs this fall but the fall meet was very successful and brought out some promising men.

The hammer throw and pole vault appear now to be the weakest points, but Pierce and Orr both did good work in these events in the fall meet and should improve very much. The sprints will be well taken care of as Captain Sumner, winner of both the 100 and 220 yard dashes in the dual meet last year, is back, while Young, a new man, promises well in these events. Fouts and Humbird have also done good work in the 100 yard dash. The quarter mile will be well looked after by Cates, Young, Brewer and Nash, together with Douglas and Thornton, who both ran fast relays in the class relay race this fall. The half mile and mile should be fast with Nash, Cates, Martin, Wilcox and Smith.

In the high jump, Marshall of last year's team ought to do excellent work, while Hasbrook and Veeder are good men. Guiney in the shot put is a record but he is the only probable point winner that has showed up so far. Fry, who holds the school record for the 220 yard low hurdles, Dillon and Veeder are the most promising men in the hurdle events. The broad jump at present seems to be an unknown quantity, but Velie has done some good work in that line.

The annual relay race with Exeter will come some time in February and in order to win it, everybody must come out and try for it. Later comes the Interscholastic meet in Boston in March. The Harvard and Yale interscholastic meets and the dual meet with Exeter come in the spring. Captain Sumner and Trainer Peet are very anxious to win all these meets this year and they surely deserve and ought to have the hearty support of the school.

Board Track.

Work on the board track has been begun and it will be ready for use by the beginning of next term. The straightaway will be built of 1 1/2 in. wood 70 yards long and 8 feet wide. The rest of the track will be built of the same material but is only 4 feet wide.

New Activity to Be Instituted by the Society of Inquiry this Coming Week.

In all the colleges and universities of today the main source of strength of the Young Men's Christian associations rests in the philanthropic work carried on by the associations. Here at Andover many excellent plans along this line have been discussed at different times, only, however, to be given up in the end for some reason or other.

In many of the colleges one activity of the religious societies is the collecting of old clothing and other articles of apparel, books, magazines and papers, from the student body every so often during the school year. These articles are then assorted and sent to hospitals, sailors' homes, and other philanthropic institutions where they will do a great deal of good. It is the earnest desire of the Society of Inquiry to see such an activity as that mentioned above successfully started here and carried through.

Sometime during the coming week all members of the school will be approached in this matter and they will be asked to give what they can to the carrying out of this plan. The collection proper will take place the last of next week.

Tomorrow afternoon in the Chapel Cyrus P. Osborne, secretary of the Seaman's Friend society of Boston will conduct the regular services, and in the evening he will give a talk at the meeting of the Society of Inquiry. He will tell of the work done by the Seaman's Friend society and also of what good use any books, clothes, etc., which we might send could be put. Let every fellow in school who can possibly do so turn out to the meeting, thus showing at least sympathy in the work. Mr. Osborne is certain to be a very interesting speaker with his stories of life on the sea, for he himself was a sailor in his younger days.

Philo.

The regular meeting of Philo was held last night in Society hall. The meeting was opened in the usual manner, the roll call and reading of the minutes of the previous meeting followed and then the society dissolved itself into the Philo-Senate.

Bills brought up by Ralston, Bishop, Kennedy and Fairbanks were discussed with much interest. The meeting was finally adjourned at nine o'clock.

Princeton's Football Captain.

At a meeting of the Princeton University football team, Thursday evening, John Siegel DeWitt, '04, right guard of this year's team, who lives in Siegelville, Pa., was elected captain of next year's team. Ralph T. Davis, an old Andover man, and captain of the Princeton team this fall, was unanimously re-elected but declined the honor.

DeWitt prepared at Lawrenceville, where he played guard and captained the team in 1899. Both last season and this he has been the most brilliant player on the Princeton eleven, having played tackle and guard and done almost all the punting and drop kicking. He has been chosen, almost without exception, guard on this year's All-American elevens.

DeWitt, besides being one of Princeton's best football players, holds the intercollegiate record for the hammer throw, with a distance of 167 ft., 6 in. He is 22 years old, 2 ft., 1 in. tall, and weighs over 200 pounds.

Exeter Football Prospects.

The prospects for a successful football season at Exeter next year, judging from the number of men of this year's team who will return, seems to be very fair. Of the thirteen men who played in the Andover-Exeter game this year, five will probably graduate. Those men of the Exeter team who will in all probability return to school: MacFayden and Marshall, guard; Holzman and Elder, ends; Harris and McGraw, quarterback; Hamil and Hagan, halves. Those men who will not return are Cooney and Brill, tackles; Hooper, centre; Dillon, guard, and Jenkins, fullback.

Yale-Princeton Dual Track Meet.

It was announced Wednesday evening by Capt. J. B. Thomas, of the Yale Track Association, that a dual track meet has been arranged between Yale and Princeton. The meet will be held in New Haven, May 9, 1903. The track meet with Princeton is enthusiastically welcomed by the students and graduates of Yale, and will prove of great interest to the public.

Harvard-Princeton Debate.

Princeton has chosen Congressman elect William Lanning of New Jersey as presiding officer for the Harvard-Princeton debate, which will be held in Princeton, Dec. 12. From the list of twelve men submitted, Princeton has chosen the following three as judges: Judge Charles Andrews of Syracuse, Albert Shaw, editor of the "Review of Reviews," Rt. Rev. John Scarborough, bishop of New Jersey.

C. H. Watkins, ex-P. S. '03, and W. C. Matthews, P. A. '01, have been in town this week.

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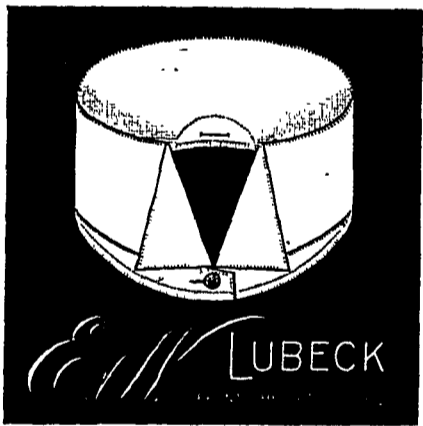
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All-American Teams.

The following are the All-American football teams as selected by Mr. Hanna of the *New York Sun*, one of the best football critics of today:

First team—Ends, Shevlin of Yale and Bowditch of Harvard; tackles, Hogan and Kinney of Yale; guards, Glass of Yale and DeWitt of Princeton; center, Holt of Yale; quarter-back, Rockwell of Yale; half-backs, Chadwick of Yale and Bunker of West Point; full-back, Graydon of Harvard.

Second team—Ends, Davis of Princeton and Metzgar of Pennsylvania; tackles, Graves of West Point and Sheehan of Brown; guards, Goss of Yale and Warner of Cornell; center, McCabe of Pennsylvania; quarter-back, Daly of West Point; half-backs, Metcalf of Yale and Weeks of Columbia; full-back, Bennett of Pennsylvania.

This gives Yale seven out of the eleven men; Harvard gets two and Princeton and West Point each one. Two Yale men appear on the second team, while Pennsylvania gets three, West Point two, and Princeton, Brown, Cornell, and Columbia each one.

In the two line-ups there are four old Andover men, Kinney, tackle, of Yale, and Holt, centre, of Yale, on the first eleven; and, on the second, Captain Davis, end, of Princeton, and Metzgar, end, of Pennsylvania.

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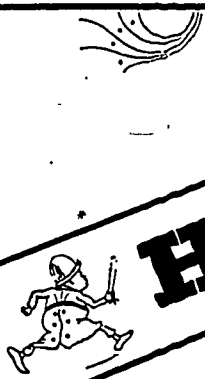

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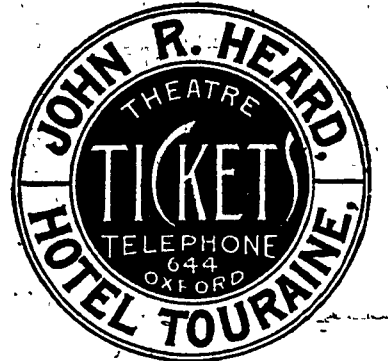
